Common Worship

First Bible Reading Exodus Chapter 1:8 - 2.10

Then a new king, to whom Joseph meant nothing, came to power in Egypt. "Look," he said to his people, "the Israelites have become far too numerous for us. Come, we must deal shrewdly with them or they will become even more numerous and, if war breaks out, will join our enemies, fight against us and leave the country." So they put slave masters over them to oppress them with forced labour, and they built Pithom and Rameses as store cities for Pharaoh. But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread; so the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites and worked them ruthlessly. They made their lives bitter with harsh labour in brick and mortar and with all kinds of work in the fields; in all their harsh labour the Egyptians worked them ruthlessly.

The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, whose names were Shiphrah and Puah, "When you are helping the Hebrew women during childbirth on the delivery stool, if you see that the baby is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, let her live." The midwives, however, feared God and did not do what the king of Egypt had told them to do; they let the boys live. Then the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and asked them, "Why have you done this? Why have you let the boys live?" The midwives answered Pharaoh, "Hebrew women are not like Egyptian women; they are vigorous and give birth before the midwives arrive." So God was kind to the midwives and the people increased and became even more numerous. And because the midwives feared God, he gave them families of their own. Then Pharaoh gave this order to all his people: "Every Hebrew boy that is born you must throw into the Nile, but let every girl live."

Now a man of the tribe of Levi married a Levite woman, and she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. When she saw that he was a fine child, she hid him for three months. But when she could hide him no longer, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with tar and pitch. Then she placed the child in it and put it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile. His sister stood at a distance to see what would happen to him. Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the riverbank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her female slave to get it. She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said. Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?" "Yes, go," she answered. So the girl went and got the baby's mother. Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you." So the woman took the baby and nursed him. When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh's daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, "I drew him out of the water."

Second Bible Reading - Romans Chapter 12:1-8

Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the



pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will. For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of faith God has given you. Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully. (This is the word of the Lord-- **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Matthew Chapter 16:13-20

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" They replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets." "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Christ the Son of the living God." Jesus replied, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by man, but by my Father in heaven. And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." Then he warned his disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Christ. (This is the word of the Lord-- **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

In the passage from Exodus today we read about the killing of male Hebrew children as ordered by Pharaoh. When Pharaoh gave an instruction he was like a God and you disobeyed that power at your peril. Yet we read today of those brave midwives who were prepared to stand out against the power of Pharaoh. We read that the midwives feared God, and their belief in the authority of God, trumped any allegiance or obedience that was owed to Pharaoh. Instead of killing the children they let the boys live.

The disciples were also faced with a choice over which authority to obey. In the passage from Matthew today we read of their journey with Jesus to Caesarea Philippi. This was a town so named because it was rebuilt by the Tetrarch Herod Philip in honour of the emperor Tiberius. Lying 25 miles north of Galilee, it was a beautiful place in the foothills of the snow capped Mount Hermon. This was formerly the area which had been called Paneas in honour of the Greek god, Pan. This is Gentile territory, a place in which there were many competing religious voices. They saw clearly who Jesus was and it was their commitment to him that enabled them eventually to decide to show their obedience to Jesus rather than any human authority, which led most of them to eventual execution.

We need to ask ourselves from time to time whether we would be prepared to stand up for our beliefs and how far would we go to support the cause of right over wrong. Would we be prepared to send a letter, or go on a march, or stand outside the Houses of Parliament, or speak on the news. Would we be prepared to go to prison because we feared God rather than other men? Increasingly Christians around the world are faced with life threatening choices everyday as their faith is seen to run counter to the prevailing authority.

We may not be faced with the demand to convert from our faith we are challenged by competing voices which call for allegiance. In our society there are many different and competing religious movements

which try to claim our attention, we are exposed to more religions than ever before. Many people are searching for religious faith, and yet there is a vast array of choice between religions from all over the world. We need not be ashamed of a willingness to live and speak of our commitment to God.

Likewise in our secular society, pursuit of wealth and beauty are presented in such an overpowering way that many people struggle to understand life beyond things like consumerism of certain brands. It is our Christian mission to impart to others an awareness of where real wealth and beauty lie. The midwives refused to bow the knee to Pharaoh, Peter and disciples refused to bow the knee to Caesar. In our day we too much be defiant against the gods of our age who try to steal hearts and minds. In the words of the new hymn which we will sing this morning - ***There is a higher throne ! Charles Royden***



Mediation

Inspired by Matthew: 25, this sculpture is a representation that suggests Christ is with the most marginalized in our society. The Christ figure is shrouded in a blanket the only indication that it is Jesus are the visible wounds on the feet. The life-size version of the work has enough room that someone is able to sit on the bench. Pope Francis blessed a copy of the statue in St Peter's Square in November

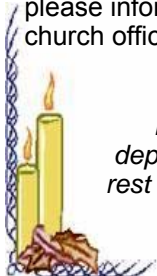
