Collect Prayer for the Day

Before we read we pray

Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: grant us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living that we may come to those inexpressible joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Bible Reading Isaiah Chapter 25:6-9

Second Bible Reading - Revelation Chapter 21:1-6

Then I saw "a new heaven and a new earth," for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. 'He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death' or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." He who was seated on the throne said, "I am making everything new!" Then he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." He said to me: "It is done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End. To the thirsty I will give water without cost from the spring of the water of life. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)



For all the Saints

History was created last week with the consecration of seven new statues of Christian martyrs. It is a unique occurrence for painted figures to be placed in a church screen since the desecrations of the Reformation and the English Civil War.

St Alban Britain's first Saint, a citizen of Roman Verulamium, martyred by the Romans on the site of the Cathedral.

St Amphibalus The Christian priest to whom Alban gave shelter in the third century AD when Christianity was still proscribed

George Tankerfield A Protestant, burnt to death outside the west front of the abbey in 1555 because of his refusal to accept the restoration of Roman Catholicism under Mary

St Alban Roe A Roman Catholic, imprisoned for a time in St Albans Abbey Gatehouse and hanged in London in 1642, having been found guilty of treason for being a Roman Catholic priest

St Elisabeth Romanova A granddaughter of Queen Victoria who married into the Russian Royal Family and converted to the Russian Orthodox Church, who in her widowhood became a nun and Abbess, and was murdered by the Bolsheviks in 1918

Dietrich Bonhoeffer Lutheran pastor and theologian imprisoned in a concentration camp for his opposition to the Nazis, tried without witness or defence and executed by hanging in April 1945

Oscar Romero Roman Catholic Archbishop of El Salvador, who spoke out against poverty, social injustice and torture of the totalitarian regime in his country, and was assassinated in 1980 while celebrating Mass. The beatification of Oscar Romero was declared in San Salvador on 23 May

Gospel Reading - John 11:32-44

When Mary reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved in spirit and troubled. "Where have you laid him?" he asked.

"Come and see, Lord," they replied. Jesus wept. Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" Jesus Raises Lazarus From the Dead Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. "Take away the stone," he said. "But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days." Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go."

Commentary

If the extensive display of Halloween merchandise in a number of shops is anything to go by the popularity of this festival, which in the main focuses on the darker side of life and death, has increased significantly over the last 30 years or so. When my own children were small I saw no harm in them dressing up as witches or skeletons then knocking on neighbours doors expecting to receive a treat. I don't think 'tricking' was much on their mind, rather the expectation of the suitably prepared neighbour giving them sweets. Today I have concerns about the degree to which the ability to frighten children and adults through the products sold has developed. Several years ago, when I went to buy a birthday card in a branch of a chain of card shops, I was so taken aback by the imitation 'tomb stones' on display that I raised my concerns with the shop assistants (who of course have no say in what they sell) that I have never been into one of those shops again.

In sharp contrast to this are two Christian festivals about life and death we celebrate around the same time as Halloween. All Saints Day on 1st November, All Souls Day on the 2nd November and, as we do in the Partnership, give thanks for the lives of those who have died who we have loved and known. 'All Saints Day' was first introduced some 1400 years ago to remember all martyrs, then 200 years later the date was changed from 13th May to 1st November and changed to the 'Feast of All Saints'. It is the emphasis on 'All Saints', those living and those who have died which seems to me the appropriate approach today. 'All Souls Day' is more specifically a day to remember those who have died, hence our service later today of 'The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed', which is valued by many people who come to give thanks for their own loved ones and where, through God's grace, they may receive both comfort and hope. Hope in a new everlasting life, where, as promised in the word of God: 'There he will wipe every tear from their eyes'.

