Mark 10:45

First Bible Reading - Isaiah 53 v 4 – 12

Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By oppression and judgment he was taken away. And who can speak of his descendants? For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my people he was stricken. He was assigned a grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth. Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, and though the LORD makes his life a guilt offering, he will see his offspring and prolong his days, and the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand. After the suffering of his soul, he will see the light of life and be satisfied; by his knowledge my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities. Therefore I will give him a portion among the great, and he will divide the spoils with the strong, because he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors. For he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading—Hebrews 5: 1-10

Every high priest is selected from among men and is appointed to represent them in matters related to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with those who are ignorant and are going astray, since he himself is subject to weakness. This is why he has to offer sacrifices for his own sins, as well as for the sins of the people. No one takes this honour upon himself; he must be called by God, just as Aaron was. So Christ also did not take upon himself the glory of becoming a high priest. But God said to him, "You are my Son; today I have become your Father." And he says in another place, "You are a priest forever, in the order of Melchizedek." During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with loud cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a son, he learned obedience from what he suffered and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him and was designated by God to be high priest in the order of Melchizedek.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading -Mark 10:35-45 –All: Glory to Christ our Saviour

Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to him. "Teacher," they said, "we want you to do for us whatever we ask." "What do you want me to do for you?" he asked. They replied, "Let one of us sit at your right and the other at your left in your glory." "You don't know what you are asking," Jesus said. "Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptized with the baptism I am

baptized with?" "We can," they answered. Jesus said to them, "You will drink the cup I drink and be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with, but to sit at my right or left is not for me to grant. These places belong to those for whom they have been prepared." When the ten heard about this, they became indignant with James and John. Jesus called them together and said, "You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Mediation

It's easy to forget the origins of some of our church traditions and get to the stage where the traditions themselves become more important to us than the events which they signify. Without realising it, sometimes the most trivial of things begin to take on a meaning and importance for greater than ever intended. One tradition talks of a Buddhist spiritual teacher who, when he and his disciples began their evening meditation, a cat who lived in the monastery made such noise that it distracted them. As a result, one day the teacher asked that the cat be tied up during the evening meditations. Years later, when the teacher died, the cat continued to be tied up during the meditation session. Some time later the cat eventually died, and so another cat was brought to the monastery to be tied up during evening meditations. Centuries later, learned descendants of the spiritual teacher wrote scholarly treatises about the religious significance of tying up a cat for meditation practice. Are there things in our lives that have assumed an importance and significance far greater than we ever intended?

Who is Melchizedek?

Melchizedek is a mysterious and enigmatic figure who first appears in Genesis 14 where he greets Abram and provides him with a royal banquet on Abram's return from rescuing Lot and all his possessions from the four kings who have been at war with the kings of Sodom, Gomorrah, Admah, Zeboiim and Beor and have captured Lot and his family. Melchizedek, in Hebrew malki-sedeq, which can be translated as 'Sedeq is my king', or '(The God) Melek is righteousness' is the King of Salem (or Jerusalem as it became known) and a priest of the 'God Most High'. He blesses Abram and brings him bread and wine and Abram then gives Melchizedek a tenth of everything. In Ps 110 v 4 a Davidic king is proclaimed by the Lord as a 'priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek'. This is by virtue of David's conquest of Jerusalem by which his house becomes heirs to the Melchizedek dynasty of priest-kings. As Jesus is from the house of David, the Davidic Messiah, it follows that He qualifies to be the priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek. The priesthood of Melchizedek is different and distinct from the Aaronic priesthood of the Old Testament in several important ways. The order of Melchizedek is continuous and eternal. It does not need a line of succession in the earthly manner in which the Aaronic priesthood does and is therefore a priesthood of a much higher importance and significance. Secondly, Jesus' qualifications to be the true successor of Melchizedek are not based on tribal alignment. The Aaronic priesthood came from the tribe of Judah, not Levi; Jesus would not have qualified as an Aaronic priest. Thirdly, it is a royal priesthood which adds significant dignity and importance to the high priestly office of Christ. The theologian Guthrie writes, 'The Genesis account of Melchizedek, though mysterious, is nonetheless impressive. Even so he is but a shadow of his great antitype [be better than 'from below' because things that are 'above' always seem to be superior, more senior, more authoritative. Indeed, people who we perceived as being above us can seem to control things, pull the strings and make things happen. Jesus is the God from above and the God from below. His very lowliness and humanity is a living demonstration of His aboveness and His divinity. Jesus Christ]'. As Christians, a priesthood of all believers, it is Christ Himself who is our great High Priest.

