
3rd Sunday in Epiphany

Opening Verse of Scripture Psalm 19 v 7 - 10 The law of the LORD is perfect, the precepts of the LORD are right, the fear of the LORD is pure, and the ordinances of the LORD are sure and altogether righteous. First Bible Reading -Chapter 8 v 1 - 3, 5 -6, 8-10

All the people assembled as one man in the square before the Water Gate. They told Ezra the scribe to bring out the Book of the Law of Moses, which the LORD had commanded for Israel. So on the first day of the seventh month Ezra the priest brought

the Law before the assembly, which was made up of men and women and all who were able to understand. He read it aloud from daybreak till noon as he faced the square before the Water Gate in the presence of the men, women and others who could understand. And all the people listened attentively to the Book of the Law. Ezra opened the book. All the people could see him because he was standing above them; and as he opened it, the people all stood up. Ezra praised the LORD, the great God; and all the people lifted their hands and responded, "Amen! Amen!" Then they bowed down and worshiped the LORD with their faces to the ground. They read from the Book of the Law of God, making it clear and giving the meaning so that the people could understand what was being read. Then Nehemiah the governor, Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who were instructing the people said to them all, "This day is sacred to the LORD your God. Do not mourn or weep." For all the people had been weeping as they listened to the words of the Law. Nehemiah said, "Go and enjoy choice food and sweet drinks, and send some to those who have nothing prepared. This day is sacred to our Lord. Do not grieve, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

(Reader:This is the Word of the Lord- All: Thanks be to God)

Second Reading -1 Corinthians Chapter 12 v 12 –31a

The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free - and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Now the body is not made up of one part but of many. If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less honourable we treat with special honour. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honour to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it. Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then workers of miracles, also those having gifts of healing, those able to help others, those with gifts of administration, and those speaking in different kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all have gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But eagerly desire the greater gifts. And now I will show you the most excellent way. (Reader: This is the Word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**

Gospel Reading - Luke Chapter 4 v 14 – 21

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news about him spread through the whole countryside. He taught in their synagogues, and everyone praised him. He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. And he stood up to read. The scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written: The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour. Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down. The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were fastened on him, and he began by saying to them, Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing. (Reader: This is the Word of the Lord- All: Thanks b to God)

Commentary

To read today's reading from 1 Corinthians 12:12 – 31a without some understanding of what comes before it is difficult for verses 1 - 11 are so woven into the later verses of the chapter. During my preparations for today I came across some thoughts by a lady called Michaela Youngson in a book called 'The Weaver, the Word and Wisdom' which I thought I would share with you. Her thoughts cross the whole of chapter 12 of 1 Corinthians.

It is tempting to treat the passage from 1 Corinthians 12 about spiritual gifts and 'one body – many parts' as an easy commentary about Christian unity. We are familiar with the tone and the idea. We each have something special to offer to the life of the Church and we should be willing to offer what we have for the common good. But there is a stronger message here. It seems that Paul is cross with the Christians at Corinth. They are allowing jealousy and prejudice to get in the way of their fellowship and witness. Some were boasting about the spiritual gifts they claimed to have received and using these to gain higher regard and status within the Christian community. As a group they were making distinctions between believers with a Jewish or Gentile background and between free people and the slaves that were part of the fellowship.

The writer makes it clear that this is unacceptable and demands a different standard from the people there. Any gift of merit will be recognized because it is for the 'common good'. If so it can be seen to be of God's Spirit. The Greek and Roman members of the group would have traditions of numerous gods and may have been claiming that their gifts were given by different 'spirits of God'. Paul makes it very clear that there is one Spirit. Furthermore, that Spirit makes possible the baptism of all believers into one body. If all are part of the same body then they should be equally regarded and no prejudice of nationality or status should get in the way. The standard that God calls for in the Christian community is that of love. We exist in a very different time from that of those early Christians at Corinth. Yet many of the things that Paul was concerned about have contemporary resonances. Jealousy and issues of status are still present within church communities. Expectations abound that the gifts of ministry are focused in the minister or priest, so that the gifts of others are not released or encouraged for the common good. The body is not

one, but lies broken along lines of doctrine, tradition, prejudice and politics.

