Bible Notes

29 Sunday in Ordinary Time

Verse of Scripture Psalm 119:89 Your word, O LORD, is eternal; it stands firm in the heavens. Your faithfulness continues through all generations; you established the earth, and it endures.

A Collect Prayer - Before we read we pray

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters, we do also for you. Give us the will to be servants of others as you were the servant of all; for you gave up your life and died for us, but live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever
Amen

First Reading – Genesis 32: 22-31

That night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two maidservants and his eleven sons and crossed the ford of the Jabbok.

After he had sent them across the stream, he sent over all his possessions. So Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him till daybreak. When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man. Then the man said, "Let me go, for it is daybreak." But Jacob replied, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." The man asked him, "What is your name?" "Jacob," he answered. Then the man said, "Your name will no longer be Jacob, but Israel, because you have struggled with God and with men and have overcome." Jacob said, "Please tell me your name." But he replied, "Why do you ask my name?" Then he blessed him there. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "It is because I saw God face to face, and yet my life was spared." The sun rose above him as he passed Peniel, and he was limping because of his hip.

Reader : This is the word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God)

Second Reading– 2 Timothy 3: 14– 4: 5

But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it, and how from infancy you have known the holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who will judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I give you this charge: Preach the Word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction. For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading –Luke 18: 1-8 Please stand

(The Holy Gospel is taken from Luke 18:1-8—**Glory to Christ our Saviour**)

Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. He said: "In a certain town there was a judge who neither feared God nor cared about men. And there was a widow in that town who kept coming to him with the plea, 'Grant me justice against my adversary.' "For some time he refused. But finally he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or care about men, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will see that she

gets justice, so that she won't eventually wear me out with her coming!" " And the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off? I tell you, he will see that they get justice, and quickly. However, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on the earth?" (Reader: This is the Gospel of Christ - **Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Commentary on Luke 18:1-8

The widow and the dodgy judge.

If you read this passage carelessly, you might conclude that God is being compared to an unjust judge or even that nagging at God in prayer is a guaranteed way to get results. In fact the parable belongs to the category of "how much more ..." stories. The story of the judge is exaggerated and if well delivered could be quite funny. The tale of how a poor widow (one of the most helpless and dispossessed persons in society) gained her own way with a rich, powerful and high ranking man, may have amused Jesus' audience. The punch line contrasts the self-seeking approach of the judge to the eternal love and care of the Father. God's attention to our needs and prayers is assured and He is always listening to our intercessions. Joan Crossley

Meditation. "In *Lectio Divina* (Holy reading) we offer ourselves to God; and we are people in motion. In ancient times this inner spiritual motion was described as a helix - an ascending spiral. Viewed in only two dimensions it appears as a circular motion back and forth; seen with the added dimension of time it becomes a helix, an ascending spiral by means of which we are drawn ever closer to God. The whole of our spiritual lives were viewed in this way, as a gentle oscillation between spiritual activity and receptivity by means of which God unites us ever closer to Himself. In just the same way the steps or stages of *lectio divina* represent an oscillation back and forth between these spiritual poles. In *lectio divina* we recognize our underlying spiritual rhythm and discover many different ways of experiencing God's presence - many different ways of praying." (Fr Luke Dysinger)

Church Council News

Putnoe Heights Church Council

The Council met this week and were in good spirits as they reflected on good news coming from different areas of our church life. The work with children through Junior Church, Storybox and Storybox Plus, and also the TNT youthgroup were cause for rejoicing. There was considerable delight that the Mission focus was bringing results especially in the raising of funds for Malawi. The Council also heard of the rapid progress being made to secure planning permission for the Bridge Cottage site, to maximise value from the property kindly and generously left to the church in the will of Alice Pitts. Council were also updated on the progress being made to obtain planning permission for the fitting of new ventilation and heating units for the church. Altogether an evening of good news, which helped offset sitting on kiddie seats in the pre-school as the premises were being so well used

Superstar - The Church Council were also interested to hear of a musical which is being organised by Neil Bramble-Chapman. Neil has been arranging the performance of "Jesus Christ Superstar" which comes to Putnoe in 2005. On 20

February 2005 Putnoe Heights Church will be hosting a production of "Jesus Christ Superstar" which is being performed by the Youth Choir of the First Presbyterian Church at Caldwell New Jersey USA.

