## Second Sunday in Lent

### First Reading – Genesis 15: 1-12, 17-18

After this, the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision: "Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your very great reward. " But Abram said, "O Sovereign LORD , what can you give me since I remain childless and the one who will inherit my estate is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no children; so a servant in my household will be my heir."

Then the word of the LORD came to him: "This man will not be your heir, but a son coming from your own body will be your heir." 5 He took him outside and said, "Look up at the heavens and count the stars-if indeed you can count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your offspring be." Abram believed the LORD , and he credited it to him as righteousness. He also said to him, "I am the LORD , who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land to take possession of it." But Abram said, "O Sovereign LORD , how can I know that I will gain possession of it?" So the LORD said to him, "Bring me a heifer, a goat and a ram, each three years old, along with a dove and a young pigeon." Abram brought all these to him, cut them in two and arranged the halves opposite each other; the birds, however, he did not cut in half. Then birds of prey came down on the carcasses, but Abram drove them away. As the sun was setting, Abram fell into a deep sleep, and a thick and dreadful darkness came over him.

When the sun had set and darkness had fallen, a smoking firepot with a blazing torch appeared and passed between the pieces. On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram and said, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the Euphrates

### Gospel Reading - Luke 13: 31-35

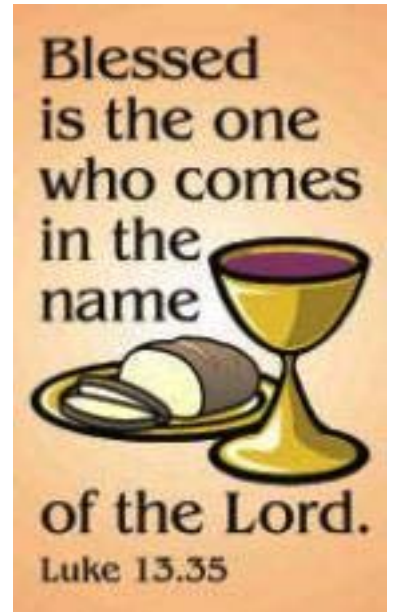
At that time some Pharisees came to Jesus and said to him, "Leave this place and go somewhere else. Herod wants to kill you."

He replied, "Go tell that fox, 'I will drive out demons and heal people today and tomorrow, and on the third day I will reach my goal.' In any case, I must keep going today and tomorrow and the next day—for surely no prophet can die outside Jerusalem!

"O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing! Look, your house is left to you desolate. I tell you, you will not see me again until you say, 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.'" ### Meditation

We may be tempted to think that when Jesus calls Herod a fox he is paying him some kind of back handed compliment. But in Hebrew, and to the hearers of the gospel, calling someone a fox was anything but a compliment. In Hebrew, foxes and lions were contrasted with each other to represent the difference between inferior and great men. The great men are called "lions", and the lesser men are called "foxes". The term was used to refer back to someone's lineage or pedigree and often carried moral overtones with it too. The Mishnah, the written codification of Jewish oral law, exhorts people to "Be a tail to lions rather than a head to foxes". Jesus called Herod a fox after some Pharisees reported that Herod wanted to kill Him. Jesus' response challenged any such plans: "Tell Herod I've got work to do first." Jesus was not implying that Herod was sly, cunning, or even wise, rather he was commenting on Herod's ineptitude and inability, to carry out his threat. In one, well chosen, phrase Jesus questioned the tetrarch's pedigree, moral stature and leadership, and put the Herod "in his place." When Jesus labelled Herod He implied that, despite what Herod himself might think, he was no lion merely a lowly fox, cutting him down to size in the ears of His listeners. Jesus' audience may well have had an inward smile of appreciation at His carefully chosen words. How ironic that it was Jesus himself that was to become known as the Lion of Judah, a symbol which still remains on the emblem of Jerusalem, over which Jesus wept.

### A Covenant relationship

In chapters 13 and 14 of Genesis Lot and Abram have divided the land between them, with Lot taking what seems to be the better region, a land that is described as being well watered and like the Garden of Eden. Abram's land, on the other hand, the land of the Canaanites, does not appear to be quite as good. Later, in chapter 14, Abram rescues Lot and defeats Kedorlaomer and the kings allied to him and is offered the goods of his conquest as reward. But Abram realises that his future lies not in the security of land or riches at the behest of men, but in trust in God alone and His provision. God's provision for Abram is outlined in the Old Testament passage from today's readings and is to be in terms of Abram's security (God will be his shield) and his reward (God will provide a son for Abram coming from his own body). Abram took God at His word, believed Him and it was credited to him as righteousness. Righteousness in the sense that God and Abram are in a right relationship, a relationship that is marked and symbolised by the covenant God then enacts with Abram by giving him and his descendants the land from Egypt to the Euphrates. Abram is rightly confident that the future of his people has been secured by this covenant God. And even though there is to be a 400 gap before God's promises are fulfilled, Abram keeps his faith, even at times of great testing such as when it meant potentially offering Isaac as a sacrifice. Faithful living, it would seem, is not just about seeing our desires fulfilled in the present but about being open to God for His future security and provision. Like Abram, we too can live in that hope and expectation. Like Abram our faith must be grounded in a God who does care and provides for us out of the riches of His grace, rather than out of our own strength and those who apparently can offer us human riches and advantage beyond our dreams.

