# Remembrance Sunday

## Opening Verse - Psalm 121:1-2

I lift up my eyes to the hills – from whence will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

## Collect Prayer for the Day

Almighty and eternal God, from whose love in Christ we cannot be parted either by death or life: Hear our prayers and thanksgivings for all whom we remember this day; fulfil in them the purpose of your love; and bring us all, with them, to your eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.



## First Bible Reading - Micah 4: 1-5

In the last days the mountain of the LORD's temple will be established as chief among the mountains; it will be raised above the hills, and peoples will stream to it. Many nations will come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths." The law will go out from Zion, the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. He will judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide. They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore. Every man will sit under his own vine and under his own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the LORD Almighty has spoken. All the nations may walk in the name of their gods; we will walk in the name of the LORD our God for ever and ever.

(This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

## Second Bible Reading - Romans 8: 31-end

What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. Who is he that condemns? Christ Jesus, who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered." "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.. (This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

## Third Reading - 1 Corinthians 15: 50

.I declare to you, brothers, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed— in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. For the perishable must clothe itself with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality. When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain

(Reader : This is the word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)

## **Commentary**

The passage from Romans 8 is one I most often use at funerals. The passage, written by Paul in a letter to the Christians in Rome is the longest of the epistles. The church at Rome was not founded by either Paul or followers of Paul, so the letter is not only long but carefully crafted so that he conveyed to them the essentials of his theological position. At a time when so many stories about Jesus abounded, when so many heresies were in the air, Paul wanted to lay out his understanding that Christians could be heirs of Abraham through the love of Christ, even if they were not Jewish. Paul wanted to speak of the universality of sin and its remedy in Baptism and the love of God. I believe that this small passage is of a different tone, that it is not about ideas and theology but it is about reaching out for God in the worst of times. Perhaps Paul had been granted by God a vision of the terrible suffering that would come to the church at Rome. The passage, which is heartfelt and simple, points the reader beyond the trials and griefs of ordinary life to the ultimate reality of God's love. In that reality we know ourselves to be loved and supported. We glimpse the great truth that despite all the unfairness and tragedy of human existence we are held safe by God. The trials enumerated by Paul in this letter were not inventions, they were all things that had happened to him or to his followers. Some of the early Christians had been reduced to total poverty, had been made outcasts, violently attacked and martyred. Yet, Paul reminded them that the pain of human life is transcended by the world of heaven, where loved ones are, by the grace of God, reunited and every tear will be wiped away. When we are holding on to our faith by a thread, when life seems overwhelmingly cruel and sad, it is helpful to re-read Paul's words. As we turn the strong phrases over, it helps to reflect how they have helped many men and women before us. The words remind us that we are not alone in our suffering, although we may feel desperately isolated. Paul's own life was difficult and confusing, riven with private pain and many changes in location and fortune, but he could say these words to his followers in Rome: that in spite of everything he was convinced, utterly convinced, that Christ Jesus is with us in our suffering and cannot be parted from us. "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." We can say to ourselves even in the worst of times- "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" *Joan Crossley*

## **Meditation**

I am currently reading a book by Pete Ward, a lecturer in Theology at King's College, London, called "Liquid Church". In the book Dr Ward offers challenging insights into the plight of churches in our culture. He remarks that far from being a lost cause, Christianity can find hope in the large numbers of young people looking for an outlet for their spiritual longings. The generation which is now thirty-something and twenty-something is, according to surveys, very interested in the big spiritual questions: what is the purpose of life; can humanity be better, what happens when we die? We know that in Christ we have the answer to all these questions and more. Yet for the most part, our churches are empty of this and the generation after it. This is where the book becomes a little frightening. Dr Ward argues that "solid churches" with a fixed congregation and a building to maintain are unable to attract the young who fear commitment. Rather than expect the young to come for Church as we know and like it, we may have to offer them what they want, a looser, more liquid set of relationships through which they can find the way to Christ. He speaks about the activity of the Holy Spirit being liquid, like a strong current which sweeps things away. This is partly a scary image but it is also an exhilarating and exciting one. We can allow ourselves to be carried along by the refreshing, empowering activity of the Holy Spirit or we can try and hide. For Pete Ward, the current cultural climate is one which challenges institutions to reassess how we communicate the Gospel. He is not alone in his diagnosis, the Methodist Connexion and the Church of England are addressing these issues in their "Fresh Expressions" and other mission initiatives. The fate of the church is not to decline

but to evolve, perhaps in far more wonderful and fulfilling ways than we can currently imagine. We just need to allow the tide of the Holy Spirit to carry us out of our familiar comfort zones and see where we are taken. Joan Crossley
