# Remembrance Sunday

## Opening Verse of Scripture -

Isaiah 40.31

Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary they shall walk and not faint.



## Collect Prayer

## First Bible Reading –Micah 4: 1-8

In the last days the mountain of the LORD's temple will be established as chief among the mountains; it will be raised above the hills, and peoples will stream to it. Many nations will come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths." The law will go out from Zion, the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. He will judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide. They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore. Every man will sit under his own vine and under his own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the LORD Almighty has spoken. All the nations may walk in the name of their gods; we will walk in the name of the LORD our God for ever and ever. "In that day," declares the LORD, "I will gather the lame; I will assemble the exiles and those I have brought to grief. I will make the lame a remnant, those driven away a strong nation. The LORD will rule over them in Mount Zion from that day and forever. As for you, O watchtower of the flock, O stronghold of the Daughter of Zion, the former dominion will be restored to you; kingship will come to the Daughter of Jerusalem. (This is the word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God**)

## Second Bible Reading - Romans 8:31-end

What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. Who is he that condemns? Christ Jesus, who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered. "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

(This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

## Gospel Reading - 1 Corinthians 15: 50-end

I declare to you, brothers, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed-- in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. For the perishable must clothe itself with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality.

When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." "Where, O

death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain.

### **Commentary Working with God for Peace**

Micah knew all about war. He was a prophet around 860 – 750 BC in the Southern Kingdom of Judah. He was contemporary with Amos and Hosea in the Northern Kingdom of Israel and with Isaiah in Jerusalem in the Southern Kingdom. His message and vision (Micah 1 v 1) is for the two capital cities of these Kingdoms, Samaria and Jerusalem, warning them about the threat from the Assyrians: to both the Northern Kingdom of Israel and the Southern Kingdom of Judah. He was probably describing events from first-hand experience. In 722 BC the Assyrians destroyed Samaria (in the North) and 20 years later attacked Jerusalem, only for the city to escape by a miracle. Micah almost certainly lived through both of these events and was deeply affected by them. The alliance the Northern Kingdom of Israel had formed with Syria to try to hold back the Assyrians had failed. It was a painful time for Micah. Not only did this involve heavy fighting but also a 3 year siege of Samaria, after which his records show 27,290 people were deported to Persia and repopulated the land with colonists from Babylonia, Elam and, of course, Syria. But Micah wasn't even particularly focused with the political landscape; he was more concerned with the social injustices he saw, especially between the rich and the poor. And for Micah, not only was there the horror of living through war, he also experienced a lost generation, in his case the 10 lost tribes of Israel because after the fall of Israel, the 10 tribes of the Northern Kingdom effectively disappeared. There are some groups who claim to be descended from them even now, but they are in reality the Lost Tribes of Israel, a lost generation. We should never forget our lost generation, that is all those who lose their lives in battle fighting for freedom and liberty. We should never trivialise the fact that they gave everything in the cause for peace and freedom and the incredible loss they and their families suffered, and in some cases are still suffering. But as

we reflect on society today there is a real sense that we too have a lost generation on our hands. Micah spoke about the judgement and salvation of the Kingdom of God. But he was also able to look past the carnage of war and see the ultimate and peace that we have in God. He had a vision of a better world. There may be wars and carnage in the future that Micah saw but ultimately nations truly would turn their swords into ploughshares, their spears into pruning hooks and train for war no longer and sit under their own vines and fig trees as not only was the land peaceful, there would be a fair and equitable distribution of wealth. Despite the desperate situation, Micah showed that in God there was hope. It is that hope which we as Christians hold out for our society, the generations in our culture that are lost, lost not perhaps in the geographic sense but in the sense of the Jews of Israel and Judah, lost spiritually and therefore wandering aimlessly and potentially lost eternally. As Christians we are all part of that tapestry and we can choose to hold up our piece of the picture, our identity and responsibility or not. As Christians we are called to hold up the flag of hope in our own country, our own lost generation. Today reminds us that without the sacrifice of others we would not have the nation we have today. We should not trivialise their sacrifice, nor mix metaphors or images and our calling is of a completely different nature to theirs, but it is a calling nonetheless. Who are our lost generation, who are those who we should be engaging with? Like Micah, we should speak out to our leaders about the hope we have in Christ, the real peace that He brings, the economics that drives fair distribution of the world's resources. Like Micah too we need to speak out to individuals so that their lives can be changed and transformed by the hope that we all have in Christ. Today we remember all those who lost their lives in the service of their country. As they responded to their call, will we respond to ours? A call that is very different in its nature to their but in our current times, no less urgent.

