Pentecost

Opening Verse of Scripture- Romans Chapter 5:5

The love of God has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (Alleluia!)

Collect Prayer for the Day —

Almighty God who on the day of Pentecost sent your Holy Spirit on the disciples with the wind from heaven and with tongues of flame, filling them with joy and boldness to preach the gospel: send us out in the power of the same Spirit to witness to your truth and to draw everyone to the fire of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. *Methodist Worship*



First Bible Reading - Acts 2: 1-21

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. Utterly amazed, they asked: "Are not all these men who are speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!" Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine." Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you; listen carefully to what I say. These men are not drunk, as you suppose. It's only nine in the morning! No, this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: "'In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy. I will show wonders in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and glorious day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'" (This is the Word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - 1 Cor12: 3b –13

Therefore I tell you that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit. There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues and to still another the interpretation of tongues. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines. The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body -whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. (This is the Word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 20: 19-23

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord. Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."
(This is word of the Lord—**Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

Our Gospel reading reminds us again of the events on the evening of Easter Day. We are told that the disciples had locked themselves away but still Jesus came to them to comfort and challenge them. Comfort by showing that He was truly risen from the dead and that He still cared for them and for their well-being. He came at a time of great fear and confusion. What had really happened and why did it happen? Was He really dead or fully alive?. How should they approach Him? What could they say to Him? And the challenge? "As my Father sent me, so I send you". They are told not to hide away but to get out and face the world, the world that had rejected Him and by connection, they thought them as well. But not only get out and about but continue doing the work that He had been doing for the past three years, forgiving sins. We know that this was the basis of Jesus' healing ministry, not only of the body but of the mind also. Forgive the sinner and the physical problems are cured. And they were not alone in this work for Jesus gave them the Holy Spirit to be their helpmeet.

As they gathered on the day of Pentecost, forty days after the Gospel narrative, so the mighty force of the Holy Spirit swept through the room where they were gathered and they were transformed. Changed from people fearful and timid to ones who could face the world. Changed from tongue-tied individuals to a group of people proclaiming the wonders that Jesus had done and how He was put to death and rose again. And all this by fishermen and public officials who spoke in languages that everyone could understand no matter where they originated from.

Oh they were laughed at and accused of being either drunk, mad or possessed of evil spirits. It wasn't possible for these ignorant Galileans to be able to talk like this unless these accusations were true. But now Peter really shows his colours, the same Peter who six weeks before had denied knowing Jesus now stood up and proclaimed Him Lord. The effect of the gift of the Holy Spirit was plain to see in the lives of the disciples and also the early members of the young church who, Luke tells us, spent their time in learning, praying, caring and sharing the possessions they had between themselves and others so that the church grew and prospered.

When Paul writes his letter of encouragement to the church at Corinth, he reminds them of what the Holy Spirit has done. He tells them that it has given all types of gifts to those that will receive them and he lists them and reminds them to rejoice in the very diversity of those gifts. Not everyone possesses all of the gifts and if we are blessed with a gift we must use it wisely and well and to the glory of Him who gives it. Who are we to try to prioritise or categorise the gifts of the spirit? Who are we to say whether one is more important than another? It is the very diversity of those gifts that make them so wonderful, so powerful and so special. Not only must we learn to make good use of the gift or gifts that we each have but we must learn to work in harmony with each other to ensure that the multiplicity of those gifts when used together are more than the sum of the individual elements. We now call it synergy.

This is when a Christian community finds its strength to evangelise, to reach out to a world in need. This is what the young church found after the coming of the Holy Spirit at that first Pentecost. To do that in our modern world is to offer it a purpose that seems to be sadly lacking in today's society. An article in the Times newspaper on Thursday last showed how the attendance at various denominations of the Christian church had declined over the last few years and how, if the decline continued at the same rate, how attendances would look in the year 2050. It makes for very disturbing reading. When will the wake-up call be sounded? Who has the courage to stand up and make it? If the church doesn't, then no one else will. By coincidence, this year Pentecost is at the same time as the start of Christian Aid week. Unfortunately, the amount collected seems to be reducing year on year and that cannot be solely due to the economic situation. Is it apathy from the public or are we not getting the message across? Is it that as a nation we do

not care about the plight of people less fortunate than ourselves in this and other countries? The current natural disaster in Myanmar, or Burma as we knew it, highlights the problem of getting aid to those in desperate need. Perhaps Christian Aid is not only about money but finding a practical way in which those gifts, so freely given by the Holy Spirit can be utilised for the good of the whole world. Perhaps then the world might see what the people of Jerusalem saw 2000 years ago, a determined group of people, inspired and ready to set the world ablaze. **Alan Davis.**

Meditation

There is a phrase "God has no grandchildren." It means that our faith is about something which happened long ago and which is passed down the generations. It is true that we all pass on to our children our best understanding of what our faith is about, but ultimately it is down to each one of us to know **afresh** what it means to be born of God. Each generation is to come to know the presence of the same Holy Spirit which empowered those first disciples. We are all God's children.

