Collect Prayer for the Day

Before we read we pray

Almighty and ever-living God, clothed in majesty, whose beloved Son was this day presented in the Temple, in substance of our flesh: grant that we may be presented to you with pure and clean hearts, by your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Bible Reading - Malachi Chapter 3:1-5

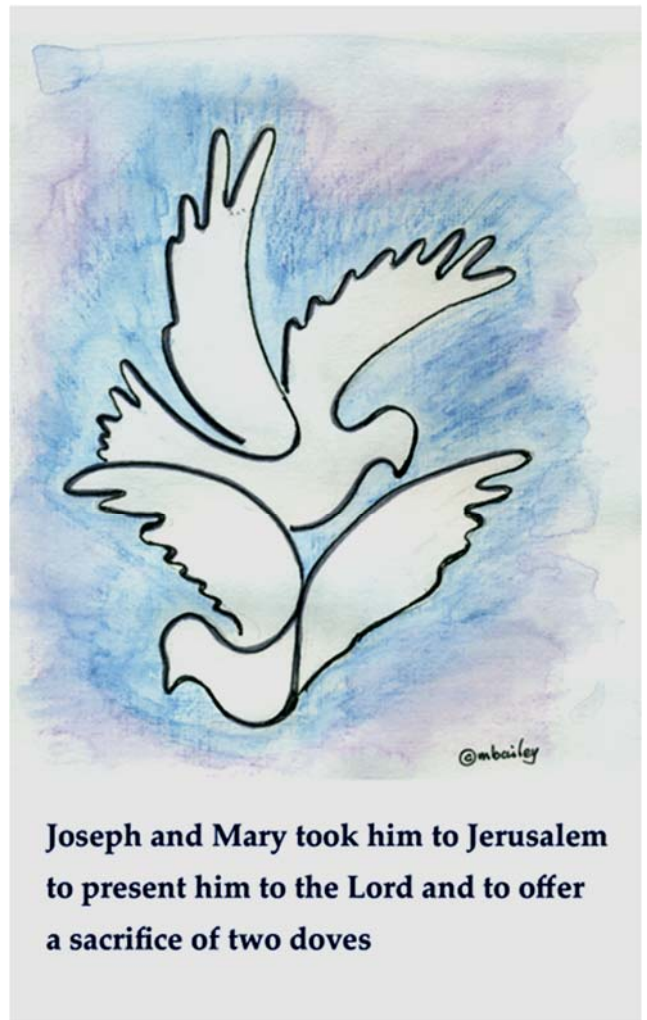
"See, I will send my messenger, who will prepare the way before me. Then suddenly the Lord you are seeking will come to his temple; the messenger of the covenant, whom you desire, will come," says the LORD Almighty. But who can endure the day of his coming? Who can stand when he appears? For he will be like a refiner's fire or a launderer's soap. He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver; he will purify the Levites and refine them like gold and silver. Then the LORD will have men who will bring offerings in righteousness, and the offerings of Judah and Jerusalem will be acceptable to the LORD, as in days gone by, as in former years. "So I will come near to you for judgment. I will be quick to testify against sorcerers, adulterers and perjurers, against those who defraud labourers of their wages, who oppress the widows and the fatherless, and deprive aliens of justice, but do not fear me," says the LORD Almighty. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - Hebrews Chapter 2:14-18

Since the children have flesh and blood, he too shared in their humanity so that by his death he might destroy him who holds the power of death--that is, the devil-- and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death. For surely it is not angels he helps, but Abraham's descendants. For this reason he had to be made like his brothers in every way, in order that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in service to God, and that he might make atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Luke Chapter 2:22-40

When the time of their purification according to the Law of Moses had been completed, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord"), and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Christ. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying: "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." The child's father and mother marvelled at what

was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped night and day, fasting and praying. Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem. When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Post Communion Prayer

Lord, you fulfilled the hope of Simeon and Anna, who lived to welcome the Messiah: may we, who have received these gifts beyond words, prepare to meet Christ Jesus when he comes to bring us to eternal life; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

Commentary

'Do not bear lamps, rather become them'

Candlemas is one of those great church festivals where the liturgical calendar dovetails brilliantly into the yearly calendar. Forty days from the birth of Jesus, in accordance with the Levitical commands, he is presented in the temple and Mary his mother receives her purification. It is on this occasion that Simeon recognises Jesus as the Light which God has prepared for the world. Salvation will now be seen to be for all people and not just something confined to the Jews. Our spiritual life is often described as a pilgrimage or journey of discovery of God, at this moment the soul searching has ended for Simeon and he found the meaning of life. Looking at Jesus he is gazing directly into the eyes of God. This is the start of a magnificent new age and no wonder that Simeon in the words we know as the Nunc Dimittis declares that now he is prepared to die in peace. He has seen it all, there is nothing which can top being face to face with the Saviour of all the world !

