Mission Sunday is a time to look back at the Mission activities of the churches over the past year and to give thanks to God for His generosity to us and in turn thank all those who have been involved in supporting mission in our churches over the last year through their unselfish giving of money, time and effort. Through all of these efforts we have given over £5300 to Mission from the Partnership in the last year. To this needs to be added activities and giving such as Christian Aid and the many other unseen mission projects we are quietly involved in as individuals and groups. To all those involved, and to all those who gave so generously, either to specific projects or through the weekly offerings or standing orders, to those who organise and participate in coffee mornings and sponsored events, to those who work tirelessly and faithfully in the background for mission in our Partnership; thank you.

Looking forward, we will continue with our regular mission activities at each church. Please let one of the ministers know if you would like to be involved in a more practical way in our mission activities. This year for our mission focus we want to extend our support for the work at the King's Arms project in Bedford. Details of how individuals and groups can contribute and 'share' in this project are given in the letters to be found at the back of the church and we look forward to work together to take a significant and positive change to those in Bedford who are struggling and have become homeless and need our support to break away from the streets and move on into their own accommodation.

On this Mission Sunday we look back at the past year with gratefulness and look forward to the challenge ahead with excitement and anticipation. Our God is a generous God and we are called to be stewards of His Kingdom here on earth. And as we do so, we become part of God's ultimate mission, the restoration of His creation, whether in Bedford, Europe, Africa or beyond, a restoration which includes the whole earth and everyone on it. Now that's a mission challenge! *Sam Cappleman*

Mediation Some thoughts about the Kings Arms Project from Ali Inwood

Established in 1989, this year marks 20 years of King's Arms Project's work here in Bedford with the homeless and disadvantaged. The Project has always been a ministry of the church, and although we are now a well established professional charity we are still very much a church ministry. Throughout the history of the Project, our vision has been to see the fulfilment of God's promises for the poor, described in Isaiah 61: liberty to the captives; gladness instead of mourning; instead of despair - praise; instead of shame - a double portion; instead of dishonour - rejoicing. In other words our vision is 'to see lives transform'.

We work with people from a wide range of backgrounds who have become homeless and need our support to break away from the streets and move on into their own accommodation - living as a contributing member of their local community. Time and time again we have seen transformation in the lives of those the world has given up on. At King's Arms Project we don't believe there is any such thing as a hopeless case.

We work with rough sleepers and the homeless at many stages, supporting people with issues such as drug or alcohol addiction, literacy and educational needs, family breakdown, health and mental health needs, managing debt and finances and so on. The most important thing is tailor making our support to each and

every individual – not having a conveyor-belt approach but really building relationships and understanding each person we support, and working with them to discover the way forward.

We run:

- **Rough Sleepers Outreach Service** – our two support workers go out to find and engage with the ‘hardest-to-reach’ street homeless clients, helping them to access services and support. This is essential to make sure no one slips through the net.
- **Friday Night Meeting** – it’s basically ‘church on the street’ – a weekly hot two-course meal for 40 – 50 rough sleepers and homeless clients, or those with a homeless background. At this meeting we meet practical needs, build community and real relationships, and provide opportunity to hear a gospel talk and receive prayer. Often this is the first time people have heard about the God who loves them.
- **The Nightshelter** – 18-bed overnight accommodation for rough sleepers. The aim is to meet the crucial needs of a bed, food, showers and safety while restoring dignity and offering support that gives residents the confidence and skills to move on. We have a visiting Doctor, housing clinics, and support to get help in any area – but most importantly it is a place where people can experience the acceptance and love and have hope for the future restored.
- **Barton House** – our 14-bed hostel provides supported accommodation for between 30 – 40 residents per year. Barton House becomes the resident’s home for up to 2 years and here they can address the issues that brought about their homelessness, as well as getting trained up for the future. Each resident has an individual support plan and keyworkers to help them do this. It is at Barton House that we run ‘Pathways’. This is an in-house training programme tackling essential lifeskills such as Literacy and Numeracy, DIY and Home Maintenance, Healthy Living and Eating and Computer Skills alongside courses that build confidence and encourage positive activities such as Outdoor Activities, Art, and Music.
- **Onward Floating Support** – This is intensive one to one support which goes out into the community with each person, helping them access and maintain suitable accommodation and assisting them to get back into meaningful occupation – be it education, employment or volunteer work. Onward works with the client at all stages of housing and often the longest period of support is once the client is in their own flat or house: supporting them to maintain their new accommodation and get back into living as part of their local community. Highly successful, Onward sees clients break away from addictions, crime and the cycle of homelessness and settle into a new way of living.

But of course, it takes money to do these things. Although we are funded from grants, awards and the Borough Council (Supporting People), we rely heavily on fundraising and most importantly: individual giving. It is this support that makes our work possible and allows us to really work out what we see the bible calls us to: to love the poor and poor in spirit.

Here’s a list to help you see where some of the money goes:

- £15 provides food for a week for a Nightshelter resident
- £25 provides food for a week for a Barton House resident
- £110 provides a place on one of our ‘Pathways’ Life Skills courses
- £136 per week to run the Friday Night Meeting for 50 guests – it costs £520 to run Friday Night Meeting for a month – just over £3000 to run it for 6 months.
- £250 provides floating support for a client for 1 month

All Saints is a yearly celebration in which we are encouraged to remember that we are literally 'all saints!'

We tend to think of people like Mother Theresa as saints. They are special because their lives reflect the very best of human behaviour. As we think of them and the way that they lived we are encouraged to be more like them. We think of them as being holy, in the sense of living special godly lives, separated from the grubbiness of usual daily living. This is all well and good but we need to also remember that you and I are saints as well. We might not live such remarkable lives as Mother Theresa, but we are still saints. This is because we are already holy by virtue of being God's children. We do not have to work hard trying to become God's children, we already are! In the same way that a child might work hard to please their parents, so we will want our lives to measure up, but we are already God's, we are already saints because we call Him father. At this time of year we admire saints, we use them as role models to encourage ourselves that we can do better. But we do not lose sight of our special kinship to God.
