Sentence of Scripture John 6 : 40

Jesus said to his disciples, 'This is the will of my Father, that whoever sees the Son and believes in him should have eternal life, and that I shall raise him up on the last day.'

Collect Prayer for the Day *Before we read we pray*

Faithful God, the strength of all who believe and the hope of those who doubt; may we, who have not seen, have faith and receive the fullness of Christ's blessing; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen Methodist Worship

First Bible Reading - Acts 4:32-35

All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had. With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. And God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all that there were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need. (This is the word of the Lord—**Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - 1 John 1:1-2:2

That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched—this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. The life appeared; we have seen it and testify to it, and we proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and has appeared to us. We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ. We write this to make our joy complete.

This is the message we have heard from him and declare to you: God is light; in him there is no darkness at all. If we claim to have fellowship with him and yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live out the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin.

If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word is not in us.

My dear children, I write this to you so that you will not sin. But if anybody does sin, we have an advocate with the Father—Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world.

(This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 20:19-31

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Now Thomas (also known as Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

Then Jesus said
to Thomas,
"Put your finger here and
see my hands.
Reach out your hand
and put it in my side.
Do not doubt
but believe."
John 20.27



A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe." Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book. But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

(This is the Gospel of Christ - **Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Commentary

In our Gospel reading today, the disciple Thomas wants to put his hands in the holes in the wounded body of Jesus. He needs to know that Jesus is really alive. If we had been near Jesus after the resurrection we might also have been surprised at what was going on. Thomas just says out loud the things the other disciples (and perhaps us) think but keep to themselves.

It was Thomas also who asked Jesus what on earth he was talking about when he said he was going to 'prepare a place for them.' We are fortunate that Thomas voices the questions which we all have and in so doing shows us that it is alright to have doubts and fears in our faith. Like Thomas we do not know what happens when we die, we are filled with questions. But thankfully this is a good thing, faith is like a muscle it grows by stretching. It is good for our faith to be stretched like Thomas and as it is we learn to understand that there many things which we just do not and never will understand.

We all have doubts, we might not always express them, but they are there, a normal part of living. So it is with our faith, there will be things which trouble and confuse us, or things which we simply cannot bring ourselves to accept or understand. What do we do when our doubts trouble us? In the Gospel reading today we learn of Thomas. He could not accept that Jesus had risen from the grave, and he could not even accept the witness of the disciples who told him that they had seen Jesus with their own eyes.

Thomas struggled with the resurrection story, but it was not just Thomas, we are told others doubted as well, until they too had seen Jesus.

Thomas was lucky, soon he saw Jesus for himself, we are not so fortunate So what do we do about our doubts, we who believe but have not seen ? Perhaps the first things is to understand that everybody has doubts, the best things is to talk about them and use them to encourage ourselves to move on in our faith.

Meditation Easter reflection from the Methodist President and Vice-President

On our visits to the different parts of the Methodist Church we see many examples of death and resurrection. There are so many places where God's Spirit is doing incredible things in us and through us. We have tried to explore this in two reflections on how people experienced the events of the first Easter. The woman's is by the Vice-President, Gill Dascombe. The man's is by the President, the Revd Kenneth Howcroft.

The characters and events of Holy Week take us through a vast range of human experience: from jubilation through conflict, hope, betrayal, anger, power, fear, to grief, pain and loss, bewilderment and desolation where all we can do is wait. In this we are moving along the way that took Jesus through Good Friday to Holy Saturday, and on towards Easter Sunday's good news of new life.

In our travels, we have begun to realise that true renewal is always shaped by a dynamic of death and resurrection. It is stamped through with the reality of a cross and a tomb. Both begin with a body. Both become empty. They are inextricably linked.

To them and all the world comes the message that Christ is alive. God has raised him up and affirmed that

his way of taking up the cross in suffering love is God's way of creating, redeeming and perfecting the world. God still seeks to raise us up to be Christ's body and live his way through what we say and do, and how we think and pray (and, in a few weeks, how we vote) in the world around us.

