Third Sunday of Advent

Sentence of Scripture - 1 Thessalonians 5:16

Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

Collect Prayer for the Day *Before we read we pray*
O Lord Jesus Christ, who at your first coming sent your messenger to prepare your way before you: grant that the ministers and stewards of your mysteries may likewise so prepare and make ready your way by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, that at your second coming to judge the world we may be found an acceptable people in your sight; for you are alive and reign with the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.



First Bible Reading Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11

The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zion—to bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. They will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the Lord for the display of his splendour. They will rebuild the ancient ruins and restore the places long devastated; they will renew the ruined cities that have been devastated for generations. "For I, the Lord, love justice; I hate robbery and iniquity. In my faithfulness I will reward them and make an everlasting covenant with them. Their descendants will be known among the nations and their offspring among the peoples. All who see them will acknowledge that they are a people the Lord has blessed." I delight greatly in the Lord; my soul rejoices in my God. For he has clothed me with garments of salvation and arrayed me in a robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom adorns his head like a priest, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the soil makes the young plant come up and a garden causes seeds to grow, so the Sovereign Lord will make righteousness and praise spring up before all nations. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus. Do not put out the Spirit's fire; do not treat prophecies with contempt. Test everything. Hold on to the good. Avoid every kind of evil. May God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through. May your whole spirit, soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful and he will do it. (This is the word of the Lord-- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 1:6-8, 19-28

There came a man who was sent from God; his name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all men might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. Now this was John's testimony when the Jews of Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Christ." They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No." Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the desert, 'Make straight the way for the Lord.'" Now some Pharisees who had been sent questioned him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" "I baptize with water," John replied, "but among you stands one you do not know. He is the one who comes after me, the thong of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie." This all happened at Bethany on the other side of the Jordan, where John was baptizing. (This is the word of the Lord-- **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

On Advent Three we think about John the Baptist that wonderful prophetic figure who came proclaiming the coming of the Jesus. John was excited and totally motivated to work for God and he had high hopes for what God was going to do in the world. He proclaimed that wonderful things were going to take place with Jesus, but then he looked at Jesus and found him to be a great disappointment. John had said that God was going to do a whole lot of judgement and punish the wicked, instead he found himself incarcerated in prison. Why had Jesus not roused a rebellion and overthrown the wicked and unjust? We can perhaps sympathise with John. He was a man waiting for God to work in certain ways and Jesus had failed to live up to his expectations. Jesus has not taken an axe to any trees, and had not burned any "chaff" with "unquenchable fire." He had not led a revolt, nor caused any prison walls to fall. No wonder that John asks.. "Are you the coming one, or should we look for another?"

John associated God with certain types of action, judgement, punishment. Jesus was very different and instead of judging the people he met, he understood them and preached forgiveness. It was the opposite of what John expected, yet it is an astonishing glimpse of the divine attitude towards humanity. John the Baptist expected thunder and lightning, the wrath of God from above and Jesus said he had to see God in other ways. Jesus' said,

"Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them."

John was thinking of the kingdom in earthly terms, in terms of power and authority. If this was the Kingdom of God then Jesus was spectacularly failing, but what Jesus was doing was starting a different way of looking at things, a new set of values. We too might expect God to work in certain ways, but looking at Jesus we realise that God is not like us, our expectations are going to need to change.

In a sense this was not something new, the way of God is described over and over again by the prophets:

- Take care of society's most vulnerable (the widow, the orphan, the immigrant);
- Limit the gap between rich and poor (the Year of Jubilee),
- Do not use power to further the narrow self-interest of yourself and your friends;
- Do not accumulate wealth at the expense of the poor.

So when John's disciples question Jesus, he answers in language they both understand. The blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed. This is the way of God—definitely not the human way of establishing your authority. John was expecting Jesus to do something different, the result was that the Messiah was there in front of him but he never recognised it.

So what does this teach us today? Well it challenges us as to how we recognise the presence and activity of God in our world.

- Some would see God at work if the Church numbers were growing fast, in the same way that shareholders examine a report for growth in a business.
- Beautiful, grand religious building might be places where we would see God, as the disciples marvelled at the huge stones of the temple.
- Perhaps we would see God at work if our prayer requests were answered the way that we want. God is seen as a bit like Santa, rewarding the good with their wishes.

This way of judging success leads to disappointment with God and we end up feeling like John the Baptist. Jesus did not have lots of followers and he was frequently sent away by people who wanted nothing to do with him, even his own family. His birth in a stable was a defining moment which characterised the rest of his life as one of rejection where people refused to give him room. Some folks are still looking for signs of God in the way that John the Baptist was, and like John the Baptist they will be disappointed. Yet Jesus is God and this is how God works. God is at work all round us, if only we have eyes to see and ears to hear. *Charles Royden*

Meditation

When I think about prophets I think of people like Martin Luther King. Prophets are people who are willing to speak out and say uncomfortable things, challenging things, without fear. Listen to some of the words of Martin Luther King from his 'I have a dream' speech. It is possible that this speech by Martin Luther King was one of the greatest sermons ever preached. We are fortunate to have it recorded. (It would have been wonderful to have John the Baptist on film also).

Let us not wallow in the valley of despair, I say to you today, my friends.

And so even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal."

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood.

I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering with the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice.

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

I have a dream today!

I have a dream that one day, down in Alabama, with its vicious racists, with its governor having his lips dripping with the words of "interposition" and "nullification" -- one day right there in Alabama little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as sisters and brothers.

I have a dream today!

I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, and every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straight; "and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all flesh shall see it together."

Martin Luther King uses words from Isaiah 40:4,5. If he had started his quotation at the previous verse 3 he would have included

A voice of one calling: "In the desert prepare the way for the LORD ; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God. Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. And the glory of the LORD will be revealed, and all mankind together will see it. For the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

He had a dream. He was speaking about what he believed to be the coming of the Kingdom of God on earth. He was speaking about the achievement of the struggle for real freedom and equality of black people in the United States. In his dream those things in the America of his day which are incompatible with the coming of Christ - the 'mountains and hills of injustice, prejudice, inequality and oppression - are laid low' by the love of Christ and the dignity of all human persons. That is the true spirit of our Advent: An awareness that there are things in ourselves and in our world which are not worthy of Christ. A consciousness of our need and our ability in faith to challenge those things both in ourselves and in our world that are wrong and to attempt to rebuild a world worthy of Christ. A willingness to pay the price of the opposition that witness will bring. John the Baptist and Martin Luther King both died for their witness

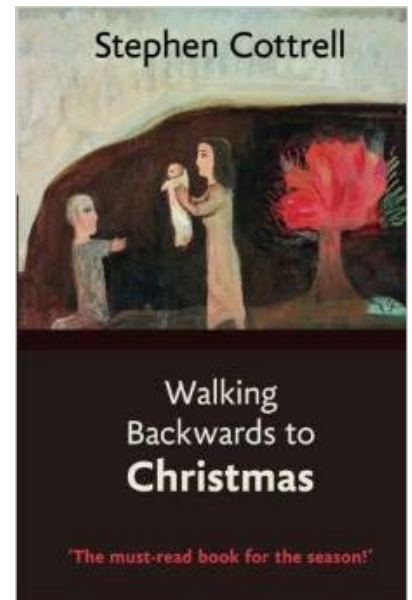

Leader: Let us pray:

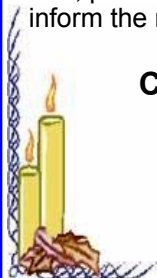
**Lord Jesus, light of the world,