Can we discover the baptismal understanding of the Early Church? 'For in one Spirit we are all baptised into one body – Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.' This is as challenging a call to the Body of Christ today as it was to the Corinthians 2,00 years ago. So as we approach the end of the week of prayer for Christian unity may our prayer be that our hearts and minds may be opened to one another and to all God's people. May we be filled with fresh vision and purpose, guided in our individual witness and in our work together, so that our lives may be a living witness to God's love and a testimony to His renewing grace. Meditation, The search for unity: throughout the year

The traditional period in the northern hemisphere for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is 18-25 January. Those dates were proposed in 1908 by Paul Wattson to cover the days between the feasts of St Peter and St Paul, and therefore have a symbolic significance. In the southern hemisphere where January is a vacation time churches often find other days to celebrate the week of prayer, for example around Pentecost (which was suggested by the Faith and Order movement in 1926), which is also a symbolic date for the unity of the church. Mindful of this flexibility concerning the date, we encourage you to understand the material presented here as an invitation to find opportunities throughout the whole year to express the degree of communion which the churches have already received, and to pray together for that full unity which is Christ's will.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity The Bedford-Wide United Service this year will be held at St Paul's on Sunday 24 January at 6.30.pm. The preacher will be the Rev.Geoffrey Colmer, who is the Regional Minister of the Central Baptist Association. A short Lunchtime Service is being held on Monday 25 January at Priory Methodist Church, Newnham Avenue. This service starts at 12.30.pm. Tea/coffee will be provided and you are encouraged to stay, bringing your own sandwiches if you wish. These services, too, will provide an excellent opportunity to have a chat with other Bedford Christians.

Haiti Earthquake An Appeal from the Bishop of St Albans

The earthquake in Haiti on January 12th has devastated the country. Estimates of the numbers killed and injured are staggering. The urgent need to help survivors is evident in every news broadcast. The offices of the UN, as well as those of some of the aid agencies, have been damaged, hampering the efforts of those best placed to spearhead the relief effort. The weak State, and their lack of resources are also making the task of rescue and reconstruction harder. Words of Challenge, Words of Life

'I'm giving up chocolate this Lent – I need to lose a bit of weight anyway.' Many people think that Lent is about simply giving things up, as though God delights in making our lives more difficult. The true focus of Lent is actually about making more space for God in our lives. We give things

up to get rid of the clutter that gets in God's way, so that He can inhabit us more fully. Lent is about hearing afresh God's life-giving words to us. It's about renewing our discipleship of Jesus Christ, which is why we are inviting Christians this Lent to engage in three things.

First, to join a Lent group and reflect with others on the gospel readings which are set for each Sunday.

We have written a course which we hope will both inspire and encourage you in your faith. If your church or chaplaincy is not arranging groups, see if you can find one or two other Christians (perhaps from other denominations) to meet together each week to follow this course. The course is set out below, along with some ideas about how you might use the material. For those who would like a bible commentary to give extra background material, we

are recommending Wansbrough's Luke: The People's Bible Commentary published by BRF (£7.99). The course website is at: www.stalbans.anglican.org/Mission/Lent-Course-2010

Second, you may like to participate in Challenge, which complements the Lent Course. We are asking as many people as possible to join us during Lent in daring to make a difference by living the words of Jesus. The idea is to learn some of the words of Jesus Christ by heart each day and then pray that God will give us the chance to put them into action. Read it, learn it, pray it, do it! The short daily passages, all taken from the Gospel of Luke, will be downloadable from the internet and can be distributed to members of the youth group or congregation (or in the case of schools, to the pupils). Alternatively you can opt to receive them by text message, email, Twitter or RSS. You will be able to register on the Challenge website at www.challenge2010.org from Advent Sunday. We hope that this challenge will be taken up by people in the churches, as well as seekers and enquirers who would like to explore the words of Jesus Christ. It would be great, for example, to advertise it at Christmas services. The Challenge website will give further details and ideas about how to make the Challenge a shared exercise within your congregation or among your friends. In particular you will be able to write comments on the website and upload short video clips, via YouTube, so that you can share with others what the passage means to you and how you have lived it out that day. Third, you are invited to come and join the Easter Monday Pilgrimage on 5th April at the Cathedral in St Albans. This year we are delighted that the community choir from South Oxhey (as featured on the television programme The Choir, led by Gareth Malone) will be with us. You can come by yourself, or with a group. We are inviting all the Lent Groups and those who have done the Challenge to be involved in the Pilgrimage and to make it a way to celebrate and to bring to God all that has been learned, all that has been done and pledges of future action. This will be a wonderful way to express our individual and our corporate commitment to our risen Lord and Saviour, in whose resurrection life we dare to make a difference in our communities and in the world.