A woman Why did I go to the garden so early? It was still dark! The night-world was a place of shadows and menace and all around was the gloomy silence of death. Unsure of my way, I was stumbling over boulders and getting caught in bushes. Overcome with frustration and despair, I sank down and wept.

I hadn't been able to sleep, of course. Not that night or the night before. Like all the bereaved, I didn't want one day to end and the next one to start. Each new day dragging me further from his presence, each day the pain of separation gnawing anew at my insides.

Later he was to tell me not to cling to him, not to hold on, and at the time I thought that it was the most unutterably callous thing I had ever heard. Of course I wanted to cling on! To cling on with all my might. To squeeze out every last drop that was left to memory. It was all I had left.

But it was into such darkness and emptiness that God spoke the first words of creation, bringing light and life. Could it be that on this blackest and most dreadful of all nights the world stood once again on the brink of something new? The dawn began to break. There was no blinding brilliance, only the usual cold grey mistiness. Enough for me to stumble on to the tomb and look inside and find, to my horror, that it was empty. There was no body. Nothing left to cling to.

And then, a voice spoke once more into the void. A Word. And it was my name. I turned around in astonishment and joy, and held out my arms. And he said: 'Don't cling to me. I haven't come back as before, I have moved on to new life. And so now must you.' The sun rose into the sky, gaining strength and filling the garden with warmth and life. I became the first witness to God's new creation. The universe re-made by love. I haven't come back, I have moved on, and now, so must you.' And now, so must we.

A man. Why didn't I go to the tomb? I couldn't bear it. I didn't want to think about what people did to him. Or what God allowed to happen to him. I had given up everything for him. But it had come to nothing. Darkness. Emptiness.

I didn't want to picture the awful way he was killed. I hadn't been able to face it when it happened. When the soldiers came, we ran. But most of us also ran away from the horror of it all inside ourselves. Some of us fell asleep when he asked us to stay awake and pray while he prayed. He was praying that God's will, not his, be done not just in heaven but in what was happening to him here on earth, even if that meant that he would have to drain the cup of suffering. We were meant to be praying alongside him that we would not be brought to our breaking point or led into temptation. Yet some of us went on to deny that we knew him. Some of us thought he had betrayed us and so ended up betraying him.

But something brought us back together. We huddled together, hiding from the awfulness of it all, from the rest of the world, and perhaps even from God.

We huddled together, not facing what had happened, yet somehow hanging on to it. Then something happened among the women. Some of them had not betrayed or denied him. They had not run away, but had been there at his barbaric execution on a cross. They had not merely said that they would follow him. They had actually followed him. Now they were running in, telling us a jumble of different things. His body had vanished. He wasn't dead. He had risen from the grave. Or, rather, God had raised him. Someone had told them. Or an angel had told them. Or he had appeared and spoken to them himself. And they were to tell the rest of us that we were to get out of our huddle and get on with his mission, saying and doing what he had taught us to do. If we did, we would find that he was with us. Can we face it? Can we trust that their message is good news? Can we let go and let God raise us to new life with and in Christ - and, through us, the world?

Prayers for Sunday and the week ahead

In joy and hope let us pray to the Father.

That our risen Saviour may fill us with the joy of his glorious and life-giving resurrection.

That isolated and persecuted churches may find fresh strength in the good news of Easter.

That God may grant us humility to be subject to one another in Christian love.

That he may provide for those who lack food, work or shelter.

That by his power war and famine may cease through all the world.

That he may reveal the light of his presence to the sick, the weak and the dying, to comfort and strengthen them.

That, according to his promises, all who have died in the faith of the resurrection may be raised on the last day.

That he may send the fire of the Holy Spirit upon his people, so that we may bear faithful witness to his resurrection.