Our American friends found our church on the internet and decided that Putnoe would be the ideal venue for their touring party which will be performing across the country and will be with us just for this one show. There will be a total of 44 teenagers, split into pairs, who will require hosting for the night of the 20 February. If you are willing and able to host two teenagers, please let Neil know asap. All hosts will have to be CRB checked, if not already so, to comply with our Partnership Safeguarding Policy.

St Mark's Church Council

The Council meeting at St Mark's last week took longer than usual as a result of many new and exciting developments which needed to be discussed. The Council agreed to seek the extension of the Garden of Remembrance due to the continuing and expanding use of the Garden by the community. The Council agreed to explore a strategic expansion of the pre-school and there was also agreement to seek the replacement of the grass in the children's playground with a new 'safe surface'

The Council were supportive of a tender to be made to Beds County Council for European Social Funding. The funding would allow the church to operate facilities for the learning disabled designed to assist them in obtaining employment. Currently only 10% of learning disabled adults have employment. There was enormous support for the work being done in pastoral care with support for the bereaved a special highlight. The new bereavement support drop-in on Wednesdays was greatly appreciated.

The August accounts had already been audited and were presented. Financially we had a strong year in revenue from the Centre, but we were still not funding all of our ministry cost. Nevertheless we had made ends meet and fundraising was going well for the new extension to accommodate Autism Bedfordshire. There were now three years left to start the work before planning permission expired. The Council approved the use of new altar coverings for sacramental worship. Agreement was made that services on Sunday 26 December would not take place. A communion service may take place at Putnoe Heights—more details later)

Remember our Church Council meetings are always 'open meetings' and everybody is welcome to attend.

Advent Course. Our course will take the theme of 'Pilgrimage,' with four talks on 24 November, 1, 8 and 15 December at Putnoe Heights Church. The evenings will begin with refreshments at 7.30pm for 8.00pm start. Each evening will finish at 9.00pm. We are delighted that the first two of our talks this year will be given by Professor Paul Crossley. Other speakers will be The Reverend Dr Joan Crossley and the detective novelist Kate Charles.

Women Bishops? A few months ago our churches presented a motion to the Bedford Deanery Synod, which was passed. It was in favour of sending a message to General Synod to debate the issue of the appointment of women bishops. This motion was also passed by the October Diocesan Synod. The House of Bishops Working Party on the appointment of women as bishops is due to report in November. Other dioceses have now passed similar motions including Guildford, Southwark, Ripon & Leeds and Worcester. Whilst some of us might find this continuing discrimination somewhat outrageous. It is hoped that such a movement might eventually bring about a change in the Church of England.

Meanwhile some disagree. Forward in Faith (FiF) has drafted a General Synod Measure to show that it would be possible for the Church of England to initiate a new province for traditionalists if the General Synod voted to allow women bishops.

They are also calling for a serious piece of work to be done on why Christ's calling of male apostles should have continued as the unvarying tradition of the Church. "We wanted to get behind the tradition and understand why this should be. What is the significance of the maleness of the apostolic ministry?"

The Methodist Faith and Order Group had been invited as observers of the Fif Committee, but they had declined the invitation.

The chairman of Forward in Faith, the Rt Revd John Broadhurst, states that 441 priests resigned using the Financial Provisions Measure 1993, 31 returning, but that the total loss "approaches 600". "Without the Act of Synod, it would have been nearer 2000." The number of lay people who left because of the ordination of women "must surely run into thousands", he says.

From every physical harm.

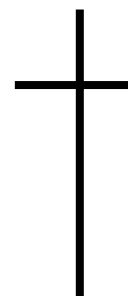
It's not for identification
