Fourth Sunday of Advent

Opening Verses of Scripture—Psalm 80:19

Restore us, O LORD God Almighty; make your face shine upon us, that we may be saved.

First Bible Reading - Micah Chapter 5:2-5

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times." Therefore Israel will be abandoned until the time when she who is in labour gives birth and the rest of his brothers return to join the Israelites. He will stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they will live securely, for then his greatness will reach to the ends of the earth. And he will be their peace. When the Assyrian invades our land and marches through our fortresses, we will raise against him seven shepherds, even eight leaders of men
(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Hebrews Chapter 10:5-10

Therefore, when Christ came into the world, he said: "Sacrifice and offering you did not desire, but a body you prepared for me; with burnt offerings and sin offerings you were not pleased. Then I said, 'Here I am--it is written about me in the scroll-- I have come to do your will, O God.'" First he said, "Sacrifices and offerings, burnt offerings and sin offerings you did not desire, nor were you pleased with them" (although the law required them to be made). Then he said, "Here I am, I have come to do your will." He sets aside the first to establish the second. And by that will, we have been made holy through the sacrifice of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.
(Reader: This is the word of the Lord -- **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Luke Chapter 1:39-45 -All –Glory TO Christ our Saviour

At that time Mary got ready and hurried to a town in the hill country of Judea, where she entered Zechariah's home and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the baby leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. In a loud voice she exclaimed: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the child you will bear! But why am I so favoured, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? As soon as the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed is she who has believed that what the Lord has said to her will be accomplished!" And Mary said: "My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant. From now on all generations will call me blessed, for the Mighty One has done great things for me-- holy is his name. His mercy extends to those who fear him, from generation to generation. He has performed mighty deeds with his arm; he has scattered those who are proud in their inmost thoughts. He has brought down rulers from their thrones but has lifted up the humble. He has filled the hungry with good things but has sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, remembering to be merciful to Abraham and his descendants forever, even as he said to our fathers." Mary stayed with Elizabeth for about three months and then returned home.

(Reader: This is the Gospel of Christ - **All: Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Meditation From today's Micah reading:

Thus says the Lord: "You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah, too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel.... He shall be peace."

Reflection: When we celebrate the birth of the Promised One from small and insignificant Bethlehem, we might also celebrate and commit to his way – as the old song goes, "Give Peace a Chance."

Start by thinking small, the way God did. Give peace a chance in the small ways of our daily lives. Try disarming our hearts by seeking understanding and reconciliation in our relationships.

So we ask ourselves:

1. What in my daily words and acts reflects anger and an unrestful spirit?
2. How can I begin to change so as to be more an instrument of God's peace?

Commentary

Imagine a people waiting and waiting for God to send a liberator to free them from their oppressed and poor lives. Imagine their dreams and whispered hopes about how God would do it: a warrior with a vast army would come to lead them to freedom and prosperity. At the time the prophet Micah prophesied, 800 years before Christ, the people could certainly have used some decisive action by God. They were oppressed, not only by the Assyrians, but by their own corrupt, wealthy merchants. In addition, their religious practices, while well-prepared and properly performed were empty. The people were left spiritually and physically desperate.

Micah, along with his contemporary prophet Isaiah, had denounced the unfaithfulness and sins of the people which, they preached, had caused the current dire situation in which the people found themselves. But Micah also reminded people of God's faithful love. Today we hear Micah getting more specific about God's salvation. But what nerve! Instead of promising the coming of a mighty rescuer, born in a great city like Rome, a commercial centre like Corinth, or a religious capital like Jerusalem, the one who is coming will be born in Bethlehem (also called Ephrathah); which even the prophet admits is "two small" to be of any significance. It's just like God to work contrary to human expectation. We invest in size and power; God invests in the lowly and insignificant. Which way will survive; which way bring us lasting life?

This is not the first time God has chosen the diminutive Bethlehem to begin a work of rescue and renewal. Bethlehem was where Jesse, the father of David the Shepherd King, was born. Once again, Micah promises, God will draw from Bethlehem another Shepherd King, "one who is to be ruler in Israel." This one will not be an iron-fisted ruler, instead "he shall be peace." We respond to what God is about to do with a sigh of relief and anticipation, "Thank God!"

We humans have tried to extend our rule and dominance over one another and nations by the use of military might and economic muscle. We have hardly created states of peace throughout the world, in our local communities, or for some of us, even in our own families. We need to commit to another course of action, one which at first may appear or feel impotent and with little hope of success. When we celebrate the birth of the promised one from Bethlehem, we might also celebrate and commit to his way – as the old song goes, we might, "Give Peace a Chance."

We could start by thinking small, the way God did. Give peace a chance in the small ways of our daily lives. Try disarming our hearts and our relationships by seeking understanding and reconciliation. Use less violent and volume-intense language at home. Bridge a gap – go out of our way to meet the "other" in our parish or school. Defuse conversations or change the subject when the topic turns on "them." ("The problem with them is....")

