First Reading — Acts 9:1-6

Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples. He went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem. As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" "Who are you, Lord?" Saul asked. "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting," he replied. "Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do."

(This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Revelation 5:11-14

Then I looked and heard the voice of many angels, numbering thousands upon thousands, and ten thousand times ten thousand. They encircled the throne and the living creatures and the elders. In a loud voice they sang: "Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honour and glory and praise!" Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and on the sea, and all that is in them, singing: "To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be praise and honour and glory and power, for ever and ever!" The four living creatures said, "Amen," and the elders fell down and worshiped.

(This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading –John 21: 1-19

Afterward Jesus appeared again to his disciples, by the Sea of Tiberias. It happened this way: Simon Peter, Thomas (called Didymus), Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples were together. "I'm going out to fish," Simon Peter told them, and they said, "We'll go with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. Early in the morning, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. He called out to them, "Friends, haven't you any fish?" "No," they answered. He said, "Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some." When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish. Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord," he wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water. The other disciples followed in the boat, towing the net full of fish, for they were not far from shore, about a hundred yards. When they landed, they saw a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you have just caught." Simon Peter climbed aboard and dragged the net ashore. It was full of large fish, 153, but even with so many the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." None of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time Jesus appeared to his disciples after he was raised from the dead. When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you truly love me more than these?" "Yes, Lord," he said, "you know that I love

you." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs." Again Jesus said, "Simon son of John, do you truly love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep." The third time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time, "Do you love me?" He said, "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my sheep. I tell you the truth, when you were younger you dressed yourself and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God. Then he said to him, "Follow me. (This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God.**)

Commentary Peter's Charge

Making mistakes does not mean we cannot continue to share with Christ in his work. We know this from our story from John's Gospel this morning. Peter has made a phenomenal mistake. He was the one guaranteed not to let Jesus down. All the others would fail, but not Peter – or so he thought. Then it was Peter who denied Jesus three times. Fear took over, fear of losing his life, fear of being associated with somebody who claimed to be God. Fear of standing up for what he knew to be true.

So Peter goes fishing, good idea! Get away from it all, catch food, make money – but more importantly try and hide away from the failure. Peter could never come to terms with letting Jesus down and failing to be the rock which Jesus wanted him to be.

It was at this time of despondency that Jesus comes to Peter and greets him whilst he is fishing. Peter might have expected that Jesus would choose somebody else, somebody less impulsive and more reliable. But Jesus doesn't, he chooses Peter, with all of his failings and disappointments. You see Jesus was never actually let down by Peter. Jesus knew that Peter was asking too much of himself. Jesus knew that it was only if Peter relied upon and trusted him that he could ever succeed. He could never achieve what Jesus wanted of him in his own strength.

So here is Peter fishing all night and Jesus teaches him another lesson. Do as I say and you will catch the fish - and he does 153 of them. How many fish there are is probably irrelevant, but the fact that Peter only catches them when he follows the directions of Jesus is most certainly not. The point is that what matters is that we heed the voice of Christ. Past failure is not an indication of future performance in the Christian life, not unless we decide that to be the case.

So Jesus asks Peter three times if he loves him.

'Three times you have denied me Peter, three times will I affirm your love.'

The love of Peter was never in doubt by Jesus, but Jesus did understand the frailty of Peter. The frailty which brought about his denial and the frailty which no doubt prevented him from sleeping at nights as his words of betrayal echoed in his ears. So Jesus shows Peter that no record is kept of past wrongs, Jesus shows Peter that he trusts him, - yes, in spite of failure and there is important work that he wants to share with him.

There has been much speculation about the significance of the number of fish caught, and the different Greek words used when Peter and Jesus speak about love, what is of significance however is that Peter realises that Jesus forgives, that after all is why the crucifixion took place. Peter does nothing to earn the forgiveness of Jesus, it is just there and he needs to recognise it to enable him to heal the hurts and failures of the past and discover the new life and ministry which Jesus has for him.

The passage is about faithfulness and God's trust and Jesus being there to help us pick up the pieces of our lives when everything is a mess. Peter let Jesus down, but even such a humbling experience did not preclude him from ministry. On the contrary it equipped him for it. Such a humbling experience would have established Peter far better for service in Christ's name. It is a simple case of gratitude, if we know our own lack of worth then we are not subject to illusions of self-worth and pride which inevitably causes us to think ourselves better than others. Those who are aware of their own sin and have felt God's forgiveness are inevitably the most tender, compassionate, and understanding of others who are bruised

or weak. It is the self-righteous who are not suited to God's purpose. St. Isaac the Syrian taught, *"He who has seen himself as he is, and has seen his sin, is greater than the one who raises the dead"* When we are face up to and recognise our faults, then the opportunity comes for the spirit to change our practice of scorning, punishing and loathing weakness. St. Isaac went on, *"Purity of heart is love for those who fall"*.