Heavenly Father, you have delivered us from the power of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of your Son: grant that, as his death has recalled us to life, so his continual presence in us may raise us to eternal joy; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Easter Message from the Bishop of St Albans

'Always look on the bright side of life.' Somewhat bizarrely, the song from Monty Python's *The Life of Brian* has become a favourite at funerals. In the film it is sung by one of the thieves hanging on a cross next to Jesus. The message of the song is simple: when everything is going wrong, just whistle and reflect on the good things in life.

If only it were that easy. In reality groundless optimism does not offer comfort. In fact as we look around at the world it is easy to lapse into despair. In the past few months alone we have been confronted with the beheadings of journalists by Isis, police brutality in Ferguson, Missouri, the shooting down of Malaysian Airlines MH17 over Ukraine, the Ebola crisis, the Charlie Hebdo massacre in Paris and now the loss of 150 lives in the Germanwings disaster.

Reflecting on the counterpoint of hope and despair in human life, Maria Boulding, a Benedictine nun, writes: 'We cannot comfort ourselves with wistful thinking. We instinctively admire the courage of those who squarely face the possibility that human life is simply absurd, that there is no future at all, and that the only honourable option is to live with dignity and kindness as we wait for our meaningless extinction. Courageous as it is, however, this view is not convincing, for it leaves too much unexplained. Deeply rooted in our experience is an obstinate certainty that our best intuition will prove to have been the truest, and no mockery.'

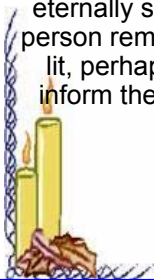
Hope is one of the essentials of life: without it we wither and perish. As we approach the General Election, one of the questions I will be asking is 'Who are the bearers of hope for those who have no hope in our society?'

Ziauddin Yousufzai, the father of Malala, the young Pakistani human rights activist and Nobel Prize-winner, was interviewed on Radio 4. Asked if he liked his new life in Britain, travelling among the international community and meeting world leaders, he was diplomatic but unequivocal. He expressed his appreciation of Britain and his gratitude for being alive, but said he was only sustained by one thing: the hope that one day he would be able to return to his home in Swat, Pakistan, with its familiar sights, smells and sounds. He said, 'It is the only hope we are living with. If someone told me I would die in any other part of the world, it would kill me.'

Rest In Peace

On the Sunday following a funeral service we remember in church those who have died. We light a candle to symbolise the light of Christ which eternally shines and brings hope. At least Malala's father can name the hope that sustains him. For others, hope is more elusive. The most abject hopelessness I have encountered is among those whose lives have been wrecked by addictions, who are unable to hold down a job and who have no home of their own. Talking to such a man recently, he said that he could not think about next month let alone next year. The only thing that kept him going was that he had been given enough hope to get through the next twenty-four hours. Listening to his story, it was difficult to know how to help or where to start.

Twenty-five years ago last month, two women from St Mary's Church, Watford, became increasingly concerned about the homeless people who congregated in their church porch. Rather than see them as faceless people to be moved on by the police, they took the trouble to befriend them. They discovered men and women whose lives had disintegrated. By reaching out to them with friendship, food and even taking some of them into their own homes for shelter, they sowed seeds of hope.

Joined by other helpers from churches across the town, they worked alongside the homeless and supported them as they rebuilt their lives. Today, with an annual turnover of £2m, the charity houses up to sixty people each night and supports around six hundred people annually. The name of the charity says it all: 'New Hope'.

The two women could name the grounds of their hope too: Jesus Christ, who is the hope beyond all hopes. Their belief in the resurrection of Jesus led them to the conviction that God is still in the business of giving life and hope, even in the most desperate situations.

This gift of hope has the power to transform people and situations, and it lies at the heart of Easter. Such hope is for everyone, even for those whose lives seem unredeemable. What Easter says is that nobody is beyond the healing, redeeming, restoring love of God.
