

First Bible Reading - Amos 7: 7-15

This is what he showed me: The Lord was standing by a wall that had been built true to plumb, with a plumb line in his hand. And the LORD asked me, "What do you see, Amos?" "A plumb line," I replied. Then the Lord said, "Look, I am setting a plumb line among my people Israel; I will spare them no longer. "The high places of Isaac will be destroyed and the sanctuaries of Israel will be ruined; with my sword I will rise against the house of Jeroboam." Then Amaziah the priest of Bethel sent a message to Jeroboam king of Israel: "Amos is raising a conspiracy against you in the very heart of Israel. The land cannot bear all his words.

For this is what Amos is saying: " 'Jeroboam will die by the sword, and Israel will surely go into exile, away from their native land.' " Then Amaziah said to Amos, "Get out, you seer! Go back to the land of Judah. Earn your bread there and do your prophesying there. Don't prophesy anymore at Bethel, because this is the king's sanctuary and the temple of the kingdom." Amos answered Amaziah, "I was neither a prophet nor a prophet's son, but I was a shepherd, and I also took care of sycamore-fig trees. But the LORD took me from tending the flock and said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel. (Reader: This is the word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God)

Second Reading - Ephesians 1: 3-14

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love he predestined us to be adopted as his sons through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will— to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace that he lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding. And he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, to be put into effect when the times will have reached their fulfilment—to bring all things in heaven and on earth together under one head, even Christ. In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, in order that we, who were the first to hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. And you also were included in Christ when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation. Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

Third Reading - Mark 6: 14-29 — Please stand for the Gospel Reading

When the Gospel is announced — Glory to Christ our Saviour

King Herod heard about this, for Jesus' name had become well known. Some were saying, "John the Baptist has been raised from the dead, and that is why miraculous powers are at work in him." Others said, "He is Elijah." And still others claimed, "He is a prophet, like one of the prophets of long ago." But when Herod heard this, he said, "John, the man I beheaded, has been raised from the dead!" For Herod himself had given orders to have John arrested, and he had him bound and put in prison. He did this because of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, whom he had married. For John had been saying to Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." So Herodias nursed a grudge against John and wanted to kill him. But she was not able to, because Herod feared John and protected him, knowing him to be a righteous and holy man. When Herod heard John, he was greatly puzzled; yet he liked to listen to him. Finally the opportune time came. On his birthday Herod gave a banquet for his high officials and military commanders and the leading men of Galilee. When the daughter of Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his dinner guests. The king said to the girl, "Ask me for anything you want, and I'll give it to you." And he promised her with an oath, "Whatever you ask I will give you, up to half my kingdom." She went out and said to her mother, "What shall I ask for?" "The head of John the Baptist," she answered. At once the girl hurried in to the king with the request: "I want you to give me right now the head of John the Baptist on a platter." The king was greatly distressed, but because of his oaths and his dinner quests, he did not want to refuse her. So he immediately sent an executioner with orders to bring John's head. The man went, beheaded John in the prison, and brought back his head on a platter. He presented it to the girl, and she gave it to her mother. On hearing of this, John's disciples came and took his body and laid it in a tomb.

Commentary

When you think of a prophet what image comes to mind? It might be like the one shown above of John the Baptist, with robes, perhaps a beard, and almost certainly in need of a hairdresser! But there is much more to prophecy than these old fashioned pictures. Prophets are not necessarily people who can foretell the future, in fact they might not be able to do that at all. What they do is to speak to us words, or images which are of God. They tell us things about God and about ourselves, sometimes things which we don't want to hear.

Meditation - Is this a prophetic voice?

Bishops declare replacing Trident would be "evil" and "profoundly anti-God".

Twenty Church of England bishops signed a letter opposing the use of nuclear weapons, and saying the money would be better spent on developing countries. The letter coincided with a review of Trident, by the Commons defence committee, which needs to be replaced by 2024.

"Whatever our various views on conventional warfare, we all agree that Just War arguments rule out the use of nuclear weapons . . . Such weapons challenge the very core of Judaeo-Christian faith." "Trident and other nuclear arsenals threaten long-term and fatal damage to the global environment and its peoples. As such, their end is evil, and both possession and use profoundly anti-God acts." "costs involved in the maintenance and replacement of Trident could be used to address pressing environmental concerns, the causes of terrorism, poverty, and debt."

Defence Committee questions the purpose of deterrence

Statement by Steve Hucklesby, Secretary for International Affairs for The Methodist Church: "We are pleased to see the Defence Committee's findings reflect many of the points raised by the Methodist Church in its submission. "The report notes that the past concept of deterrence is no longer relevant in the current international context. There are clearly questions as to whether nuclear weapons will offer the best option for our security in 20 years time. We share the disappointment of the Defence Committee that the Ministry of Defence has declined to meet with it. "It is our view that our future security will ultimately depend on a strong non-proliferation regime. We need to limit the number of new countries developing weapons. We also need to limit the increase in fissile material around the globe as there is a danger that it could fall into the wrong hands and be used to make 'dirty bombs'. An investment in a replacement in Trident cannot help us here. The world is changing fast. This report demonstrates that there is no reason for a future prime minister to feel bound by a concept of deterrence that was born out of the Cold War era."

Support Woodland Burial You can make a difference.

You may have seen in the Times and Citizen a positive article relating to the application for a woodland burial site at Keysoe made by St Mark's Church. It is most important that this application receives fair treatment by the planning department and is not derailed by malicious gossip or a lack of understanding. It would be greatly appreciated if people were able to give support to the application by writing to the planning department stressing how important such a place of burial would be to the Christian community in Bedford.

Please consider writing to Mr. G. Richards, Planning Services, Bedford Borough Council, Town Hall, St Pauls Square, Bedford. MK40 1SJ. Tell the planning department that you support the proposed woodland burial site at land north of Keysoe Row West, Keysoe, Beds. Please stress how important the need is for this place of burial because it would offer a place of consecrated burial for Christians in Bedford. Whilst our churches have provided a consecrated place for burial of cremated remains at St Mark's, there is currently no consecrated place for burial available for Christians. Village churches have strict policies on who may be buried and Christians are therefore being denied the opportunity for burial in hallowed ground. The planners need to be advised that Christians are also deeply concerned about the environment and burial is for many an important alternative to cremation which produces of greenhouse gasses and emissions contributing to global warming and pollution. Christians are concerned about the environment and we therefore want to develop a natural woodland setting for burial which does not pollute or take up ground like traditional cemeteries. This is an ecumenical project supported by Christians of many denominations. The proposal is part of the Church of England's national initiative to provide a network of consecrated, green burial grounds throughout the country – the other one closest is at Barton in Cambridgeshire.

Bedford is one of the most culturally diverse towns in Britain and has a wide range of faiths practiced within it. All of these faiths have the right to practise freely and should have the facility to bury their followers in their own cemeteries should they wish – this is enshrined in Article 10 of the Human Rights Act 1998 and has been a feature of British culture for many years. The Christian churches have as much of a right to this as any other religion and indeed would support other faiths in achieving this. The current proposal is therefore an important aspect of the expression of faith of the Christian community in Bedford. Although submitted by the Church of England, the burial ground would be available to people from any background who wish to be buried in a consecrated Christian burial ground. *Charles Royden*