It seems that once God chooses a course of action God repeats the act again and again. The story of the Israelites and their prophets, like Micah, and his prediction about Bethlehem, is an often-told tale: God works among the small and insignificant to accomplish God's intentions. Luke will also repeat this theme throughout his gospel.

Today Luke focuses on Nazareth, a small coastal village the world would have forgotten had Mary not come from there. It was in Nazareth Mary received the angel's announcement about her bearing, "the One who would deliver his people." That same angel announced another "small event": her aged kinswoman Elizabeth was also pregnant. So, hearing this improbable message and believing it, Mary sets off to visit Elizabeth—today's story.

God doesn't choose the high and mighty to accomplish God's plans. If that were so, they could claim some part in the successful completion of the tasks God put to them. Instead, God turns to the least likely so that we will know how the deed got done. The chosen one says, "Yes" to God and then God sets to work in and through them. Since they can't claim credit for what they did, God's chosen instrument has nothing to say except, "Thank you"

Jesus didn't need a woman of rank and power to be his mother; he needed a docile, gentle and strong spirit who would say "Yes" to God, no matter how improbable the goal at hand seemed. Mary, like all the faithful people, starting with Abraham and Sarah, trusted that God could fulfill God's promises. Like us, she was asked to "step out in faith," to take a risk based on her trust in God. In her act of trust she reveals for us a name for God: "Constant Fidelity."

Micah promises God will send a shepherd to rule and guide the people. A shepherd not only leads, but protects the defenceless sheep. Jesus will be that firm, gentle shepherd. Since he is born among humble people, from an insignificant place, he will not forget his origins and his life will be characterized by his sensitivity to the outcast, poor and scattered.

Joy characterizes the encounter between Mary and Elizabeth. It's not a jubilation stirred up by a great victory over a vanquished enemy with the sharing of spoils. Instead, it's the more profound joy that appears in the Bible when God's work is accomplished by the faithful. It's David's joyful dance before the ark of the covenant (2 Samuel 6:14-15) in celebration of God's mighty deeds for Israel. Now it is Elizabeth and Mary's moment of joy, expressing the work of the Holy Spirit and the beginning of the time of fulfilment. The signs were clear to these two faithful ones: God was present and working on behalf of the lowly—and that's the reason to be joyful, or in imitation of David before the ark, reason to do a little skip and jump for joy!

Will we ever have peace on earth and goodwill towards all, or is Micah's proclamation an empty promise? So much time has elapsed since Mary made that trip and hope was stirred at Elizabeth's greeting. But where shall we look on the globe to find nations not in conflict, or living under the cloud of future conflict? Certainly not in Afghanistan, Iraq, the Middle East, Russia, China, Africa, or even our own country.

Still we express our hope, as impossible as it often seems, that one day we shall live in that promised, peaceable Kingdom, ruled by the One we call in this season, the "Prince of Peace." In the meanwhile, we will live our hope in concrete ways so as to manifest our longing: forgiving those who have offended us and reaching out to the neediest.

After all, what Elizabeth said to Mary is also said over us today, "Blessed are you who believe that what was spoken to you by the Lord will be fulfilled." Mary was blessed because she believed what was told her and trusted God's promises for herself and God's people. Advent encourages Mary's virtues in us: to trust, believe, wait in patience and hope in God's fidelity towards us. Mary's first response to the angel's message was to humbly receive it and give her consent. But her patience and trust do not cause her to sit back to see what God would do next. She responded to what she heard and set out to visit Elizabeth; she acted on the word she heard.

While we also trust and wait patiently on God we do not sit back and do nothing. Withdrawal from the world is the vocation of only a few monastic Christians. Meanwhile, the rest of us engage the world and do what we can to resist the evil we meet. Being a people of Advent hope means we perceive and feel the pain of the world and do something to end it – no matter how small our response seems to us.

Today's gospel scene is often called, "The Visitation"—the meeting of two people on a deeply personal and spiritual level. This Christmas time might be an occasion to reach out to someone we care for and share the good news with them of our God's gracious deeds. Or, perhaps there is someone who is struggling with a personal issue to whom we can give a listening ear. Mary's visit was a blessing to Elizabeth, as ours can be for another. We also praise God today for those who came to visit us in a time of need and through their visit brought a blessing of peace and the rekindling of faith in us. Like Mary we can be Christ-bearers to one another.

Prayers for Sunday and the Week Ahead

God, in the name of the one who gave bread to the hungry, we remember all, who through our human ignorance, folly, and sin are condemned to live in want. Show us, who have so much, what we can do to help those who have so little; and bless the efforts of those who work to overcome poverty and hunger, that sufficient food may be found for all; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Church of Scotland

All-powerful God, let the splendour of your glory rise in our hearts like the dawn, that the darkness of the night may be scattered and the coming of your only Son may reveal us as children of the light. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God now and for ever. Amen.
