Collect Prayer for the Day

Ever-loving God, your Son Jesus Christ healed the sick and restored them to wholeness of life. Look with compassion on the anguish of the world, and by your power make whole both people and nations; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. *Methodist Worship*

First Bible Reading - 1 Kings 17: 8-16

Then the word of the LORD came to him: "Go at once to Zarephath of Sidon and stay there. I have commanded a widow in that place to supply you with food." So he went to Zarephath. When he came to the town gate, a widow was there gathering sticks. He called to her and asked, "Would you bring me a little water in a jar so I may have a drink?" As she was going to get it, he called, "And bring me, please, a piece of bread." "As surely as the LORD your God lives," she replied, "I don't have any bread--only a handful of flour in a jar and a little oil in a jug. I am gathering a few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son, that we may eat it--and die." Elijah said to her, "Don't be afraid. Go home and do as you have said. But first make a small cake of bread for me from what you have and bring it to me, and then make something for yourself and your son. For this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the LORD gives rain on the land.'" She went away and did as Elijah had told her. So there was food every day for Elijah and for the woman and her family. For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the LORD spoken by Elijah. Some time later the son of the woman who owned the house became ill. He grew worse and worse, and finally stopped breathing. She said to Elijah, "What do you have against me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my sin and kill my son?" "Give me your son," Elijah replied. He took him from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying, and laid him on his bed. Then he cried out to the LORD, "O LORD my God, have you brought tragedy also upon this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to die?" Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times and cried to the LORD, "O LORD my God, let this boy's life return to him!" The LORD heard Elijah's cry, and the boy's life returned to him, and he lived. Elijah picked up the child and carried him down from the room into the house. He gave him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!" Then the woman said to Elijah, "Now I know that you are a man of God and that the word of the LORD from your mouth is the truth." (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading — Galatians 1: 11-24

I want you to know, brothers, that the gospel I preached is not something that man made up. I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it; rather, I received it by revelation from Jesus Christ. For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it. I was advancing in Judaism beyond many Jews of my own age and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers. But when God, who set me apart from birth and called me by his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son in me so that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not consult any man, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before I was, but I went immediately into Arabia and later returned to Damascus. Then after three years, I went up to Jerusalem to get acquainted with Peter and stayed with him fifteen days. I saw none of the other apostles--only James, the Lord's brother. I assure you before God that what I am writing you is no lie. Later I went to Syria and Cilicia. I was personally unknown to the churches of Judea that are in Christ. They only heard the report: "The man who formerly persecuted us is now preaching the faith he once tried to destroy." And they praised God because of me. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Third Bible Reading – Luke 7: 11-17

Soon afterward, Jesus went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went along with him. As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried out--the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. When the Lord saw her, his heart went out to her and he said, "Don't cry." Then he went up and touched the coffin, and those carrying it stood still. He said, "Young man, I say to you, get up!" The dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him back to his mother. They were all filled with awe and praised God. "A great prophet has appeared among us," they said. "God has come to help his people." This news about Jesus spread throughout Judea and the surrounding country.

(This is the word of the Lord.—**Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

The Gospel story in Luke today tells of a funeral. The scene at a funeral Galilee in the time of Jesus would be very different from a funeral today. At a modern funeral today there is often a silence, so much so that the family feel that they have to 'keep it in' to avoid making a scene. Our funerals are controlled affairs, stiff upper lip and an embarrassment at public grief. When Jesus saw the funeral procession coming out of the town of Nain, he would probably have heard it long before he ever saw the dead body. There would have been professional mourners in a procession, and they would have made such a racket that the widow could have cried as much as she liked without feeling embarrassment. The body would be wrapped and taken away from where people lived, perhaps to a cave, to be laid on a stone shelf where decomposition would have taken place. Eventually when the flesh had rotted away the family would collect the bones together and place them in a box, leaving the shelf ready for the next body.

It is into this scene of mourning and hopelessness that Jesus arrived. It might be that people knew who he was. Nain is only about five miles south of Nazareth, where Jesus grew up. Nobody asks Jesus to do anything, no doubt the twice bereaved woman had lost all hope. There is no great display of faith from people imploring Jesus to do something. Instead Jesus just becomes full of compassion, as he often was. Perhaps it was because this woman had suffered two bereavements, perhaps it was because Jesus knew how difficult life would become for her without a son to support her. Perhaps it was seeing the dreadful pain which affected so many people when somebody dies. Perhaps Jesus just knew how his own mother would feel when he progressed towards Jerusalem and his own certain death. Whatever the reason, he goes forward and he touches the funeral bier.

