Ordinary 31 - All Saints

Opening Verses of Scripture - Psalm 90:14 The angel of the Lord encamps around those who ear Him, and he delivers them.

First Bible Reading - Revelation Chapter 7: 9-17
After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the

They will receive blessing from the Lord and vindication from the God of their salvation. Psalin 245

throne, and to the Lamb." All the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures. They fell down on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, saying: "Amen! Praise and glory and wisdom and thanks and honour and power and strength be to our God for ever and ever. Amen!" Then one of the elders asked me, "These in white robes—who are they, and where did they come from?" I answered, "Sir, you know." And he said, "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore, "they are before the throne of God and serve him day and night in his temple; and he who sits on the throne will spread his tent over them. Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat upon them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd; he will lead them to springs of living water. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." (Reader: This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God)**

Second Reading- 1 John 3: 1-3

How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when he appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. Everyone who has this hope in him purifies himself, just as he is pure

Gospel Reading - Matthew 5: 1-12

Now when he saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, and he began to teach them saying: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God)

Commentary 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted'

This verse is taken from our Gospel reading today which is a part of that collection of Jesus' sayings called 'The Sermon on the Mount'. The early Church used these sayings to teach new believers the essentials of being a Christian. The phrase is a part of the teaching which we know as the beatitudes. The word "blessed" can be understood as 'happy', so in what ways is it a good thing to mourn! The last day of October marks the beginning in the church of a period known as Hallowtide 'All Saintstide' when Christian remember those who have died. All-Hallows Eve, or Halloween, October 31 has Celtic origins being originally the feast of Sanhain/Samhain, (pronounced 'sow'inn) the last night of the Celtic year, when all kinds of spirits were thought to be active. The Celts believed that this was a time when the boundary between the spirit world and the earthly world is at its thinnest and when spirits are most likely to be seen on earth. It was a night of danger signifying the change from Autumn to Winter, it was a night when feasts were held for the dead and animals killed for the Winter. On this night fires were lit in the belief that light had power over darkness, hence pumpkin lanterns to frighten away witches and ghosts. When the Romans invaded Britain they included elements of their harvest celebrations in which they honoured the goddess of the fruits of trees, Pomona. Children still play games with apples at this time of year. By the 9th century Christianity had spread into Celtic lands and the celebration became known as the Eve of All Hallows and eventually Halloween.

All Saints Day, (All Hallows) November 1 The word Hallow means 'Holy', (blessed, consecrated or set apart in a special way) and so 'All-Hallows' or 'All Saints' refers to the Saints—the Holy Ones. Those who died for their faith or who lived extraordinary lives. This day dates back to the 5th century Antioch in Syria when the church dedicated a day to the memory of all those who had been killed for their faith. Until then the church had remembered martyrs on special days of the year, but there became more martyrs than days in the year, and there were some whose names were not known. In Rome Boniface IV (608-615) had relics of martyrs moved from the catacombs to the Pantheon. In 835 the 1st of November was given the title 'All Saints.'

The saints are our ancestors on earth and precede us in heaven. Many Christians experience a strong sense that the saints are still with us, and that they watch over us and pray to God for us. The prayer from Methodist Worship at the bottom of this page expresses the idea of knowing their fellowship with us. Although dead, they are members of Christ's Church and we use this day to give thanks for the lives of all the saints as they are examples to us. Saints are created as signs of hope, that the gospel really can change lives. Somebody is not made a saint at canonisation, it is rather an acknowledgement that somebody was a saint and is therefore in heaven and not neglectful of the needs of the world, through the communion of saints.

All Souls Day, November 2 In the New Testament, 'saint' is often used to describe all those who are followers of Christ, the people called to holiness in him. Not just those who were extra-specially good. So all are saints. So on this day we pray not just for those who have been specially recognised as Saints, but for all of our loved ones.

This time of year is an important time to cherish the memory of those who have died and who have gone before us. As we celebrate their memory we can know God's comfort and we are glad that they share with us in Christ's eternal kingdom. In our society people find death difficult, not least because many people have no faith in God's promises of life beyond death. However for Christian people it is possible to speak about those who have died, trusting by faith that God loves each of his children and cares for us beyond the grave. We celebrate the lives of those whom we have known and love and we pray for their peace. Next week you may feel it helpful to join us for our service of commemoration in which we remember and give thanks for those who have died. *Charles Royden*

St Mark's and Putnoe Heights Mission Project 2008



The Project

MAF's purpose is to speed physical and spiritual care to people in places of deepest human need. Often these can be very remote places where flying is not a luxury, but a lifeline. For over 50 years, MAF planes have been serving countless thousands of men, women and children, bringing medical care, emergency food, and Christian hope. Today worldwide, the MAF partnership operates over 130 aircraft from bases in 30 countries. Flying across deserts, jungles, mountains and swamps, MAF gives hope and practical support to far-flung communities which might take days or weeks to reach by land, where roads may be non-existent or impassable for half the year. Every three minutes, an MAF plane is taking off or landing somewhere in the world, enabling the work of aid and development agencies, missions, national churches and other local groups, transporting dedicated teams bringing healing and relief for body, mind and spirit and providing communications and logistics services to mission communities.

The Share Out

As you would expect the day to day costs of MAF are considerable. For example, it costs £200 just for the fuel to fly a team of eye specialists 600 miles to remote bush clinics in Southern Sudan, £500 for a medical assessment for a pilot preparing for overseas service, £100 for a 2 hour medical flight saving up to two days travel by road. When we give towards the cost of flying MAF planes, we are helping ensure urgent aid and Christian care reaches those whose need is greatest. As last year, we are breaking down our support into manageable shares to enable as many people as possible to contribute. Please feel free to give as little or as much as you would like.

'May the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God, lest in peace and rise in glory. Amen.' Earlier this month, Friends for Life organisers and volunteers met together with Care Home Managers at St Mark's Church, to discuss progress and to enjoy a wonderful meal. Future volunteers please note! The representatives of the Homes were very positive about the difference visitors have made to the lives of residents. However we need to recruit more volunteers—hence this article.

It is not easy to go into a Home and talk to a stranger, but the guidance and support given beforehand by the project leaders, and the welcome of the staff makes this an easy and ultimately enjoyable mutual experience. Three Homes agreed to be the pilot for the scheme, Langslade, The Mallards and Henrietta House .The residents were told about the scheme and asked if they would like a "Friend" to visit them. As an example of our success we were told at the meeting of a resident without family or friends, whose life has been transformed by having her own visitor. The area of operation will cover all of North and some of Mid Bedfordshire. A Personal Befriender will be a member of a Christian church (any denomination), with a letter of recommendation from their vicar, minister or priest. They will also have CRB clearance, which is a legal requirement, paid for by the organisation and is very easy. An authorised ID Badge is then issued. These residents are vulnerable people who are strangers to us - hence, the need. "Friends for Life" management group, is currently discussing with care home management, acceptable ways in which those already visiting a care home to see a relative, friend or church member can also offer to "befriend" another resident.

The commitment to visiting a resident can be as frequent or regular as suits the volunteer. There are many stories to be told [some quite emotional and inspiring] of lives being changed and enriched because some one has offered friendship