Those we remember today were laying down their lives for the cause of peace, justice and freedom, often through the call of duty to a country or nation. They gave up their freedom so that others could have theirs. They fought injustice so that justice could ultimately triumph. We remember their sacrifice from the freedom that their efforts and commitment bought. They gave up their lives so that others could live in the freedom for which they fought. We remember them with gratitude for what they achieved and what their sacrifice enabled. With the current military engagements in Iraq and Afghanistan and across the world we are reminded daily that there is a heavy toll of human life in war. Many more are injured and impacted by the physical and mental damage war brings. Modern warfare is at the same time increasingly technological and increasingly fragmented, increasingly complex and increasingly diffuse in its aims and outcomes, increasingly widespread yet increasingly local and it must seem to many, as it seemed to Micah, that there is an army approaching their gates. We give thanks today for those who sacrificed so much, and for those who continue to do so day in and day out, in the cause of peace and freedom. We remember too that we will only turn our weapons of war into tools for peace when God is at the very centre of our lives and society and we are content to walk humbly with our God in obedience to Him. ## A Letter from the Bishop of Bedford

On the 15 November, the first ever elections for the new Police and Crime Commissioners will take place across the country. Whatever our views on the wisdom of this development, these Commissioners will

be given significant responsibilities. Replacing Police Authorities, they will hold the police to account on behalf of the public, and also hold the Chief Constable to account for the performance of his or her force area's officers and staff. They will set strategic direction and will have the power to appoint, and in certain circumstances, to remove the Chief Constable. They will have a duty to deliver better value for money and more effective policing. The appointment of a Police and Crime Commissioner in both Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire should engage our careful and prayerful participation, especially over the exercise of the second preference vote which the electoral system in use provides. At the same time, there are real concerns that the election will have a very low turnout. In a recent letter in the Daily Telegraph, the Electoral Reform Society wrote of the possibility of 'rock bottom turnout' and hoped that the Government would never again call a winter election. Why not use the cut-out flyer this edition of See Round in your window to encourage a good turnout at the election? More alarmingly they pointed to the danger that low turnouts can open the door to extreme candidates. In the 2009 local and European elections the two Archbishops warned of the dangers of voting for any party 'whose core ideology is about sowing division in our communities and hostility on grounds of race,

creed or colour.' Neither is this the platform for such views.

The Christian concern for the whole community not only calls on us to vote but also to keep before us the priority of the well-being of all and the common good. Police and Crime Commissioners, with their responsibility for policing across the county, cannot be partisan: they must respond to community concerns without regard to whose voice shouts loudest. Indeed they must embody the values of the oath that they will need to take which includes: 'I will serve all the people of [Police Force Area] in the office of Police and Crime Commissioner without fear or favour'.

As I prepare to vote in the Police and Crime Commissioner election, in addition to my assessment of their overall vision for policing, their general competency and experience, I find myself pondering four questions which I commend to you. Will this candidate:

- Have a particular concern for ensuring the safety of the weakest in our society?
- Have the ability to hold together the differing policing needs of rural and urban communities?
- Rejoice in the ethnic and faith diversity of our communities?
- Place an emphasis on restorative justice and the reintegration of ex-offenders back into community?

Thursday 15 November may be cold; it may even be raining, but despite the weather and the unfamiliarity of voting in November let us vote; and let us vote as always with a concern for the good of all.
