Bible Notes30 Sunday in Ordinary Time

Verse of Scripture Psalm 84 1

How lovely is your dwelling place, O LORD Almighty! My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the LORD; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God.

A Collect Prayer - Before we read we pray

Eternal God, giver of love and peace, you call your children to live together as one family. Give us grace to learn your ways and to do your will, that we may bring justice and peace to all people, in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

First Reading - Jeremiah 14: 7-10, 19-22

Although our sins testify against us, O LORD, do something for the sake of your name. For our backsliding is great; we have sinned against you. O Hope of Israel, its Saviour in times of distress, why are you like a stranger in the land, like a traveller who stays only a night? Why are you like a man taken by surprise, like a warrior powerless to save? You are among us, O LORD, and we bear your name; do not forsake us! This is what the LORD says about this people: "They greatly love to wander; they do not restrain their feet. So the LORD does not accept them; he will now remember their wickedness and punish them for their sins."

Have you rejected Judah completely? Do you despise Zion? Why have you afflicted us so that we cannot be healed? We hoped for peace but no good has come, for a time of healing but there is only terror. O LORD, we acknowledge our wickedness and the guilt of our fathers; we have indeed sinned against you. For the sake of your name do not despise us; do not dishonour your glorious throne. Remember your covenant with us and do not break it. Do any of the worthless idols of the nations bring rain? Do the skies themselves send down showers? No, it is you, O LORD our God. Therefore our hope is in you, for you are the one who does all this.

Second Reading- 2 Timothy 4: 6-8, 16-18

For I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the time has come for my departure. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.

Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day--and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

At my first defence, no one came to my support, but everyone deserted me. May it not be held against them.

But the Lord stood at my side and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. And I was delivered from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and will bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Reading -Luke 18: 9-14

To some who were confident of their own righteousness and looked down on everybody else, Jesus told this parable: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about himself: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men--robbers, evildoers, adulterers--or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.' "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to

heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.' "I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

righteousness and have hardened their hearts to Jesus and those who recognise their own shortcomings and sinfulness and come seeking forgiveness and help to change their ways. Today we find the Pharisee's self-righteousness irritating, but in his day, he would have been honoured for his piety. His extra fasting and his tithing would have placed him as a devout man and his attendance at prayer would have been regarded as an outward sign of his undoubted inner spirituality. In stark contrast, the tax-collector is seen as unworthy and would have been vilified for his work and collaboration with the Romans. Yet in his prayerful attitude and contrite words, in acknowledging his own failings, he is held up as an example of reliance upon God's mercy. God's mercy is part of the Divine Nature which reaches out to all who acknowledge their need and then seeks to heal that broken relationship. Neil Bramble-Chapman

In the news this week

Reform found itself in the embarrassing position at its national conference this week of needing to apologise to the Archbishop of Canterbury by email for the indiscretions of its visiting speaker, the Very Revd Phillip Jensen, Dean of Sydney.

In a Bible study, Dean Jensen had called for the resignation of Dr Williams on the grounds of "theological and intellectual prostitution". He said Dr Williams took his salary "under false pretences" by upholding his office while having a personal opinion of his own on matters of sexuality. A Guardian story headed "Evangelicals call Williams a prostitute" reached Sydney, Australia, and elicited a furious phone call to the Dean from his brother, Dr Peter Jensen, Archbishop of Sydney.

But the jetlagged Dean, suffering a migraine as well as the wrath of his brother, seemed unable to resist further antagonism in his final Bible study for the conference on Wednesday. He berated Reform as a "bunch of old women" for their timidity, and described Evangelicals who accepted women's ordination as "mealy-mouthed . . . able to be domesticated and put in their place".

Partnership Review

Our Partnership Churches are currently engaged in a review process. This is carried out by the Bedfordshire Ecumenical Committee.
