Collect Prayer for the Day

Before we read we pray

Lord of creation, whose glory is around and within us: open our eyes to your wonders, that we may serve you with reverence and know your peace at our lives' end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



First Bible Reading - Exodus 14: 19-31

Then the angel of God, who had been travelling in front of Israel's army, withdrew and went behind them. The pillar of cloud also moved from in front and stood behind them, coming between the armies of Egypt and Israel. Throughout the night the cloud brought darkness to the one side and light to the other side; so neither went near the other all night long. Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and all that night the LORD drove the sea back with a strong east wind and turned it into dry land. The waters were divided, and the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued them, and all Pharaoh's horses and chariots and horsemen followed them into the sea. During the last watch of the night the LORD looked down from the pillar of fire and cloud at the Egyptian army and threw it into confusion. He made the wheels of their chariots come off so that they had difficulty driving. And the Egyptians said, "Let's get away from the Israelites! The LORD is fighting for them against Egypt." Then the LORD said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea so that the waters may flow back over the Egyptians and their chariots and horsemen." Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at daybreak the sea went back to its place. The Egyptians were fleeing toward it, and the LORD swept them into the sea. The water flowed back and covered the chariots and horsemen—the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed the Israelites into the sea. Not one of them survived.

But the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left. That day the LORD saved Israel from the hands of the Egyptians, and Israel saw the Egyptians lying dead on the shore. And when the Israelites saw the great power the LORD displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the LORD and put their trust in him and in Moses his servant. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord -- Thanks be to God)

Second Reading- Romans 14: 1-12

Accept him whose faith is weak, without passing judgement on disputable matters.

One man's faith allows him to eat everything, but another man, whose faith is weak, eats only vegetables. The man who eats everything must not look down on him who does not, and the man who does not eat everything must not condemn the man who does, for God has accepted him. Who are you to judge someone else's servant? To his own master he stands or falls. And he will stand, for the Lord is able to make him stand.

One man considers one day more sacred than another; another man considers every day alike. Each one should be fully convinced in his own mind. He who regards one day as special, does so to the Lord. He who eats meat, eats to the Lord, for he gives thanks to God; and he who abstains, does so to the Lord and gives thanks to God. For none of us lives to himself alone and none of us dies to himself alone. If we live, we live to the Lord; and if we die, we die to the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord. For this very reason, Christ died and returned

to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living. You, then, why do you judge your brother? Or why do you look down on your brother? For we will all stand before God's judgement seat. It is written: "As surely as I live," says the Lord, "Every knee will bow before me; every tongue will confess to God." "So then, each of us will give an account of himself to God. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord—Thanks be to God)

Gospel Reading Matthew 18:21-35

Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times. "Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him. Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt. "The servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' The servant's master took pity on him, cancelled the debt and let him go. "But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow-servants who owed him a hundred denarii. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded. "His fellow-servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' "But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. When the other servants saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed and went and told their master everything that had happened. "Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I cancelled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow-servant just as I had on you?' In anger his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed. "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart." (Reader: This is the word of the Lord - Thanks be to God)

Commentary

We read last week that when there are issues and disputes in the church they are to be dealt with, and Jesus does not expect his followers to just brush them under the carpet. If somebody is out of order then go and have it out with them, don't gossip and tell everybody else about it—go to the person concerned. There is a recognition by Jesus that problems do have to be dealt with, by the people concerned.

This is not an excuse to go around telling people your thoughts about them. Most of the time it might be better just to forgive them without the need to blow the issue out of all proportion. If we went to everybody about every little thing then it would be ridiculous.

'Excuse me I really do not like you coming to church wearing a Manchester United shirt.' (they lost yesterday to Liverpool by the way).

I think what Jesus is saying is this, if you have to say anything, say it to them quietly. Don't go and make a meal out of it with everybody else! Very often people do the opposite, they will speak to anybody other than the person concerned. 'Do you know what so and so said to me...' If a matter is so important then have it out and go face to face, that way it can be sorted out. Not a letter, or a text, or an email - face to face!