So at Candlemas we light candles and celebrate the fact that darkness is banished in the presence of God's one true light. The world has seen that God keeps his promises and even though Simeon predicts that the road ahead will be difficult, nevertheless salvation is now present and God is recognised in the midst of the people. For Simeon this was a message of fulfillment of all that he had hoped and longed for. Even though the immediate road ahead was still dark, there was a clear light at the end of the tunnel. That is how this time of the year is for us in the progression of the seasons. Candlemas is a time when we are now halfway through winter, we are at mid point between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. The winter is not over yet, not nearly, and for that reason we play games like Groundhog Day, which remind us that winter might still have a fight in her. Yet nevertheless the power of winter has been broken because time is running out, soon the days will be getting longer and longer and the sun will rise higher in the sky, spreading warmth and light. There could be no better time in the year to remind ourselves that the power of sin has been broken and God has drawn near to his people to dispel fear and death.

The theme of Candlemas is therefore light and we light candles and bless them and remind ourselves that Jesus is truly the light of all the world. However Candlemas is also a great time to remind ourselves that these candles are only symbolic. Lighting candles will only be of any purpose if that act of lighting is a prayer. Prayer that process of giving ourselves to God, we pray constantly because we are in the process of turning ourselves into lights for God in the world. In 1 Thessalonians we are told that we should pray 'without ceasing.' This helps us to understand what prayer is, not an endless repetition of words bothering God for things, but rather an orientation of lives, a mindfulness of God being present with us in the here and now of of daily living, our choices and experiences. It is no coincidence that it is in the midst of a this Bible passage which stresses the importance of good daily living such as not being idle or disruptive, helping those who are weaker than ourselves and doing good to others, that we are told to pray continually. *Charles Royden*

Behold then, the candle alight in Simeon's hands. You must light your own candles by enkindling them at his, those lamps which the Lord commanded you to bear in your hands. So come to him and be

enlightened that you do not so much bear lamps as become them, shining within yourself and radiating light to your neighbours. May there be a lamp in your heart, in your hand and in your mouth: let the lamp in your heart shine for yourself, the lamp in your hand and mouth shine for your neighbours. The lamp in your heart is a reverence for God inspired by faith; the lamp in your hand is the example of a good life; and the lamp in your mouth are the words of consolation you speak.

Then, when the lamp of this mortal life is extinguished, there will appear for you who had so many lamps shining within you the light of unquenchable life, and it will shine for you at the evening of your life like the brightness of the noonday sun. *Guerric of Igny c.1070-1157 Quoted from Celebrating the Seasons*

Meditation

On tweeting and touching by Archbishop Justin Welby

In a process of reconciliation in which I was involved recently, one of the questions that people were asked (quite a standard question in these circumstances where the disputes are within the church) was, "What has this dispute done to your soul?" You could adapt the question to different sorts of disputes, not least by changing the word 'soul' to 'spirit' or 'inner self' or something like that. But it is a very valid question: the impact of conflict is not only external, but deeply internal. It causes trauma and lasting damage even where there has been no physical violence.

I will remember for a long time a letter I received in the last few years from someone who'd gone through a particularly difficult conflict in the church. It was full of what can only be described as deep trauma and sorrow. It had been deeply damaging. There were lots of reasons for this, but one that has been on my mind recently has to do with electronic media that we value enormously – Twitter, blogs (this is after all a blog), email, text and all the other ways in which our communications have been made more or less global and instant. (I am aware of numerous other forms but don't want to end up sounding like an advertisement for particular apps). The trouble is that subtleties, tone and access all get muddled up. That's not a new comment - it's been said many times - but every now and then things happen which make it even clearer. The subtleties we lose when we communicate electronically have to do with expression, with touch, with the face-to-face aspect of relationship. Social media does not show tears in the eye, a hand on the arm when saying something painful, body language that speaks of inner turmoil, deep distress – even gentle respect. It is simply there – usually forever.

Certainly within the church, that is not the way the bible teaches us to disagree. Disagreements always happen: they always have, and always will – we only need to read the Acts of the Apostles and the letters in the New Testament to see that. But the best examples of disagreement and strain are dealt with personally. The Gospel of Matthew, chapter 18, sets out the pattern. It starts with personal meetings, and goes on to wider disciplines. It sets something in motion; a new stage of relationship. Print and electronic media is often just static and there, often indelibly, locking us into a permanent present tense that hinders healing. Tone is equally difficult to achieve; electronic media has no volume control. The US President Teddy Roosevelt spoke of speaking softly and carrying a big stick. Electronic media speaks loudly and carries a big stick – through it we have no other means of speaking, especially in the compressed form that is often used.

For disputes within church communities, Jesus in Matthew's Gospel makes it quite clear that personal interaction is essential – yet all of us feel that when someone has done something wrong, we should all say so! Electronic media breaks through locked doors, and pierces people painfully. It is not for all of us to set everyone right on everything. There's a point at which we need to leave it to those who know people to speak to them personally and quietly – in spaces where the tone is subtle and full of love. That is how people can be put back together rather than torn apart and left lying around in electronic media space. Love often says don't tweet. Love often says don't write. Love often says if you must rebuke, then do so in person and with touch – with an arm around the shoulder and tears in your eyes that can be seen by the person being rebuked.

We pray that the life of your church may be centred on faithful worship, In the company of his parents Jesus grew, became strong, and was filled with wisdom. We pray that all who are pierced by any kind of suffering may know your love and reach to you for strength. Your servant Simeon departed in peace. We ask your peace for all who have departed this life to begin a new one in the light of your presence.

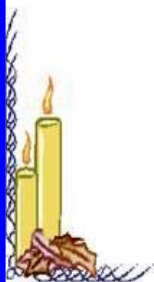
