Opening Verse of Scripture - 2 Corinthians 8

For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich.

Collect Prayer *Before we read we pray*

Second Reading - 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

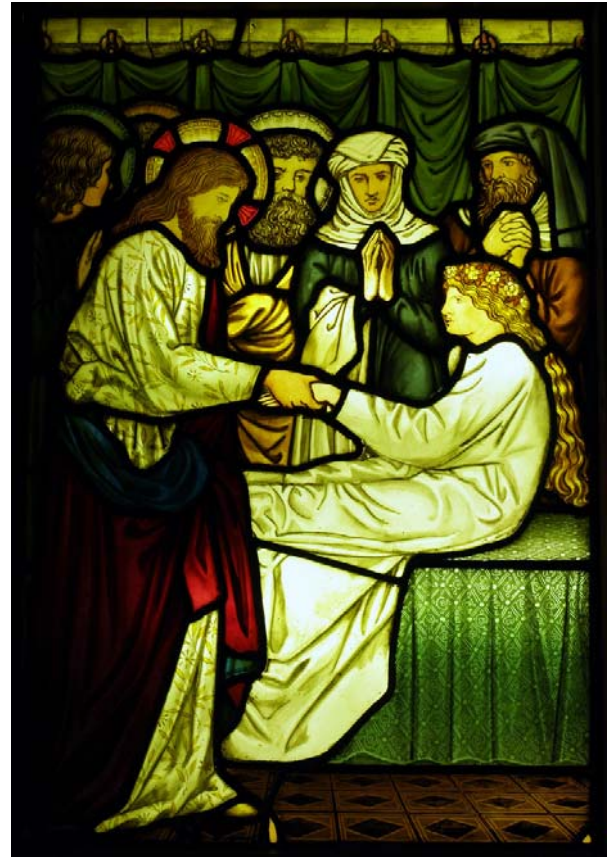
But just as you excel in everything--in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us see that you also excel in this grace of giving. I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich. And here is my advice about what is best for you in this matter: Last year you were the first not only to give but also to have the desire to do so. Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means. For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have.

Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. Then there will be equality, as it is written: "He who gathered much did not have too much, and he who gathered little did not have too little.

Gospel Reading - Mark 5:21-43

When Jesus had again crossed over by boat to the other side of the lake, a large crowd gathered around him while he was by the lake. Then one of the synagogue rulers, named Jairus, came there. Seeing Jesus, he fell at his feet and pleaded earnestly with him, "My little daughter is dying. Please come and put your hands on her so that she will be healed and live." So Jesus went with him. A large crowd followed and pressed around him. And a woman was there who had been

subject to bleeding for twelve years. She had suffered a great deal under the care of many doctors and had spent all she had, yet instead of getting better she grew worse. When she heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, because she thought, "If I just touch his clothes, I will be healed." Immediately her bleeding stopped and she felt in her body that she was freed from her suffering. At once Jesus realized that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd and asked, "Who touched my clothes?"

"You see the people crowding against you," his disciples answered, "and yet you can ask, 'Who touched me?'" But Jesus kept looking around to see who had done it. Then the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came and fell at his feet and, trembling with fear, told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering."

While Jesus was still speaking, some men came from the house of Jairus, the synagogue ruler. "Your daughter is dead," they said. "Why bother the teacher any more?" Ignoring what they said, Jesus told the synagogue ruler, "Don't be afraid; just believe." He did not let anyone follow him except Peter, James and John the brother of James.

When they came to the home of the synagogue ruler, Jesus saw a commotion, with people crying and wailing loudly. He went in and said to them, "Why all this commotion and wailing? The child is not dead but asleep." But they laughed at him. After he put them all out, he took the child's father and mother and the disciples who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum!" (which means, "Little girl, I say to you, get up!"). Immediately the girl stood up and walked around (she was twelve years old). At this they were completely astonished. He gave strict orders not to let anyone know about this, and told them to give her something to eat. (This is the word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God.**)

Commentary

This is some of what William Barclay has to say about the gospel reading.

"Beyond a doubt Jairus came to Jesus when everything else had failed. He was a ruler of the synagogue; that is to say, he was a pillar of Jewish orthodoxy. He was one of the men who despised and hated Jesus, and who would have been glad to see Him eliminated. No doubt he tried every kind of doctor, and every kind of cure; and only in sheer desperation, and as a last resort, did he come to Jesus at all. That is to say, *he came to Jesus from a very inadequate motive*. He did not come to Jesus as a result of an outflow of the love of his heart; he came to Jesus because he had tried everything and everyone else, and because there was nowhere else to go.

