Ordinary 19

Opening Verse of Scripture Hebrews 10:23

Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds.

Introduction 'To walk on water, you've got to get out of the boat'

I am reminded of the phrase 'you've got to be in it to win it.' The point is obvious, we will never achieve unless we participate. The flip side is that as well as achievement, we can also fail in our endeavours. Perhaps it is that fear of failure

which prevents so many people from making the effort, and trying to make our dreams become reality. This is true of so many things, not least our willingness to serve God, to allow our talents to be used in his service. The Apostle Peter is a real example to us all, he made mistakes, he had failure in his life, yet he was prepared to have a go, and because of that Jesus called him 'the rock' the one he chose upon which to build his church. In the passage from Matthew today, Peter jumps out of the boat to meet Jesus. Whilst walking on water for a time he soon loses confidence and starts to sink. However we have to pay tribute to Peter because at least he had a go. The words of Theodore Roosevelt.

'It is not the critic who counts; not the one who points out how the strong stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done better. The credit belongs to the one who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly who errs and comes us short again and again; who knows great enthusiasm and great devotion; who spends him/herself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement and who, at worst, if he/she fails, at least fails while daring greatly. So that his/her place shall never be with those timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat.'

Collect Prayer (Before we read we pray)

Almighty and everlasting God, you are always more ready to hear than we are to pray and to give more than either we desire or deserve: pour down upon us the abundance of your mercy, forgiving us those things of which our conscience is afraid and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to ask but through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ your Son our lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. *Common Worship*

First Bible Reading – Genesis 37: 1-4, 12-28

Jacob lived in the land where his father had stayed, the land of Canaan. This is the account of Jacob's family line. Joseph, a young man of seventeen, was tending the flocks with his brothers, the sons of Bilhah and the sons of Zilpah, his father's wives, and he brought their father a bad report about them. Now Israel loved Joseph more than any of his other sons, because he had been born to him in his old age; and he made an ornate robe for him. When his brothers saw that their father loved him more than any of them, they hated him and could not speak a kind word to him.

Now his brothers had gone to graze their father's flocks near Shechem, and Israel said to Joseph, "As you know, your brothers are grazing the flocks near Shechem. Come, I am going to send you to them." "Very well," he replied. So he said to him, "Go and see if all is well with your brothers and with the flocks, and bring word back to me." Then he sent him off from the Valley of Hebron. When Joseph arrived at Shechem, a man found him wandering around in the fields and asked him, "What are you looking for?" He replied, "I'm looking for my brothers. Can you tell me where they are grazing their flocks?" "They have moved on from here," the man answered. "I heard them say, 'Let's go to Dothan.'" So Joseph went after his brothers and found them near Dothan. But they saw him in the distance, and before he reached them, they plotted to kill him. "Here comes that dreamer!" they said to each other. "Come now, let's kill him and throw him into one of these cisterns and say that a ferocious animal devoured him. Then we'll see what comes of his dreams." When Reuben heard this, he tried to rescue him from their hands. "Let's not take



his life," he said. "Don't shed any blood. Throw him into this cistern here in the wilderness, but don't lay a hand on him." Reuben said this to rescue him from them and take him back to his father. So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe—the ornate robe he was wearing— and they took him and threw him into the cistern. The cistern was empty; there was no water in it. As they sat down to eat their meal, they looked up and saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead. Their camels were loaded with spices, balm and myrrh, and they were on their way to take them down to Egypt. Judah said to his brothers, "What will we gain if we kill our brother and cover up his blood? Come, let's sell him to the Ishmaelites and not lay our hands on him; after all, he is our brother, our own flesh and blood." His brothers agreed. So when the Midianite merchants came by, his brothers pulled Joseph up out of the cistern and sold him for twenty shekels of silver to the Ishmaelites, who took him to Egypt. (This is the Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Romans 10: 5 –15

.Moses describes in this way the righteousness that is by the law: "The man who does these things will live by them." But the righteousness that is by faith says: "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?' " (that is, to bring Christ down) "or 'Who will descend into the deep?' " (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? "The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart," that is, the word of faith we are proclaiming: That if you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved. As the Scripture says, "Anyone who trusts in him will never be put to shame." For there is no difference between Jew and Gentile—the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (This is the Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Matthew 14: 22-33

Immediately Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowd. After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat was already a considerable distance from land, buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it. During the fourth watch of the night Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake. When the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified. "It's a ghost," they said, and cried out in fear. But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." "Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." "Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. "You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?" And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God." (This is the Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

Preaching is a privilege and a responsibility, it also has one significant advantage, especially if one does not have to preach every week, which is the time we have to read, investigate and ponder on the Bible passages. I have found the account of Peter putting his trust in Jesus, as is written in Matthew 14: 22- 33, especially pertinent to me over the last six months. Since the reoccurrence of my son's Bipolar Affective Disorder my own ability to trust in Jesus and God has been sorely tested. Without the prayers of others supporting us all, I doubt we would be where we are today, still trusting and thankful that my son is making good progress. So what can this act of Peter's trust and wavering in that trust teach us?

It is interesting to note that although there are very similar accounts of Jesus walking on water, in Mark 6: 45 – 51 and John 6:15 – 21, they do not mention Peter walking on the water. Neither is Peter mentioned in either of them, it is all the disciples who Jesus tells in Mark 6 v 50 to "take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid", and in John 6 v 20 "It is I don't be afraid". So the message of trust can be to us as individuals but also as a group of disciples, as a church. Last year our Messy Church team certainly had to trust that families would respond positively to our publicity and come along, we also had to trust that we would get enough people on the team, then to trust that those who came would come back. Thankfully our trust was fruitful but there were times when, like Peter, some of us wavered.

Why did Peter waver? Why do we waver? At first Peter and the other disciples did not recognise Jesus. Not surprising perhaps after a long night out on the Sea of Galilee and 'buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it'. Recently my husband and I went to the Scilly Isles by ferry, which has reputation for being rather rough, thankfully it wasn't. But I was heartened to be told that, even if the outward journey had been rough, the return would be better as the 'wind would be with us not against us'. Not surprising also, as although the disciples would have been surprised by many of Jesus' miracles, 'walking on water' was probably beyond even their expectations! They needed the reassurance of Jesus' voice to know that it was him. Just as later in the gospels we read that they needed the reassurance of his voice and actions to know he was the resurrected Jesus. Secondly Peter was distracted by the wind, he took his eyes off Jesus, or as we might say he 'took his eye off the ball', his trust began to fail and he could have sunk without Jesus reaching out his hand and catching him. It is very likely that, being a fisherman, Peter could swim but even strong swimmers could struggle to stay afloat in such conditions.

This passage contributes to Peter's reputation of being impetuous, his assumption that he too could walk on water might be seen as foolhardy or full of faith. Jesus it seems viewed it as the latter, he could have told Peter to stay put but he doesn't he says 'Come' (v29). Sometimes when we step out in faith, as individuals or collectively, we may be considered by others as foolhardy, this will not matter as long as we keep our eyes firmly fixed on Jesus and we are as certain as we can be that it is Jesus' voice we are responding to not our own. Yes along the way we may falter, especially when buffeted by the ups and downs of life, but then we can cling on to scriptural words of hope such as found in Romans 10: 9 – 13 in particular verse 13: 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved'. *Wendy Waters*

Watch for those who are troubled by the storms of life. Reach out to them in faith. Listen to those whose story is hard to hear. Respond to those who seek comfort.
