Second Sunday of Epiphany

Verse of Scripture -

For with you, O Lord, is the fountain of life; in your light we see light. Ps 36 v 9

Collect Prayer - *Before we read we pray*

Almighty God, in Christ you make all things new: transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace, and in the renewal of our lives make known your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen** *Common Worship*

First Bible Reading - Exodus 24: 3-11

When Moses went and told the people all the LORD's words and laws, they responded with one voice, Everything the LORD has said we will do. Moses then wrote down everything the LORD had said. He got up early the next morning and built an altar at the foot of the mountain and set up twelve stone pillars representing the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he sent young Israelite men, and they offered burnt offerings and sacrificed young bulls as fellowship offerings to the LORD. Moses took half of the blood and put it in bowls, and the other half he sprinkled on the altar. Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people. They responded, We will do everything the LORD has said; we will obey. Moses then took the blood, sprinkled it on the people and said, This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words. Moses and Aaron, Nadab and Abihu, and the seventy elders of Israel went up and saw the God of Israel. Under his feet was something like a pavement made of sapphire, clear as the sky itself. But God did not raise his hand against these leaders of the Israelites; they saw God, and they ate and drank. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God)

Second Reading - Jeremiah 31: 31-34

The time is coming, declares the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their forefathers when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them, declares the LORD. This is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after that time, declares the LORD. I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. No longer will a man teach his neighbour, or a man his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, declares the LORD. For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more. (This is the word of the Lord - All: Thanks be to God)

Epistle Reading Romans 12: 1-2

Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God— this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is— his good, pleasing and perfect will. Reader : (This is the word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God)

Gospel Reading *(Please stand)*

The Holy Gospel is taken from John Chapter 15 Verses 1-10. **All: Glory to Christ our Saviour**
I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. You are



May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know *Jesus*

already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If anyone does not remain in me, he is like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you. This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples. As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. If you obey my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have obeyed my Father's commands and remain in his love. (This is the Gospel of Christ - **Praise to Christ our Lord.**)

Commentary A Covenant Invitation

Wesley's Covenant Service invitation begins, 'Commit yourselves to Christ as his servants. Give yourselves to him, that you may belong to him...' Challenging words in an age when commitment to anything by anyone seems to be the exception rather than the rule. But perhaps it's not so much of a challenge as an generous invitation. Jesus, in today's gospel reading invites the hearers to 'remain' in Him. He's inviting them and us to dwell, or rest, in His love. For some of us who like to be active and involved with getting things done, it can be difficult to rest quietly in God's love from time to time. Often we prefer to be doing things, being engaged with the hustle and bustle of daily life and our Christian commitment. Jesus' words are a timely reminder that we have a relationship with God through the grace of Jesus, not because of our activities and busyness.

Jesus goes on to say that anyone who does not accept the invitation to remain and dwell in Him, so that He can remain and dwell in us, will be unfruitful. Our busyness and activity will lead to nothing unless we are empowered and directed by His life giving Spirit, constantly drawing upon the strength that He supplies through His abundant riches and love for each one of us. Paul, writing in Romans indicates that our commitment to God is no mindless acceptance of Christ and His ways, it's a conscious decision to dedicate our lives to the service of God and our fellow human beings. And as we live out that decision, we begin to conform more to the way of Christ and less to the way of the world, not through adherence to a set of principles we feel compelled to follow, but because through the renewing of our hearts and minds we are become new creations and have an increasingly different perspective on life.

If we do remain in Him, accept his generous invitation, then He promises to trim and prune us so that we can be even more fruitful. It would seem that just as in life, our spiritual growth and development can sometimes be accompanied by pain along the way. As we renew our baptism promises and turn again to Christ, we renounce the evil and the sin that separates us from God and each other. We make serious commitments which in turn will sometimes mean making hard, difficult and painful changes in the way we live our lives. As we pray the covenant prayer and ask God to use us as He wishes, acknowledging that we are God's to do with as He wills, we are committing to put God Himself at the very centre of our lives, with whatever implications that carries. But as we turn from sin and have God increasingly at the epicentre of our lives we begin to experience more of His freedom. As we remain and dwell in Him, rather than our lives becoming more constrained they become the very opposite. As we 'freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal', so the gentle wind of the Spirit blows through our souls and we begin to experience that deep peace of inner freedom, forgiveness and tranquillity. *Sam Cappleman*

Meditation

The Covenant prayer is one of the most treasured prayers of Christian commitment for the 325,000

members of the Methodist Church in Britain. When it was used at the enthronement of Dr Rowan Williams as the Archbishop of Canterbury in 2003 the Secretary of the Methodist Faith & Order Committee, Dr Clive Marsh, said: "The Covenant Service is often singled out by Christians of other traditions as a valuable and distinctly Methodist practice. Methodists find the Covenant prayer especially significant because of the commitment at its heart. The invitation to make such a covenant in commitment-phobic times offers a major challenge, especially when we are prone to live the illusion that we are wholly in control of our own lives."

The Methodist Covenant Prayer

I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you or laid aside for you, exalted for you or brought low for you; let me be full, let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing; I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal. And now, glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. So be it. And the covenant made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.

O God, Searcher of all our hearts, you have formed us as a people and claimed us for your own. As we come to acknowledge your sovereignty and grace, and to enter anew into covenant with you, reveal any reluctance or falsehood within us. Let your Spirit impress your truth on our inmost being, and receive us in mercy, for the sake of our Mediator, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. *David Tripp*

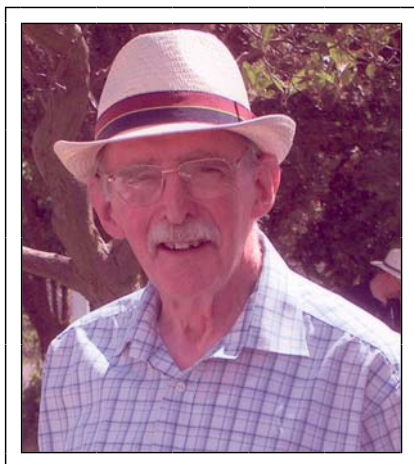

News and Information

John Standley



The first week of the 2007 saw the death of a stalwarts of St Mark's Church, John Standley. His funeral was held this week at St Mark's Church and was attended by many people from across Bedford who knew John. John was originally a member at Putnoe, but became one of the founder members of St. Marks, and was the Secretary of the first embryonic Church Council. He served the church in a variety of ways, in the Sunday School, Church Steward, the Leadership Team and in many "fetching and carrying roles". He served the wider church as A Circuit Steward and was for 35 years a local preacher. His varied life took him into a wide range of community activities, including recently the services at Highfield. He loved God and his fellow men and women. He has left a gap in the life of our churches which will be hard to fill.

The day after John died, Mary and I met fellow KMS choir members and gave them the news. Bob immediately said "Lovely man". And that sums John up. For more than 30 years John has been our friend and my brief tribute will echo many of yours. I shall miss John –his words and his fun -, puns and word play tumbled out of him – more than he always knew. He was loyal, kind, honest and friendly. He was a sportsman, both competitor and spectator. Like every friend I occasionally disagreed with him. His enthusiasms waxed and waned, often because he felt he could not do well enough at something. But his interest in and concern for people never waned. He loved God and he loved people and was always ready to help them, both individually and through his community links. In my own times of need, John has been there for me.