A funeral such as this would not have been a private affair, there would have been lots of people around, and they would have witnessed this remarkable miracle. They would have been astonished that Jesus went and touched in the way that he did. Touching is a powerful thing to do, it was also something which Jesus should not have done, for he himself became ritually unclean. It is always interesting that Jesus takes upon himself the criticism of the law, and by doing so makes others experience new life. In so many ways throughout his life Jesus turned the tables, in this incident, instead of the dead defiling the living; the living infused the dead with new life. (Numbers 19:11, 16).

Jesus commands the dead man to arise; the young man does so, and he is given to his mother. The onlookers are seized by fear, and they glorify God, seeing Jesus as a prophet and God as having looked favourably on his people.

Today, when we read this story we may remember other stories such as Peter's raising of Tabitha in Acts 9:36-42 or, more likely, the story of Jesus' raising of Lazarus in John 11. When the Gospel was written however, Luke knew that his readers would make connections with similar miracle stories from within Judaism. These are recorded in what we know as the Old Testament. Specifically, Jesus' miracle would remind the Jewish readers at the time, of the miracles and ministries of the Old Testament prophets Elijah and Elisha. These two prophets both raised the son of a widow and there are many similarities in the stories, (see church website). By drawing these comparisons Jesus is shown to be a healer like Elijah and Elisha. He is also a prophet characterized by compassion, one who is recognized as worthy of honour.

Yet we know Jesus is much more than just a prophet and this story points forward to a few verses later in Luke 7:18-23, here John sends his disciples to Jesus to ask him, "Are you he who is to come, or shall we look for another?" (7:19b). Jesus responds, "Go and tell John what you have seen and heard: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, the poor have good news preached to them. And blessed is he who takes no offence at me" (7:22-23).

This episode therefore serves to remind us that Jesus carries on the traditions of the Old Testament prophets, yet he is much more than a prophet himself. Jesus is the one to whom the scriptures pointed, the one waited for by John, the Messiah. How remarkable that the one who everybody was waiting for should be the kind of Messiah who walked the desert in the heat of the day and took pity on poor

bereaved widows and didn't give a monkey's whether he transgressed religious conventions. The Gospel story of the raising of the son of the widows, is a reminder to the Christians that not even death can break our faith in a God who has the gift of life which is stronger than death itself. 'The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away,' but the most powerful truth is that just as God gave life first to our mortal bodies, so he can also give to us life again after our death. Jesus tells the dead man to rise, he has the authority to do and this was his mission, to give life in abundance. Jesus is the resurrection and the life. We, who believe in him, need not fear death.

It was this belief that the power of Jesus was stronger than death, which gave the first disciples a trusting faith which could not be threatened by persecution or execution. Christians had a profound conviction that Jesus held the answer to everlasting life, hence they were always optimistic for the long term. However there is another feature of life which should be different for the Christian. Those people who do not accept the resurrection promises of God have life which is only a short term and inevitable descent towards nothingness. How meaningless this life becomes when we fail to appreciate the promises of life beyond this mortal moment. Yet for the Christian, trusting in the grace of God for eternal life, this time on earth is but preparation, an opportunity to invest our time in living and loving, knowing that love will last forever in God's time. Meditation Moving Beyond Stereotypes.

In the story from Kings, Elijah was in a difficult fix. He had just told the King of Israel, Ahab (husband of Queen Jezebel), that Israel would experience a drought. Jezebel was the daughter of King Ethbaal (1 Kings 16:31) of the Sidonians — a place where Baal was worshiped. Commentaries speculate that Baal worship spread through Israel because of Jezebel's influence. Elijah was sent to a stream of water near Jordan and was told to expect to be fed first by the ravens, ravens were considered unclean. Then he was fed by a foreign woman, from the same region that wicked, idolatrous Queen Jezebel came from! This was a Gentile woman — yet God told Elijah that his sustenance would come from her. If you were Elijah, would you find it difficult to accept help from any person from Jezebel's region? Did everyone in Sidon worship Baal and stand in opposition to the worship of Israel's God? Perhaps, as the woman was learning something about Elijah's God, Elijah was also learning something about people. We cannot sort and classify people and put them into boxes. Each is unique and endowed with an ability to respond to the grace of God. This raises questions about lines of division between peoples, classism, sexism and all sorts of things. Where do lines of separation come from, and when should they be crossed?
