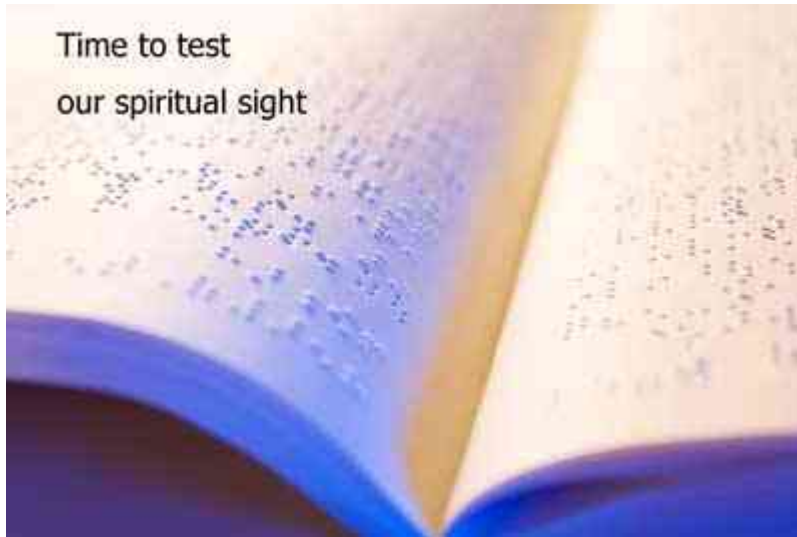

Opening Verses of Scripture Luke Chapter 4:18

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

Collect Prayer for the Day

O God, forasmuch as without you we are not able to please you; mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

First Bible Reading Jeremiah 31: 7-9

This is what the LORD says: "Sing with joy for Jacob; shout for the foremost of the nations. Make your praises heard, and say, 'O LORD, save your people, the remnant of Israel.' See, I will bring them from the land of the north and gather them from the ends of the earth. Among them will be the blind and the lame, expectant mothers and women in labour; a great throng will return. They will come with weeping; they will pray as I bring them back. I will lead them beside streams of water on a level path where they will not stumble, because I am Israel's father, and Ephraim is my firstborn son.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading Hebrews 7: 23-28

Now there have been many of those priests, since death prevented them from continuing in office; but because Jesus lives forever, he has a permanent priesthood. Therefore he is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to intercede for them. Such a high priest meets our need--one who is holy, blameless, pure, set apart from sinners, exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he does not need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for the sins of the people. He sacrificed for their sins once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests men who are weak; but the oath, which came after the law, appointed the Son, who has been made perfect forever.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading Mark 10: 46-52

Then they came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd, were leaving the city, a blind man, Bartimaeus (that is, the Son of Timaeus), was sitting by the roadside begging. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called to the blind man, "Cheer up! On your feet! He's calling you." Throwing his cloak aside, he jumped to his feet and came to Jesus. "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him. The blind man said, "Rabbi, I want to see." "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.

Mediation

In the closing verses of to-day's Epistle, Paul tells Timothy, and by inference all Christian preachers, to preach the true gospel, but warns that people will rather prefer to listen to those who will say what they want to hear. There is so much false teaching you need to be able to differentiate between what is true and false, and what is right from wrong. The Bible is the Book which points us to the way of God and guides us in a high standard of living, and sets moral values in which communities can live more worthily together.

In view of current legislation which seeks to prevent expression of traditional Christian teaching, it is however likely to lead to arrest if one faithfully preached the Bible in a public place, as we have seen. Consequently this has led to a diluting of the message generally. Everyone must decide for him/herself whether they prefer to hear what God has decreed or to prefer a more relaxed message. It is particularly noticeable that since the decline in Christian teaching the standard of behaviour has declined also. (Eric Royden)