Tears, in life and death go together. Tears can, of course be shed as 'tears of joy', perhaps on the birth of a new baby, or on greeting a much loved family member, or friend, who we have not seen for a long time. Again 'tears of laughter' are not uncommon when enjoying a really funny comedian, or through an

unexpected but funny experience. In the context of today's Bible readings we are thinking about 'tears of sorrow'. Whether it be the tears shed on the news that you, or a loved one, is dying; or the tears shed on, or after the death of a loved one; or the tears shed when seeing the senseless loss of life and dignity of the refugees fleeing many forms of persecution, God's word offers comfort and hope. The words of praise, as written in Isaiah 25: 6 – 9, look beyond the suffering of God's people 'by ruthless nations' (25:3) to the time when the Lord Almighty 'will swallow up death for ever' and where 'The Sovereign Lord will wipe away every tear'. This, declares the writer, 'is our God; we trusted in him, and he saved us' (v9). Words that surely describe a 'Saint', a saint being one who trusts and believes in God and his Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Gospel reading John 11: 32 - 44 gives a moving account of tears shed on the death of a much loved brother and friend, Lazarus, whilst going on to describe his incredible restoring to life by his friend Jesus. John is the only gospel writer to record this specific event, which is interesting. One plausible reason that has been suggested for this is that, the other gospel writers did not record it to protect Lazarus, but by the time John wrote his gospel that danger had passed. Tears of grief, in this account, were shed not only by family and friends present at the time but by Jesus. Described in the shortest sentence in the NT as 'Jesus wept', or in a more dramatic translation by Bishop Tom Wright as: 'Jesus broke down in tears'. Jesus the Son of God, with all that this implies, is reduced to tears. Some have suggested these may have been tears of despair that Lazarus' sisters, Mary and Martha, mistakenly did not trust that Jesus would arrive in time to save their brother. Perhaps it was a mixture of both grief and despair. Within this account of Jesus raising Lazarus to life there are several similarities to the accounts of Jesus' own resurrection, with one clear distinction being Lazarus would die again, but Jesus comes through death into a new sort of life. A new life which earlier, in John 1: 25- 26, Jesus tells the grieving Martha: "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?". Martha replies: "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world."

In the NT the early Christians, like Martha, were described as 'saint's, or 'God's holy people'. Saints who went on to tell others what they believed, those of us today who believe and trust in Jesus are also expected to try and pass on what we believe to others, including the promise of eternal life, which the writer of Revelations 21: 3 - 4 describes as:

'God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. 'He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away.'

Meditation

Now let us take the idea of eternal life. It is far better to speak of eternal life than to speak of everlasting life. The main idea behind eternal life is not simply that of duration. It is quite clear that a life which went on for ever could just as easily be hell as heaven. The idea behind eternal life is the idea of a certain quality, a certain kind of life. What kind of life? There is only one person who can properly be described by this adjective eternal (aionios) and that one person is God. Eternal life is the kind of life that God lives; it is God's life. To enter into eternal life is to enter into possession of that kind of life which is the life of God. It is to be lifted up above merely human, temporary, passing, transient things, into that joy and peace which belong only to God. William Barclay, *The Gospel of John*, volume 1.

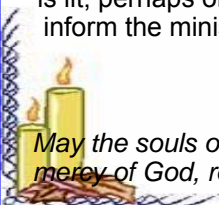

All Saints is a yearly celebration in which we are encouraged to remember that we are literally 'all saints!'

We tend to think of people like Mother Theresa as saints. They are special because their lives reflect the very best of human behaviour. As we think of them and the way that they lived we are encouraged to be more like them. We think of them as being holy, in the sense of living special godly lives, separated from the grubbiness of usual daily living.

This is all well and good but we need to also remember that you and I are saints as well. We might not live such remarkable lives as Mother Theresa, but we are still saints. This is because we are already holy by virtue of being God's children. We do not have to work hard trying to become God's children, we already are! In the same way that a child might work hard to please their parents, so we will want our lives to measure up, but we are already God's, we are already saints because we call Him father.

At this time of year we admire saints, we use them as role models to encourage ourselves that we can do better. But we do not lose sight of our special kinship to God.