The contrast between human security and future and God's security and future is seen in the gospel passage for today. Herod, presumably Herod Antipas, was ruler of Galilee. He was a tetrarch, which meant that he was a ruler over one quarter of the former kingdom of Herod the Great. He was, nonetheless, a powerful man. Presumably Herod Antipas saw Jesus as some kind of threat to his authority and rule, perhaps because he thought Jesus was some kind of successor to John the Baptist, or simply because of the following Jesus attracted. The end result was the same. Herod wanted Jesus killed. Strangely enough it is the Pharisees who come to warn Jesus and suggest he 'leaves this place and goes somewhere else'. At this stage it's not clear where Jesus is; we know He is on His way to Jerusalem from a verse earlier in the chapter (Lk 13 v 22) but He does not appear to reach Jerusalem until much later

around (Lk 19 v 28) so presumably He is somewhere in between and is pressing on relentlessly towards the city in which He will arrive some, perhaps three, days later (Lk 13 v 33). For Luke, just as God's meeting with Abram was, the events which are described are all part of God's larger plan for history where God's promises are not only fulfilled to Abram's descendants but are extended to the Gentiles too. We need to see today's gospel reading as part of the one story of God fulfilling His promises to His people of Israel and continuing them through Christ and the body of believers who are called Christians. For Luke, the very centre of his story of Luke-Acts is Jerusalem. The whole gospel of Luke moves towards Jerusalem,



with the early part of Luke's gospel which describes the Galilean ministry preparing for the journey to the city. A journey which ultimately closes with Jesus' death and resurrection there. The story of Acts then begins the move away from Jerusalem as the early believers become, '...witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the end of the earth.' Jesus' lament over Jerusalem therefore reflects not only back on past events where prophets have been killed and the people have fallen away from God as they trusted in their own strength, security and riches, but also forward to cosmic events which would happen in the coming days as Jesus enters the holy city to be crucified. Not only Herod, but the entire people of Jerusalem, the political and religious centre of the Jewish world, have refused to listen to the messengers of God, including Jesus Himself, who proclaimed the way of God's rule and Kingdom. For that reason there will be consequences and they will be judged. All that they have assumed was secure and certain will disappear as the divine security and future of God is once more revealed through the resurrection and ascension of the crucified Christ. For those in political and religious authority it's a dire warning, even today. A warning that those who exercise authority must do so in line with God's will or face the consequences themselves. We are in Lent, a time when we examine ourselves in the shadow of the cross and look towards the future of the resurrection that is Easter. Jesus closing words in His lament over Jerusalem, 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord', will be shouted by the crowds when He enters the city. Jesus warns that the people will not see Him again until they say these words themselves. How many of those shouting His praise as Jesus rode into Jerusalem truly had seen Him as the one coming in the name of the Lord to proclaim an eternal future and security for all those who would acknowledge Him. How many, like Herod, seemingly secure in their own situation, would only come to realise that the rewards and securities of this world are only fleeting and transient when it was perhaps too late, failing to see that the only true and sure future and security is with God and His promises, a God who through His Son offers all eternal security, reward and life itself.

**Caring for Carers** Through my job as a Welfare Rights Adviser to the elderly in Bedfordshire over the last 5 years I have met many 'family and friend unpaid carers' of those with long term illnesses and disabilities. This experience has made me feel passionately about them as I have often seen the 'carer' becoming more ill than the original 'cared for person'. I was therefore delighted when St Alban's Diocese Community Care Group held a conference in November 2009 entitled 'Caring for Carers' which I attended. The purpose of the conference was to 'inform, empower and resource church leaders and members so that they can help and support carers within their parishes'.

I already knew that family and friend carers save the government £87 billion a year. What I did not know was that there are 540,000 people living in Bedfordshire and 10%, 54,000 are unpaid carers. This means that in our Parish there are over 1,000 carers! During the day we heard first hand from several carers how emotional, lonely, and resentful they can feel and how they often have to battle against a range of service providers to get the right care for their loved ones; this might be getting a place in a special school or the right medical or social care provision.