This is important, for as Jesus came to those first disciples and forgave their weaknesses and failures, so we must know afresh that we have a saviour who does not accuse us or remember our betrayals. As we meet with the risen Christ, so we too hear those beautiful words, "Peace be with you." The past, with all its regrets and missteps, has been forgiven. We are set at peace with God and one another. We are recreated, new creatures, through the Word of God. Where once there was sin, compromise, half-hearted discipleship, cowardice and blindness, now there is forgiveness and a chance to begin again. We are called now to live a new life, strengthened by a transforming Spirit. We need to be recreated. And that is what Jesus does, he breathes his Spirit upon us so that we too can practice forgiveness and reconciliation in our conflicted and divided world.

Seeing the risen Christ was a cause for the disciples' rejoicing. However we are reminded that our work is not easy, Jesus died in the process. As we serve Christ in the world, like those first disciples we concentrate on the wounds of Jesus, his nailed hands and pierced side. Peacemaking and reconciliation is dangerous work, may we find courage like the disciples to come out from behind our locked doors to go out in to God's world with his message of love.

Prayers for Sunday and the week ahead

Lord Jesus we remember that in your life, you sided with the poor, the weak, the sick and those who felt unloved and unwanted. You gave hope where there was despair and you restored even those who had given up all hope of healing. You proclaimed forgiveness to those who nailed you to a cross.

This Pentecost we pray that the Holy Spirit which was upon you, would dwell in us also. We long to know that same power of love, which transcends human weakness and which allows us to live in peace and unity, as children of the same heavenly Father.

Lord Jesus, we remember that the first disciples were frightened, yet at Pentecost you changed things dramatically. You gave your Holy Spirit to empower them. A frightened and discouraged community of believers suddenly received the power to live up to your calling for them.

May that same power enliven us today. May the fire of your Spirit warm our hearts and inspire us with fresh vision. This Pentecost, we long for your Holy Spirit to empower us to work for your agenda of liberation. May forgiveness be proclaimed to those who are bound in guilt and fear. We pray that those whose lives are broken and hurting would be restored.

Forgive our inertia to help the poor the poor, the captive, the dispossessed, and the imprisoned. This Pentecost, we pray for your church to be faithful in it's action and witness. Give us the will and supply to us the gifts we need to develop communities of good news in the midst of the despair and inequity, the injustice of global capitalism and military terror.

Lord Jesus, you seek for workers to send out into the harvest, send us. We ask this not because we have any strength or merit of our own, simply because we wish to be used in your service and we trust in your promise that you will supply our weakness with your strength .

Come Holy Spirit. Come as wind, to fan the embers of our faith. Empower us to speak and to act so that we will never be content until those in need have been satisfied.

Lord Jesus we remember that the Apostle Paul was struck blind so that his sight could become clear. We confess that so often we, like Paul, lack clarity of spiritual vision. We see things from our own cultural perspective and imagine that things are from you, simply because we have grown up believing certain things become accustomed to them. We pray for your Holy Spirit to change us and remake us, in the ways that you would have us be.

This is necessary to discuss proposals for the refurbishment of the hall and foyer. Your attendance would be appreciated for just a short period. Doctor Who caught the attention of church leaders, who are encouraging clergy to study the science fiction series to learn about its religious parallels. They have been urged to use examples from the programme in their sermons in an attempt to make Christianity more relevant to teenagers. At a conference last week, vicars watched Doctor Who clips that were said to illustrate themes of resurrection, redemption and evil. It analysed the similarities between the Doctor and Christ, and whether Daleks are capable of change. Although an atheist, Russell T Davies, the chief writer of the current series has previously acknowledged the benefits of religion.

"I think religion is a very primal instinct within humans, a very good one, part of our imagination," he said. Clergy looked at several episodes that could have religious meaning. Examples highlighted for their symbolism included the Doctor ascending with angels, Rose Tyler inspired by a vision and Daleks terrorising mankind. The Tardis was considered to represent a Church by being an ordinary object that points to something higher while the Doctor was likened to Christ in his willingness to sacrifice himself for others. The Rt Rev Tony Porter, Bishop of Sherwood, said it was vital that clergy adapt to the culture around them. The Church of England said: "Drawing spiritual parallels with aspects of contemporary culture is meat and drink to anyone with a vocation to make the good news of the Gospel known afresh in every generation. Doctor Who is a good example. "When you make the right external connections, the internal effect, like the inside of the Tardis, can be much bigger."

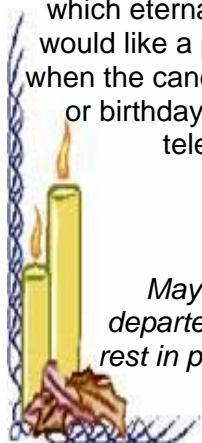
