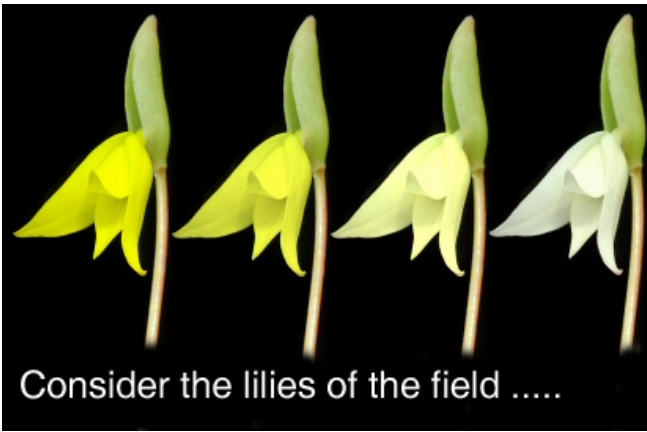


Telecare

Opening Verse - Psalm 107: 1

his love endures forever

Collect Prayer for the Day Before we read we pray

and power; move our hearts to seek first your kingdom, that ours may be the security and joy of those who place their trust in you. We make this prayer through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. *Common Worship*

First Bible Reading - Ecclesiastes 1: 2, 12-14, 2: 18-23

Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless. I, the Teacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. I devoted myself to study and to explore by wisdom all that is done under heaven. What a heavy burden God has laid on men! I have seen all the things that are done under the sun; all of them are meaningless, a chasing after the wind. I hated all the things I had toiled for under the sun, because I must leave them to the one who comes after me. And who knows whether he will be a wise man or a fool? Yet he will have control over all the work into which I have poured my effort and skill under the sun. This too is meaningless. So my heart began to despair over all my toilsome labour under the sun. For a man may do his work with wisdom, knowledge and skill, and then he must leave all he owns to someone who has not worked for it. This too is meaningless and a great misfortune. What does a man get for all the toil and anxious striving with which he labours under the sun? All his days his work is pain and grief; even at night his mind does not rest. This too is meaningless.

(This is the word of the Lord - **Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - Colossians 3: 1-11

Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with him in glory. Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. Because of these, the wrath of God is coming. You used to walk in these ways, in the life you once lived. But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips. Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. Here there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all.

Third Bible Reading – Luke 12: 13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." And he told them this parable: "The ground of a certain rich man produced a good crop. He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.' "Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I'll say to myself, "You

have plenty of good things laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry." "But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?' "This is how it will be with anyone who stores up things for himself but is not rich toward God."

(Reader: This is the word of the Lord - **All: Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

For thousands, of years there have been examples of people from all religious faiths who have renounced the world in order to devote themselves to the spiritual life, without the distractions of material possessions. We might think immediately of Saint Francis and many nuns, monks and religious folk who have entered into religious communities.

This tension between material possessions and spirituality is even more of an issue today, because we live in a society which is incredibly materialistic and enjoys unparalleled material prosperity. It is interesting that there has been a slight shift of late towards a more responsible attitude towards consumption. People are being encouraged to think about whether we are consuming the world's precious resources too fast and without proper responsibility. This change has not been brought about by religious people, more by politicians and the green lobby. These people are not so much concerned about the damage which materialism can do to the soul, but rather to the planet. The problem which is faced by us all as we struggle to restrain industrial growth and its effects is that other countries are not so pleased with our new found global conscience. We enjoyed the fruits from the industrial revolution, now other nations are discovering their appetite and consider it unfair that at this time they should be told to hold back.

It is clear from the teaching of Jesus that he did not consider wealth or possessions in themselves as either inherently good or bad. Rather he set out clear choices which make it abundantly clear that we should develop a dependence on the goodness of God, not a dependence on material, created goods. Jesus said that we should consider the lilies which do not toil or spin but God clothes them. Not a single sparrow falls without God knowing about it, because he cares for us—hence we should be less concerned for our future well being. Each day should have sufficient care, one day at a time. For this reason we should pray for daily bread, not bread enough bread for a month, or even for tomorrow.

Jesus wanted this not because he wanted to stop us from enjoying ourselves, clearly he was accused of being a party guy. Instead Jesus knew that pursuit of fulfillment through material wealth and greed, was utterly self-destructive. The challenge facing us all is to strike the right balance between using our hard work and God given creativity and becoming consumed by consumerism. There is nothing great about being poor, Christians should work to alleviate all kinds of poverty. However if we are all concerned with our own wealth creativity, if we amass more and more for ourselves and fail to be mindful of the needs of others, then that greedy attitude will inevitably cause others to be poor.

The manner in which we create wealth is important, we should not be mean, cheating or exploit the vulnerable.

The way in which we use wealth is important, we should be considerate of the needs of others and not just spend it on ourselves.

Each one of us needs to examine our attitudes towards wealth and materialism. If we devote ourselves to amassing material things, neglecting moral, spiritual and intellectual well-being, then we will eventually destroy ourselves—and coincidentally also the planet. Charles Royden

Meditation Ecclesiastes

"Vanity of vanities....All things are vanity!" It is no wonder that the Book of Ecclesiastes doesn't have a great reputation among biblical readers. It is considered by many as negative, pessimistic, cynical and worldly. Hardly what one would expect from a book in the Bible! But many do like Ecclesiastes because it looks at life squarely in the eyes—it is blunt and honest. It deals with real life and doesn't paint over what is false or unholy. It speaks of the prizes life has to offer the successful and wonders whether it was all worth it. Today's reading is the opening of his book and it begins with a big challenge: what and where we place our security may not be as secure as we think. "All things are vanity!" What we pursue and where we invest our energies may not be worth anything. Even the wise and knowledgeable, who have worked hard throughout life, will only have to leave their property, "to another who has not laboured over it." What is important to keep in mind, as we read today's selection is that the book ends with a section that gives hope to those whose view of life is challenged (11:9-12:8).

"The last word, when all is heard: Fear God and keep God's commandments, for this is a person's all. Because God will bring to judgment every work, with all its hidden qualities, whether good or bad" (12:13-14).

So we keep our eyes wide open and we reflect on what kind of soil we have built our security. Is it the sand of passing delights, or is it the foundational rock of God's Word?

Strengthen us, O God, to relieve the oppressed, to hear the groans of poor prisoners, to reform the abuses of all professions; that many be made not poor to make a few rich. For Jesus Christ's sake. (Oliver Cromwell 1599-1658 adapted from letter after battle of Dunbar)

May we see your glory, O God, in all your works. May we feel your presence in all circumstances and may we hold to you through times of good and ill; through Christ our Lord. Amen
