
Easter 4

Introductory Sentence - Psalm 23

The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want

Collect Prayer for the Day—Before we read we pray

Risen Christ, faithful shepherd of your Father's sheep: teach us to hear your voice and to follow your command, that all your people may be gathered into one flock, to the glory of God the Father. Common Worship Shorter Collect.



First Reading —Acts 9: 36-43

In Joppa there was a disciple named Tabitha (which, when translated, is Dorcas), who was always doing good and helping the poor. About that time she became sick and died, and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room. Lydda was near Joppa; so when the disciples heard that Peter was in Lydda, they sent two men to him and urged him, "Please come at once!" Peter went with them, and when he arrived he was taken upstairs to the room. All the widows stood around him, crying and showing him the robes and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was still with them. Peter sent them all out of the room; then he got down on his knees and prayed. Turning toward the dead woman, he said, "Tabitha, get up." She opened her eyes, and seeing Peter she sat up. He took her by the hand and helped her to her feet. Then he called the believers and the widows and presented her to them alive. This became known all over Joppa, and many people believed in the Lord. Peter stayed in Joppa for some time with a tanner named Simon. (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Revelation 7: 9-17

After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands.

And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." All the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures. They fell down on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, saying: "Amen! Praise and glory and wisdom and thanks and honour and power and strength be to our God for ever and ever. Amen!" Then one of the elders asked me, "These in white robes--who are they, and where did they come from?" I answered, "Sir, you know." And he said, "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore, "they are before the throne of God and serve him day and night in his temple; and he who sits on the throne will spread his tent over them. Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat upon them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd; he will lead them to springs of living water. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." (This is the word of the Lord -- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading – John 10: 22-30 (When announced Glory to Christ our Saviour)

Then came the Feast of Dedication at Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was in the temple area walking in Solomon's Colonnade. The Jews gathered around him, saying, "How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Christ, tell us plainly." Jesus answered, "I did tell you, but you do not believe. The miracles I do in my Father's name speak for me, but you do not believe because you are not my sheep. My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all; no one can snatch them out of my Father's hand. I and the Father are one. (This is the Gospel of Christ - **Praise to Christ our Lord**)

Post Communion Prayer

Commentary

I'm passionate about Peter, perhaps you are. My passion is because of, not in spite of, his failings. Where Peter is concerned the penny often took time to drop;

- On the mountain Peter wanted to preserve the moment, he wanted to put up shelters for Moses, Elijah and Jesus;
- Peter was impetuous; he jumped out of the boat when he saw Jesus walking on water, took
 his eyes of Jesus and perhaps could have drowned in the rough sea had Jesus not come to
 his rescue;
- At the time of Jesus' arrest he acted hastily cutting off an ear of one of the high priest's servant's ears;
- Peter was fearful: he promised Jesus he would follow him anywhere, then hid after Jesus was arrested:
- Peter was fallible; when, a short time later, he was recognised as one of Jesus' followers frailties he lied 3 times saying 'I'm not'.

In Peter I recognise myself with all my failings. My passion comes because of what occurred in last week's Gospel reading when Jesus reinstated Peter. Jesus accepted Peter, accepted him with all his failings and frailties. From the very first moment he met him Jesus recognised in Peter gifts that he could develop and use to further God's kingdom here on earth.

In today's reading from Acts we heard a 'post Pentecost Peter' fulfilling part of that job in the costal town of Joppa, modern day Jaffa and Tel Aviv. He restores life to a female disciple, Tabitha, which in Greek is 'Dorcas' and means gazelle. A gazelle is a graceful animal so perhaps Tabitha was graceful. What we do know is that she is the only woman in the Bible actually described as a disciple and that she was a dressmaker who 'did good and helped the poor'. Her dressmaking was admired by the widows who knew her, so much so that when Peter had been sent for and arrived from Joppa, before he had chance to pray they showed him all that she had made. Perhaps this was their way of proving to Peter that she was 'worthy' of being restored to life? Although Peter himself was proof that we don't have to be 'worthy' to be accepted by Jesus and God and to receive healing prayer.

Just prior to this account of Peter fulfilling Jesus' command to 'feed my sheep', there is a record of Peter in the town of Lydda, about 10 miles inland from Joppa, healing a man who had been paralysed for 8 years. Following this healing many people in the area 'turned to the Lord'. After Tabitha was restored to life the outcome was the same, 'all over Joppa many people believed'. So is this the purpose of Peter's actions? Is it to bring new life to others for their own sake or is it to bring more people to Christ, or both? The call to heal and bring back to life was first given by Jesus to all the disciples, as recorded in 'Matthew' chapter 10 verse 8: 'Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons'.

The call to Peter and all the first disciples is also a call to us who believe in the risen Christ. So how do we heed this call? The call to heal and bring back to life. For many this is, understandably a difficult area. Recently I witnessed misplaced exercising of the call to heal, misplaced because those exercising it had not been invited, like Peter, to pray with a person in need but had imposed themselves on that person. This could have so easily led to more distress for the prayed for person. On the other hand if we prayerfully discern and have been given affirmation that we are called to pray with those in need then it can bring them great comfort and healing of the spirit. What is required is an invitation by those in need, or those close to them, sensitivity and in some instances privacy. When Peter healed the paralysed man others were watching, when he prayed for the dead Tabitha he did so in private.

We are not all called in the same way, but what this intimate account shows is that God values all who offer acts of service, using our God given skills great or small, such as sewing like Tabitha; or the support of those who have things in common like the widows, not forgetting the messengers who probably walked the 20 mile return trip from Joppa to Lydda to fetch Peter. Within our own church community there are many 'messengers' and 'Tabitha's' who work discreetly and diligently for the benefit of others for which we are truly thankful.

After Peter performed these miraculous healings, resulting in many more believers, he was not put on a pedestal and rewarded with high class accommodation, but stayed 'in Lydda for some time with a tanner named Simon'(v 43). Tanners, rather like the shepherds, were on the margins of society, because they worked with the skins of dead animals they were regarded as ritually unclean for much of the time. Not the obvious choice for a few nights B & B! Yet another way that Peter followed Jesus was by befriending the marginalised. Setting another example to us all as to who we might be called to spend time with. *Wendy Waters*.

Meditation

The everlasting life that Jesus was referring to was not about us living for ever on the earth. However, I don't believe that he was referring entirely to something in the future, another life after death. Everlasting life is new life, now. Jesus wants us to be alive with Him today. His Spirit lives in us and with us. He is able to give us that wonderful gift of total forgiveness and purpose, when we stop putting ourselves first and live for Him and others. Lord Jesus we thank you for inviting us to be your friends, we thank you for the love you give us all and for the love of family and friends. We pray for those, who as yet, do not know of your love; those who feel friendless and those who have been let down by those they love.

Christ the healer, we pray for all who are called to pastoral ministry, particularly for chaplains in hospitals, emergency and armed services, immigration detention centres and prisons. Grant them sensitivity to situations, tenderness of heart, together with a firm faith and trust in you.

It stands over the place where Alban, the first martyr, was buried after giving his life for his faith over 1700 years ago more than 200 years before St Augustine arrived in Canterbury.

The building's amazing mixture of architectural styles bears witness to the many centuries of its life, first as a monastic Abbey and now as a Cathedral. Down all those centuries countless pilgrims have come to honour the saint's sacrifice and offer their prayers at his shrine - and they still come in their thousands today. The rule of the Benedictine monks who built the Abbey was that each stranger must be treated as Christ himself, and the cathedral tries to keep their tradition of hospitality alive.