The woman with the issue of blood crept up behind Jesus in the crowd and touched the hem of His cloak. Suppose we were reading that story with a detached and critical faculty awake, what would we say that the woman showed? We would say that she showed nothing other than superstition. To touch the edge of Jesus' cloak is the same kind of thing as to look for healing power in the relics and the handkerchiefs of saints. *This woman came to Jesus with what we would call a very inadequate faith*. If we regard this with the eye of criticism, we see in it some thing which is much more like superstition than faith. The lovely thing about this story is that from the moment Jesus was face to face with the woman, there seems to be nobody there but He and she. It happened in the middle of the crowd; but the crowd was forgotten and Jesus spoke to the woman and treated her as if she was the only person in the world. She was a poor, unimportant sufferer, with a trouble that made her unclean, and yet to that one unimportant person, Jesus gave all of Himself. Almost everybody would have regarded the woman in the crowd as totally unimportant. For Jesus she was someone in need, and therefore He, as it were, withdrew from the

crowd, and gave Himself to her. "God loved each one of us as if there was only one of us to love." Here is another astonishing thing. Jairus came to Jesus with an *inadequate motive*; the woman came to Jesus with an *inadequate faith*; and yet they found His love and power waiting for their needs. Here we see a tremendous thing. It does not matter how we come to Christ, if we only come. No matter how inadequately and how imperfectly we come, His love and His arms are open to receive us. There is a double lesson here. It means that we do not wait to ask the help of Christ for life until our motives, our faith, our theology is perfect; we can come to him exactly as we are. And it means that we have no right to criticize others whose motives we suspect, whose faith we question, and whose theology we believe to be mistaken. It is not how we come to Christ that matters; it is that we should come at all, for He is willing to accept us as we are, and He is able to make us what we ought to be."

Tom Wright adds a P.S. about these two miracles.

"Jesus wasn't coming to be a one-man emergency medical centre. He was indeed starting a revolution, and he was indeed bringing God's healing power, but his aim went deeper; these things were signs of the real revolution, the real healing, that God was to accomplish through his death and resurrection. Signposts are important but they aren't the destination"

From Methodist Conference

At the opening of the annual Methodist Conference in Plymouth on Saturday, the Revd Dr Mark Wakelin spoke of a Church that has never given up on him and challenged Methodists to make it a place where people are welcomed as they are. Giving his inaugural address as President of the Methodist Conference, Dr Wakelin said: "We need, all need, the same thing. I recognise the older I get that I am needy and it is the Church that has met that need and for that I am very grateful. Dr Wakelin added: "One of my needs is a profound need to belong; to feel that somebody, somewhere knows who I am and cares. At different times through the Methodist Church I have experienced belonging.

Speaking of the ways in which the Church has always challenged him to better things, he said: "God loves you as you are, but too much to leave you that way. I am grateful to the Church that it has never believed that I have done my best. I have never believed that. Because the Church always has disquiet; a sense that there is more; there is yet more in you; there is more to come.

"I am grateful to this Church that it has never given up. There is a challenge there still to believe in people even though you have been let down." (*You can see the full text on the Methodist Church website*)

Footprints next walk on Sunday 1 July 2012 starting at 2.30pm is an interesting 3 mile walk centred on the ancient woodland of Marston Thrift. The route follows both existing Rights of Way and permissive paths within the woodland and across the countryside to the village of Cranfield. Marston Thrift is situated on the clay soil of the ridge and the paths can become very boggy during periods of excessive rain. The Marston Thrift car park is the starting point for this walk and this is situated at Wood End, which is just off the old A421 approximately 4 miles north-east of junction 13 of the M1. From Bedford travel to the Little Chef roundabout on the old A421 where it ceased to be a dual carriageway (and can now be accessed from the new A421 exit to Marston Moretaine)., and take the road towards Husborne Crawley and the M1. Take the first turn right, which is signposted to Wood End and follow the winding road for 1.7 miles over the new road to the end where you will see the car park on the right. Should you begin to have doubts, think you are in the middle of nowhere and must have gone wrong, take heart you are on the right road. For further details contact Pam or Ray on 305695.

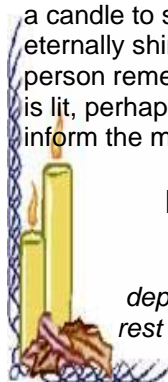
