First Bible Reading - Isaiah 58. 9b-14

Then you will call, and the LORD will answer; you will cry for help, and he will say: 'Here am I. If you do away with the yoke of oppression, with the pointing finger and malicious talk, and if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday. The LORD will guide you always;

he will satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched land and will strengthen your frame. You will be like a well-watered garden, like a spring whose waters never fail. Your people will rebuild the ancient ruins and will raise up the age-old foundations; you will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings. "If you keep your feet from breaking the Sabbath and from doing as you please on my holy day, if you call the Sabbath a delight and the LORD's holy day honourable, and if you honour it by not going your own way and not doing as you please or speaking idle words, then you will find your joy in the LORD, and I will cause you to ride on the heights of the land and to feast on the inheritance of your father Jacob." The mouth of the LORD has spoken (This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - Hebrews 12: 18-29

You have not come to a mountain that can be touched and that is burning with fire; to darkness, gloom and storm; to a trumpet blast or to such a voice speaking words that those who heard it begged that no further word be spoken to them, because they could not bear what was commanded: "If even an animal touches the mountain, it must be stoned "The sight was so terrifying that Moses said, "I am trembling with fear."

But you have come to Mount Zion, to the heavenly Jerusalem, the city of the living God. You have come to thousands upon thousands of angels in joyful assembly, to the church of the firstborn, whose names are written in heaven. You have come to God, the judge of all men, to the spirits of righteous men made perfect, to Jesus the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel. See to it that you do not refuse him who speaks. If they did not escape when they refused him who warned them on earth, how much less will we, if we turn away from him who warns us from heaven? At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heavens. The words "once more" indicate the removing of what can be shaken--that is, created things--so that what cannot be shaken may remain. Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our "God is a consuming fire." (This is the word of the Lord- **Thanks be to God)**

Third Bible Reading - Luke 13: 10-17

On a Sabbath Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues, and a woman was there who had been crippled by a spirit for eighteen years. She was bent over and could not straighten

up at all. When Jesus saw her, he called her forward and said to her, "Woman, you are set free from your infirmity." Then he put his hands on her, and immediately she straightened up and praised God.

Indignant because Jesus had healed on the Sabbath, the synagogue ruler said to the people, "There are six days for work. So come and be healed on those days, not on the Sabbath." The Lord answered him, "You hypocrites! Doesn't each of you on the Sabbath untie his ox or donkey from the stall and lead it out to give it water? Then should not this woman, a daughter of Abraham, whom Satan has kept bound for eighteen long years, be set free on the Sabbath day from what bound her?" When he said this, all his opponents were humiliated, but the people were delighted with all the wonderful things he was doing.

Commentary- A question of priorities

The passage from Isaiah talks about the type of service that pleases God; service which is genuine and without hypocrisy. It encourages the returning exiles (from Babylon) to come into a deeper understanding and practice of their covenant faith and what it means to them as a community and as individuals. In placing the woman at the centre of the story in the gospel, Luke does the same to the synagogue ruler and those around him.

The synagogue ruler, who is outraged at the actions of Jesus, was not so much concerned with what Jesus had done, that He had healed the woman, but more when He had done it. He had done it at the wrong time, on the Sabbath. Not surprisingly his outburst provokes a reaction from Jesus. He points to the hypocrisy of the religious leaders who would routinely sanction "breaking the Sabbath" for the benefit of one of their animals, but seem to take exception to Jesus doing the same for a fellow human being. They would have no problem in freeing their donkeys on the Sabbath and letting them drink, but are resistant to Jesus freeing a woman from years of her own bondage. Their compassion and adherence to the law seems to be selective, self-centred, and hypocritical.

