## First Bible Reading - Isaiah 25: 6-9

On this mountain the LORD Almighty will prepare a feast of rich food for all peoples, a banquet of aged wine the best of meats and the finest of wines. The Sovereign LORD will wipe away the tears from all faces; he will remove the disgrace of his people from all the earth. The LORD has spoken. ## Second Reading - Rev 21: 1-6a

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." He who was seated on the throne said, "I am making everything new!" Then he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." He said to me: "It is done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End. To him who is thirsty I will give to drink without cost from the spring of the water of life.

## Third Reading - John 11: 32-44

When Mary reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved in spirit and troubled. "Where have you laid him?" he asked. "Come and see, Lord," they replied. Jesus wept. Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. "Take away the stone," he said. "But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odour, for he has been there four days." Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. ## **Commentary**

### **Franciscans Today**

Although Saint Francis of Assisi was born over eight hundred years ago, very many people know something of him, perhaps as a little man in a brown tunic with a special way with animals. One well known story is of a rather wild young man who lost his love of wealth, and tried to base his life entirely on that of Jesus. One day, after hearing the Gospel of St. Matthew (19.21) Francis was drawn to following that scripture literally. He chose to live in extreme poverty, loving and reverencing the whole of God's Creation and serving people for love of Christ. Soon he was joined by others, and so the brotherhood of St. Francis developed. The movement grew and the basic values have survived. In 1980 the Pope proclaimed St. Francis the Patron Saint of Ecology.

Francis soon recognised that there were many people, in ordinary family and working lives who felt called to a similar way of life. There were soon three Orders of Franciscans- the men who had gathered around Francis in increasing numbers, women, who served God and his people similarly but accepted enclosed lives because of the social restrictions of the time, and those who became known as The Third Order. Based in the Anglican Church, though not exclusive to it, the members of the Third Order of the Society of Saint Francis try and live according to Franciscan values in the world. They are part of a scattered Community, seeking to follow Christ in everyday life after the pattern of St Francis. The membership consists of men and women, young and old, clergy and lay.

### **Meditation.**

The attitude of humans towards the animal kingdom has, in the Judaeo-Christian tradition, been that of master and servants. In this view animals were made for humans: to feed us, clothe us, work for us, amuse and comfort us. Animals have always been exploited for human need or amusement, although increasingly cruelty has been curbed by public opinion and the Law. Although the rights of animals has a higher profile than ever before, our relationship to the animals, whether as pets or in the wild, is still shifting and uncertain. Humans reactions to animals range widely between cruelty at one extreme and violent animal rights activism at the other.

In our all-age worship this morning we are giving thanks to God for all that animals mean to us, their beauty, usefulness and companionship. But perhaps we should try and break away from seeing animals only in relationship to us? If we look back to the life and writings of Francis of Assisi, a man who nearly lived eight hundred years ago (1182-1226) we see a very radical view of the relationship between man and all other parts of the created world. Francis had the spiritual insight to recognise the essential unity of God's creation. Each part of that creation, from the mighty Sun to the smallest mouse, are recognised as beautiful and precious in God's sight, and therefore worthy of equal respect. In his "Canticle of the Creatures" Francis developed the idea of the unity of all creation by calling it a family, thus the Sun is a Brother, the Moon a Sister. Francis even called birds and animals his sisters and brothers. This revolutionary idea: that there is an equality in every part of creation, was and remains a challenge to the notion that animals were made by God as a commodity to be used and abused. The Franciscan view of the interconnectedness of all creation may be of great use to our generation. The old model of greedy exploitation of the planet and its other inhabitants has brought us to the brink of ecological disaster. That is the very serious message underpinning today's celebrations. ### The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals

The RSPCA was the first animal protection society in the world, founded in 1824. In the 1800's compassion for animals was regarded as unusual

and most were little more than commodities supplying food, transport or sport. Many animals were treated horrendously by their owners and in the early years, the Society's major campaign was to change people's indifference to animal cruelty. Since these early days inspectors have worked to promote kindness and prevent cruelty to animals and of course the public's attitude to animal care has greatly improved.

There are however, still many animals suffering unnecessarily and it is very good to know that the new Animal Welfare Bill is just one step away from the Statute Books. Owners and keepers will then need to meet their animal's basic needs under the Duty of Care. It will be a legal requirement for them to do what is reasonable to provide for their animal's needs and inspectors will be able to step in before suffering occurs. All animals should have the Five Freedoms:-

1. Freedom from hunger and thirst
2. Freedom from pain, injury and disease
3. Freedom from discomfort  
(shelter and resting place)
4. Freedom to express normal behaviour
5. Freedom from fear and distress

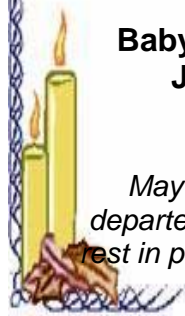
The RSPCA also supports animal care overseas and RSPCA International is one of the main organisations assisting in the humane treatment of these animals.