Thankfully the government are beginning to recognise the vital role these, often unseen, carers have and funding is beginning to be provided to ease their burden. A charity 'Carers in Bedfordshire' is taking a lead role in providing support for carers, who range in age from children to the elderly. They have an innovative approach in what they offer including; carers support groups across the county; free pampering therapy; free training and free social events. The church office will hold some leaflets on this charity, it includes a reply paid 'Carer Registration' form which will ensure carers are kept informed about all matters related to 'caring'.

As a church we might also like to ponder how we

currently support family and friend carers, both within our congregations and the wider community and consider if God is calling us to widen our support? *Wendy Waters*

### **Methodists raise more than £70,000 to help victims of the Cumbria floods**

A Methodist fundraising appeal has raised £74,432 to help victims of the floods which struck Cumbria in November.

Methodist Churches across the UK have sent individual donations to The Cumbria Foundation totalling £36,000 while contributions to The Mission in Britain Fund have reached £38,432.77 with money still coming in. The Methodist Church in Britain sent out a cheque for £38,432.77 to the Cumbria Appeal Fund this week.

The floods destroyed businesses and homes in the county, particularly in Cocker mouth, which was badly hit by the devastation.

Revd Richard Teal, Chair of the Cumbria District, said: "This money will make an enormous difference to people. Cocker mouth has been going through a sense of bereavement. All the media attention has subsided and people are left with the reality of it. Things have been held up because of the snow and the bad weather. People who were hoping to get back into their homes in the next few months will now have that put back by a few more months." Cocker mouth Lorton Street Methodist Church is opening from 10am to 12pm six days a week to offer people free coffee and advice. The Mana Credit Union is also using the Church as a base to help people with debt management.

Revd Sue Edwards, a Methodist minister in Cocker mouth, has been offering pastoral support to people in the town along with other members of the clergy. "The whole area was completely devastated," she said. "The housing estate on the other side of the River Derwent is like a ghost town. At the moment we are trying to help people out financially while they are waiting for their insurance, but there is a good community spirit."

## Bishops Lent Course Lent 2

Luke 13:31-35 - Jesus laments over Jerusalem (NRSV)

Words of Challenge  
Words of Life



*At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, 'Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you.' He said to them, 'Go and tell that fox for me, "Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed away from Jerusalem." Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."'*

**Jesus' ministry is creating waves.** The people of Nazareth were outraged at his claims and tried to kill him (Luke 4. 29); Levi the tax collector, a man who was very useful to the occupying Roman forces had left his job to follow Jesus (Luke 5. 27-28); Jesus was upsetting the Jewish religious establishment by healing those who were ritually unclean (Luke 8. 43-48); and he appeared to be teaching a radical social revolution that could lead to unrest (Luke 6. 20-25).

It appears from Jesus' abrupt response ('tell that fox...') that Herod has sent some Pharisees to warn Jesus to get out of his territory. Perhaps Herod hoped to avoid further hassle. Jesus is not willing to be influenced by these very real threats (remember that this is Herod Antipas, tetrarch of Galilee and Peraea, who has already had John the Baptist executed, John 9.9). Jesus' only concern is to continue doing what God has called him to do. Using the present tense to describe the healing and deliverance which has been the hallmark of his public ministry, he again returns to the theme of 'the third day' (Luke 9.22) when he will complete the work for which he has been sent. It is a subtle prophecy of his forthcoming crucifixion and death. Jesus then breaks out in a heartfelt prayer for God's chosen people (v.36) who do not want to listen to the words of the prophets. He uses the lovely image of himself as a protective mother hen, which contrasts sharply with the imagery of Herod as a predatory 'fox' (v.32). He finishes with a note of resignation, 'See your house is left to you' (v.35), echoing the words of Jeremiah 'If you do not heed these words...this house shall become a desolation' (Jeremiah 22.5).

### Questions for discussion

1. What are the words of challenge in this passage?
2. Read through the passage and identify the different things we can learn about Jesus in these verses.
3. Who is he most concerned about?
4. How does Jesus pray in this threatening situation?

**Ideas for Action** One thing that has struck me What one thing am I going to do?  
What one thing will I pray about this week?

**Prayer** How we can pray for our enemies or those we feel threatened by? You may like to think which psalms may help us with such praying (e.g., Psalm 9 or 119. 153- 176). Also look at the teaching of Jesus Christ in Matthew 5. 1-12. Pray especially for the peace of Jerusalem and for all parts of the world where there is conflict.