Jesus challenges the synagogue ruler and those around him to think about what their faith was all about. Was it really about observing the plethora of rules and regulations which had grown up around the Torah governing all aspects of Jewish life and worship, or was it about obeying the principles of the Torah itself? The synagogue ruler was likely to have been a devout Jew, someone who had a good understanding of the law and probably rest of the Jewish scriptures too. His problem was not about a lack of knowledge, it was about a lack of understanding of how to apply the knowledge he knew so well. In challenging him, Jesus uses the orthodox form of reasoning which was used to develop many of the precepts guiding the Jewish way of life. He uses an example of something which would be acceptable on the Sabbath and extends and applies the principle in a related manner. It would be inconceivable that something that would be acceptable for an animal, to be set free on a Sabbath, would not be acceptable for a human, of whatever status. His argument is irrefutable.

Some have seen Jesus' response as putting the synagogue ruler in his place, belittling him in front of his peers and regular worshipers. But this is not Jesus' style. He does not want to emphasise how little any of us know, or how badly we understand scripture. He wants to encourage everyone to come into a fuller understanding of His love, care and compassion for

the world. To live out our faith in a way that is meaningful, not only to ourselves, but to others too. Not to spend endless hours debating the meaning of the minutiae of scripture, but to live out its reality.

Understanding the meaning of scripture and living out its reality are two sides of the same coin. To live out the reality of scripture we do need to understand its meaning. Jesus is not saying we should not spend time understanding what scripture has to say to us and how it should guide our lives, but that studying the scripture and applying it in our lives should go hand in hand. Living out our faith is about experiencing the living God in our lives, becoming more Christ like through the power of the Holy Spirit. It's not an academic exercise in biblical or doctrinal knowledge which can occur in isolation from the spiritual dimension of our lives. As the woman in the gospel reading was to find out, it's only when we experience the reality of God's words in action that we are set free from whatever would keep us bound. Ultimately, how we experience God and let Him touch our lives, how we respond to His active word and prompting, is far more important then how much we know about Him and the details of His organisation.

Meditation

In Isaiah 58, our Old Testament reading, things are not going as expected for the returned exiles. They are fasting but nothing seems to be happening. Isaiah reminds the Jewish community that although they may be fasting they are still quarreling and fighting amongst themselves and oppressing others around them. All the time they are doing this their supposedly penitential fasting and religious observance is undermined. However, if they do away with their 'pointing fingers and malicious talk', and delight in the Sabbath then they will come to understand the full breadth and depth of God's love and their place and inheritance in that love.

In Luke 13, our New Testament reading, Jesus calls the crippled woman over to Him. He speaks to her and puts His hands on her and she is healed. As a response she praises God. But Jesus' actions on the Sabbath infuriate the synagogue ruler.

In both the Old and New Testament readings the question is not *whether* the Sabbath and our religious observances should be kept but *how* they should be kept. In our daily lives, and perhaps especially in our Sunday worship, our words and actions should be a reflection of God's love in our daily lives and the compassion we have for the world and others around us in response to that love.

More than 171,000 GCSE students are opening envelopes to reveal their grades in Religious Education today, an increase of 7.2 per cent in those taking the full course since last year.

The course's popularity means that the subject has held its position at the top of the chart of increases in entries (for full courses with over 100,000 entrants). It is also the number one short course option, with 56 per cent of those students taking short courses opting to take Religious Education as one of their subject choices.

Today's results also show that 7.8 per cent more students took the GCSE short course in Religious Education this year than last, representing an extra 21,240 students and taking the total to 292,491. The full course, usually studied over two years, was taken by an extra 11,442 students.

Nick McKemey, Head of School Improvement for the Church of England, comments: "This further increase, building on the 7.5 per cent rise last year, is evidence that more young people are fascinated by what they and others believe and how that affects their day-to-day lives. Ofsted have recently reported

that RE contributes significantly to both academic achievement and personal development. While RE may have in the past been seen as an unusual option, this uptake suggests that students from all kinds of backgrounds are keen to engage with issues of community cohesion, diversity and religious understanding."

Mr McKemey argues that the popularity of the subject adds weight to calls for RE to be fully integrated into the National Curriculum up to the age of 14: "Religious Education should not only be given due prominence in the compulsory element of all students' time in school, as the Government has recognised, but it is becoming increasingly clear that a nationally agreed syllabus would help further improve standards and foster stronger community cohesion."