Commentary

Today is designated as 'Bible Sunday' the day the Church sets for us to thank God for the great gift of His Holy Word. When a monarch of this country is crowned, at the Coronation Service he/she is handed a copy of the Bible and told it is the greatest gift that can be given to him/her. It is in effect saying, whilst you are above the law of the land here is a law which is above you. Today we have the opportunity of reflecting on what the Bible means to each one of us. How often do you open its pages and read from them? I fear that most people in this country, and indeed many Church members, open it very rarely if at all. Certainly the response from people on radio and television quiz programmes, reveals that they have not the slightest knowledge about even the main stories of the Bible. Even so called intellectuals have displayed an ignorance that is bewildering, one not knowing if Adam or Jesus was the first man placed on earth. Whilst it has been the best selling book of all time and the one translated into more languages than any other book, it is invariably left in a book case. We in this country are so fortunate that we can go into any bookshop and freely buy a copy, something which many others in the world cannot do. In many (non Christian) countries, even possessing a Bible is an offence which could cause you to be imprisoned, and to quote from it, make you liable to a death sentence.

The great purpose of the Bible is to reveal the purpose of Jesus Christ. In the pages of the Old Testament, we find the prophets foretelling of His coming, and in the New, a summary of His life, works and teaching.

In the Epistles we have further teaching from those men our Lord chose as His Apostles which deal with almost every aspect of life. Through the ages people have turned to this book when faced with problems, sorrow, questions which torment them. Children have been told the stories of Jesus and leading characters by parents, teachers and at Sunday Schools. Sadly many parents do not have the time, inclination, or knowledge themselves, to look at the Bible with their children. Where schools would have daily Christian assemblies, it appears (state) schools no longer in most cases have them. Religious teaching has to include a balance of teaching about other faiths, and the Education Secretary seems more concerned with children having sex education than religious, the latter I suspect would have a greater effect on young lives.

What a difference within Muslim families, where children are taught of their Holy Book, the Koran, from an early age. Nor would they let that book be abused and mocked in the way the Bible is treated. Similarly, Jewish children are taught the beliefs and history of Israel and Judaism from the Old Testament.

The central message of the Bible is the grace of God in sending Jesus Christ to be our Saviour, that is, to die on the Cross so our sins can be forgiven and we can be granted salvation. The message is quite clear, there is no vagueness, it is all about what God has done for us and requires a response.

There is an attitude that God accepts everybody as they are without need to change anything in life. Whilst it is true that God is willing to accept everyone, the gospel also teaches that there has to be a response on our part. We may like to think we are good living people, but our standards may not be the same as that which God requires.

The parable of the rich young man and Jesus told how when Jesus said to the man he should sell all he had and give to the poor, the man turned away. Jesus was in fact testing him; what Jesus wanted was the man's heart and was not interested in his money. Jesus knew the value of money, He had rich women supporting His ministry. That requirement still holds, but there is a reluctance for people to give financially, as it means sacrificing something in their life which is too much for them to do. In an age when morals have largely been abandoned, peoples' hearts are not right with God; we don't love the Lord with all our heart otherwise there wouldn't be the problems so many people have in their lives. Churches call for an end to 'credit slavery'

This week, the Methodist Church, the Baptist Union
of Great Britain and the United Reformed Church
have called for transparency in money-lending and
greater protection for borrowers.

In a submission to the Office of Fair Trading, the
Churches assert that money-lenders must give
borrowers all the information necessary to make a
sensible decision about borrowing.

The submission also criticises the practice of credit
dependency, also known as 'credit slavery'. The
Churches assert that lenders should only lend

money if a borrower can pay
both the interest and the loan
amount within a reasonable
timescale.



Paul Morrison, Public Issues
Policy Adviser, said, "This is an issue that Methodists
have been concerned about since before we knew
we were Methodists." The first Methodist building run
by the Wesleys was called the Foundry, as it was the
old military cannon works in Woolwich. The upstairs
was used for meetings and worship, the downstairs
was a loan dispensary to help people to escape
exploitative and violent moneylenders.
"Debt and exploitative lending are just as much a
problem today as they were in the early days of
Methodism. Poverty often means that people come
to loans companies in a situation of urgent need and
are willing to accept exploitative rates of interest.
Borrowers should be treated with dignity and
respect, and their lives must not be crippled by the
need to service unpayable debts."

greatly in meeting the costs of running St Mark's.
We are very fortunate that so many members of the
congregation already give so generously to the

Church can claim 20% tax back from the