So in the reading today, Peter comes and asks Jesus how many times he should forgive. Peter in an attempt to be generous suggests "As many as seven times?" Seven is generous. Seven is a holy number to Jewish people, symbolizing "perfection, fullness, abundance, rest, and completion." The rabbinical

standard is three, based on Amos 1-2. Peter had every reason to suspect that Jesus would have given him a pat on the back for this generous suggestion. Jesus is unimpressed, he takes the seven and multiplies it by seven. "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy times seven" (v. 22). The message which Jesus gives is that when it comes to forgiveness you shouldn't even be counting. Forgiveness means that you have let go of it, put it in the past, it should no longer be reckoned. Jesus is telling us to throw away the calculator and record keeping. Jesus is using numbers to exaggerate and make his point. He is fond of using exaggeration in his stories, such as when he said cut off the bits of your body which cause you to sin! He goes on to do the same thing in the story of a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. The king saw one slave owed him 10,000 talents. The annual income of King Herod was 900 talents so 10,000 talents can be expressed in our terms by billions. A talent was the largest unit of money known in the Near East in New Testament times and 10,000 was the largest number used in counting. So what Jesus does is to multiply the largest unit of money, by the largest Greek number! The result is unimaginably large — a working man's wages for 200,000 years.

No slave has any hope of paying these amounts and so his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. The miracle happens. The king goes far beyond what the slave has asked. He grants, not just a little more time, but forgiveness of the great debt. But then we learn that as the slave went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him 100 denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.'). The second debtor uses exactly the same words that the first debtor used. But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. A denarii was worth the daily wage of a labourer. So the hundred denarii debt represent a working man's wages for one hundred days and is tiny compared with the ten thousand talent debt. The problem is that the man does not have it and immediate payment is required. The first debtor had no chance of ever repaying his ten-thousand talent debt, but it is quite conceivable that the second debtor will be able to repay his hundred denarii debt.

Such forgiveness and yet such a failure to understand the need to be equally forgiving to others. We cannot imagine the first slave's lack of compassion, given his recent narrow escape. Understandably the fellow slaves were greatly distressed and went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. The Jesus principle of forgiveness means that we are accountable to show forgiveness. We enjoy salvation by the grace of God, but this parable warns that God expects us to manifest at least some small portion of that grace in our relationships with our Christian brothers and sisters. There is a direct message to us, the standard of forgiveness we use can equally be applied to us by God. *Charles Royden*

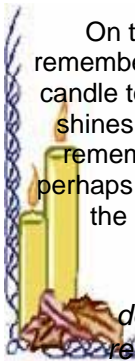

Solidarity urged as violence rocks Church in India The Methodist Church is calling for urgent prayer for thousands of persecuted Christians in India as violence flares across the state of Orissa. The British Methodist Church offered its support to The Church of North India (CNI) this week as more than 50,000 people were left homeless and many killed in attacks following the worst anti-Christian violence India has seen since independence 60 years ago. Revd Dr Enos Das Pradhan from CNI made contact with the World Church Relationships Office, asking Methodists to uphold their brothers and sisters in Orissa in prayers for peace. "Fear of attack has taken every Christian into its grip and our people are living in the most persecuting time of their lives," he said. "Will you join us in prayer for our brethren in Orissa? Kindly uphold the people of Orissa in your prayers, that God grants them strength to bear the losses and also to be witness of His love in these trying times." CNI, the British Methodist Church's partner in the region, has been at pains to condemn the killings of both Hindus and Christians. Revd Dr Pradhan also condemned the killing of Hindu leader, Pradhan Swami Laxminarayan Saraswati and his four associates in his letter to British Methodists. teve Pearce, Partnership Coordinator for Asia, was keen to pass on CNI's request. "To use religion as a justification for attacking individuals or groups is abhorrent and yet we are seeing widespread community violence," he said. "We have heard of horrific attacks on homes, places of worship and individuals. Many of us were moved this week by a press photo of a young girl whose face had been burnt because she was a Christian. We ask the Indian Government to act for peace, to act for the vulnerable and quickly undermine the culture of intolerance and violence while there is time." Kasta Dip, Coordinator of Youth Concerns for CNI emailed youth and children's Connexional team colleagues at the British Methodist Church. "We have been hearing news of killings everyday," said Kasta. "My hometown Bolangir is in the western part of Orissa. There have been already over 60 instances of violence, including the burning alive of at least eight persons and over six hundred homes. "Last night three CNI churches were burnt. Pray for our three dioceses in Orissa."