This is a timely reminder to the church and for us when we think that purity is thinking our behaviour somewhat better in character than those around us. "Purity of heart is love for those who fall". Peter is asked to love Jesus, so are we. That love is understood by Jesus, not in terms of a feeling, rather we display that love for Christ in how we love other people. This is what we are called to do. It is surely true that such a humbling experience of failure would have established Peter far better for service in Christ's name. So too those of us who are aware of our own sin and have felt God's forgiveness are inevitably the most tender, compassionate, and understanding of others who are bruised or weak. purpose. Do not allow personal fear and weakness, or past failure ever to hold you a prisoner to the past. Instead see it as a qualification, for you will never be 'holier than thou.' Christ uses Peter's history of failure to equip him for the role of ministry and that ministry is to love. It is this command to love which must lie at the heart of the Christian life and without it there will be no Christian life. *Charles Royden*

Meditation by Liz Little

When we read about the occasions when Jesus appeared after the resurrection, one thing which is striking is that often Jesus was not recognised at first, even by those who had been closest to him and had heard him assert that he would indeed rise from death on the third day. It is easy with the benefit of hindsight to wonder why the disciples were not a little faster on the uptake, but if we recall the horror of Jesus' death and the devastation they must have felt at the apparent destruction of all their hopes, it is understandable.

If we are in danger of feeling smug and convincing ourselves that, of course, we would have immediately recognised Jesus on the Emmaus Road or on the seashore, perhaps we should ask ourselves whether we recognise Jesus when he appears to us today. Our living Saviour appears in our world in many guises and in many ways, but it is so easy for us to miss his presence in our busyness and our self-centredness. As we celebrate our risen Lord, our challenge is to look for him in the most unlikely of places and with the unlikeliest of people; after all, that is where he was often to be found in life. This meditation was inspired by Jesus' appearance to Mary Magdalene at the tomb (John chapter 20, 10 – 18) and invites us to consider how we might recognise Jesus in our daily lives.

She did not recognise you; She thought you were the gardener.
Lord Jesus, you turn up in the most unexpected places,
at the most unexpected times. What do you look like? How do we recognise you?

It's not so much what you look like as what you ARE like, that's how we can recognise you:
the compassion, the love, the tenderness. You reach out toward us, so gently.
You come to us in the guise of the gardener, the care worker,
the cleaner, the businessman, the prostitute. You surprise us, Lord Jesus – will we recognise you?

You called her by name. THAT was when Mary knew you, that was when she fell down at your feet
in joy, confusion, hope.

When you call US by name, are we listening? Will we respond as Mary did?
You call us through others, through our thoughts and prayers,
You call us through the still, small voice within.
You call us by name, Lord Jesus – will we hear you and respond?

You said, "Touch me not." Mary reached out for you, she longed to touch you,
the friend she thought was dead. But you were changed.
Mary could not touch you, but she knew your presence.

We cannot touch you, Lord, not as Thomas did. We cannot see your body standing before us.
But we can touch your presence, your love, we can know you near us.
You invite us to reach out for you, Lord Jesus – will we trust you and know your presence?
You told her that you were returning to the Father. You had been Mary's friend,
You believed in her, you transformed her life.
She knew you as a human friend, sharing in her daily life,
Sharing in her emotions and experiences.

But she knew that you were special too. In the garden, she caught a glimpse of your mystery,
she saw you, fully human and yet divine, a bridge between heaven and earth.
You show us yourself, God made man, Lord Jesus – we worship you.

Home for Good Some of you will know that my wife and I have been foster carers for many years, or does it just feel like many years :-). I am especially happy to forward the information below from Churches Together in England and to encourage you to share it as widely as possible. I would be delighted to speak to anyone in your fellowships that is considering adoption or fostering. Blessings, Andrew County Ecumenical Development Officer.

Every day more than 50 children are taken into care in the UK. They are removed from chaotic, traumatic, abusive, neglectful or desperate situations. Some of them need a home in an emergency. Some of them need a temporary home until they can return to their families. Some of them need an occasional home to give their families a break. Some of them need a permanent home with a new forever family. The Church is uniquely placed to offer its help to meet this need. As a large social network with involvement of large numbers of families, the Church is fertile soil for recruitment. Once carers have been through the full process of assessment, the Church could also provide an excellent community of support to wrap around families who are adopting or fostering children.

After a year of extensive consultation, with foster carers, adoptive parents, church leaders, social work professionals and fostering and adoption agencies, Care for the Family, CCPAS (The Churches' Child Protection Advisory Service) and the Evangelical Alliance have launched the Home for Good initiative. Home for Good aims to change the culture in local churches throughout the UK, to make adopting and fostering a significant part of their life and ministry. From the President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Dr Mark Wakelin:

"Margaret Thatcher was a hugely significant, complex and yet divisive figure in post-war British politics. She achieved a major breakthrough as Britain's first woman Prime Minister, and her time in office fundamentally changed the nature of British society, especially the relationship between individuals and the state. For many people she was a courageous and committed leader, and one of the best known British politicians around the world - her roots in a personally responsible Methodist tradition were greatly admired by many. Perhaps one of her greater achievements was to change the post-war political consensus, forcing her political rivals to campaign far more on her terms."

we want to see Jesus!

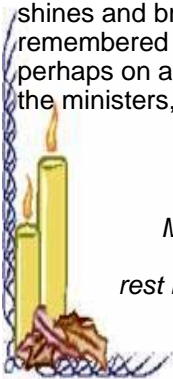