Commentary

There is much content in Hebrews, a book primarily written to Jewish Christians, describing how Jesus fits with their model of priesthood. This is not surprising as one of the key themes of Hebrews is how can men and women approach God. For the Jews of the Old Testament covenant this had clearly involved the priesthood and the writer points out the difference between the Aaronic and the Mekchizedeic priesthoods. But in today's passage, the writer of Hebrews, probably a well educated Greek Speaking (Hellenistic) Jew, makes another point. Not only is Jesus the means of our salvation through His heavenly priesthood and His sacrifice, He is the mediator of a new covenant which will give all access to God. To bring that covenant into existence required His incarnation as He came to live with people on earth. Jesus was both fully God and fully man. The very fact that He was fully man meant that he could be an effective high priest. It's clear from today's reading that Jesus went through hard and difficult times yet stuck with the task that He had been given by the Father. And because He was fully man and went through hard times Himself means that he can fully represent the human condition to God. Through His human experience on earth, through His hard times, His trials and His ultimate suffering on the cross He brought a complete understanding of what it means to be human to the Godhead.

Theologians sometime talk of Christology from above and Christology from below. Christology from above emphasises the divinity of Christ and His transcendent eternal nature. Christology from below emphasises the humanity of the Jesus of history as He lived on earth. But we need to be careful, because an over emphasis on either means that we develop an unbalanced and incorrect understanding of Christ. We can also fall into the trap of thinking that 'from above' must

The disciples too appear to have fallen into the trap of thinking rank and 'aboveness' was important to Jesus in their request to sit at his right and left side in glory. They miss the point that the one who is above all became the one who is below all to serve each one of us. In asking to be exalted in heaven they missed the point of service, servanthood and becoming 'a slave of all' on earth. As Christians we are called to be God's leaders on earth, and in so doing we are called not to be above all but below all. It's clear from the reading today that the disciples, especially James and John, found this difficult to grasp. And in today's society, where status and fame seem to be the be all and end all of who we are, it is still difficult to comprehend. Jesus calls us into a life of sharing in serving with Him. Sometimes that will mean that we are placed in positions of authority in order that we can fulfil the role He has called us to. Other times it will mean that we are placed in positions under or along side others, perhaps lower that we expect to be, and sometimes seemingly much below where we believe we should be. But like Christ, we have the opportunity to better understand those we seek to serve and their needs when we truly identify with them, coming along side them as equals. So often we can so easily, if inadvertently, assume a condescending or superior attitude when we serve others from a position of our 'aboveness', or authority. Jesus call all to join with Him in service and to follow His example of becoming the servant of all, wherever that places us in the strata of our society, and at whatever cost that might incur to our ego's and status'. Methodists take action on climate change

Copies of Hope in God's Future – a report and study guide addressing climate change – are flying off the shelves just days after the first printed editions became available. The first print run of the booklet has sold out and Methodist Publishing has ordered a second run.

Hope in God's Future takes the reader on a journey using the changing mood of a worship service as a framework for considering climate change and people's effect on the planet. It outlines the position of the Methodist Church, The Baptist Union and The United Reformed Church on climate change and invites people to see how deeply faith connects with the challenge facing us.

Thaddeus Dell, Carbon Reduction Policy Officer at the Methodist Church, said: "Hope In God's Future gets people to understand the science and how this is linked to our Christian theology. Climate change is the greatest challenge to the Church in our generation. The science is overwhelming and it leads us to a moral obligation. It is especially important for people to engage in these issues ahead of the Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen."

The 2009 Methodist Conference adopted sections one to four of Hope in God's Future as a draft

Conference statement. This means that everyone across the Connexion is invited to comment before it returns to the Conference in 2011.

The study guide offers the full text of the report, as well as ideas for creative activities, inspirational prayers and worship, help and advice for leaders, and suggestions for group sessions lasting one or two evenings or even a whole day.

Archbishop calls for reality check PEOPLE should get out in the rain and more in touch with nature, the Archbishop of Canterbury said this week in a lecture on climate change. "Our response to the crisis needs to be, in the most basic sense, a reality check."

Dr Williams was giving a keynote address at Southwark Cathedral on Tuesday. "When we believe in trans formation at the local and personal level, we are laying the surest foundations for change at the national and international level," he said.

Eight weeks before the crucial UN Climate Change conference in Copenhagen, his lecture was the last chance for the organisers, the Churches' climate-change charity Operation Noah, to attract funding to prevent its closure next month.

Dr Williams said that humanly created climate change was the result of a long process of dislocation from the natural world. To deal with it, the first essential was to recognise that true humanity lay in fulfilling a responsibility as creatures towards creation.

People could and should make choices about their refuse, their travel, and their domestic energy use on the basis that everyone would be impoverished by environmental degradation.

"But I also want to underline the need for us to change our habits enough to make us more aware of the diversity of life around us." One way to do that would be "to make sure we went out of doors in the wet from time to time (a suitable lesson from Noah)". People should "make sure [they] took opportunities of watching the changing of the seasons on the earth's surface". Actions of this kind might seem trivial compared with "the high drama of 'saving the world'", but "we ought to be asking constantly how we restore a sense of association with the material place and time and climate we inhabit and are part of."
