First Bible Reading Genesis 25: 19 - 34

This is the account of Abraham's son Isaac. Abraham became the father of Isaac, and Isaac was forty years old when he married Rebekah daughter of Bethuel the Aramean from Paddan Aram and sister of Laban the Aramean. Isaac prayed to the LORD on behalf of his wife, because she was barren. The LORD answered his prayer, and his wife Rebekah became pregnant. The babies jostled each other within her, and she said, "Why is this happening to me?" So she went to inquire of the LORD. The LORD said to her,

"Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples from within you will be separated; one people will be stronger than the other, and the older will serve the younger." When the time came for her to give birth, there were twin boys in her womb. The first to come out was red, and his whole body was like a hairy garment; so they named him Esau. After this, his brother came out, with his hand grasping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when Rebekah gave birth to them. The boys grew up, and Esau became a skillful hunter, a man of the open country, while Jacob was a quiet man, staying among the tents. Isaac, who had a taste for wild game, loved Esau, but Rebekah loved Jacob. Once when Jacob was cooking some stew, Esau came in from the open country, famished. He said to Jacob, "Quick, let me have some of that red stew! I'm famished!" That is why he was also called Edom. Jacob replied, "First sell me your birthright." "Look, I am about to die," Esau said. "What good is the birthright to me?" But Jacob said, "Swear to me first." So he swore an oath to him, selling his birthright to Jacob. Then Jacob gave Esau some bread and some lentil stew. He ate and drank, and then got up and left. So Esau despised his birthright.

Second Bible Reading - Romans Chapter 8: 1– 11

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death. For what the law was powerless to do in that it was weakened by the sinful nature, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful man to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in sinful man, in order that the righteous requirements of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the sinful nature but according to the Spirit. Those who live according to the sinful nature have their minds set

on what that nature desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. The mind of sinful man is death, but the mind controlled by the Spirit is life and peace; the sinful mind is hostile to God. It does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. Those

controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God. You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ. But if Christ is in you, your body is dead because of sin, yet

your spirit is alive because of righteousness. And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit, who lives in you.

Gospel Reading - Matthew Chapter 13 : 1 - 9, 18 - 23

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat by the lake. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat in it, while all the people stood on the shore. Then he told them many things in parables, saying: "A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop--a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. He who has ears, let him hear." "Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in his heart. This is the seed sown along the path. The one who received the seed that fell on rocky places is the man who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. But since he has no root, he lasts only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, he quickly falls away. The one who received the seed that fell among the thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke it, making it unfruitful. But the one who received the seed that fell on good soil is the man who hears the word and understands it. He produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

Commentary

In the James Bond film "The spy who loved me" there is a scene when the mad scientist looks out on his underworld "kingdom" and says to 007 "You see everything there is: beauty, ugliness and death." Well certainly, in nature there is beauty and ugliness; and the ugliness is often destructive, leading to death. We can contrast the beauty of the sunrise (very early I know!) with the ugliness of a storm, a flood or a tsunami. Such things often dominate the news for a while.

In human relationships, at all scales, there is beauty and ugliness; and, again, the ugliness is often destructive, leading to death. We can contrast the beauty of love and compassion with the ugliness of hatred whose consequences often dominate the news - and Isis in Iraq is just the latest in a long sequence.. The death and suffering seem so final and powerful. And we often feel powerless to do anything. Not that this is anything new. Utopian "experiments" have failed and even the Good Friday agreement in N. Ireland has not completely resolved all the issues. Terrorist extremists seem unstoppable. Yet, among the seemingly all-powerful ugly darkness of death and destruction, Christians affirm life. We believe that there is beauty and ugliness (you really can't pretend otherwise) and LIFE! It requires, to become a feasible reality, a change in human nature. And they say "You can't change human nature." You know, "they" are right in that. "You" can't change human nature and nor can I. But God can. And through the teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus he can and does. He changes peoples' hearts and mind sets by his love.

This is what our reading from Romans deals with. It chimes well with the opening line of our third hymn "Lord of hopefulness, Lord of all joy". Paul talks about human nature in all its weakness and powerlessness - vulnerable as we all know to falling to temptation and doing what is wrong. He views human nature as sinful - separate from - indeed separated from - Jesus and God. It's like our lower nature controlling us. As Paul exclaimed elsewhere "Oh wretched man that I am".

But the passage is headed "Life through the Spirit" with the Hebrew word "ruach" conveying energy - something more than human. To Paul, Spirit represented a power which was divine and which surges into

the life of a believer enabling him or her to know victorious living rather than defeated existence.. It is a total transformation that is on offer here. No mere tinkering around the edges! We see it in Jesus who came into our world, born as one of us - "a helpless babe". And he lived our life, experienced all that we do, yet was sinless and was obedient to God - even to death on the cross. Paul argues that we can all be involved in Jesus' goodness, so can be filled and dominated by the Spirit of love and power that is not our own. This frees us from the past - all the skeletons in our cupboards are dealt with - and strength for the future is assured.

This is not to say that all is plain sailing and roses all the way. Life is just not like that: there will still be beauty and ugliness (after all Jesus was a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief) - but the ugliness does not have the last word and need not consume us. For Paul says that Jesus suffered and died and also rose again. He conquered death, and Christians who are one with Christ, share in that victory. Believers experience in Jesus a new quality of existence in the here and now (verse 10) and will experience an eternal existence with God beyond death (verse 11).

So we have a hope that is "steadfast and certain" as the modern hymn says. We can confidently affirm that there is beauty, ugliness and life and as Jesus says in the parable in our Gospel reading "there will be an enormous harvest" despite all the apparent failure and doom and gloom in our world. 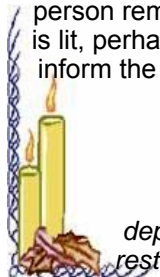
