First Bible Reading—Genesis 2: 4b –9, 15-end

This is the account of the heavens and the earth when they were created. When the LORD God made the earth and the heavens-- and no shrub of the field had yet appeared on the earth and no plant of the field had yet sprung up, for the LORD God had not sent rain on the earth and there was no man to work the ground, but streams came up from the earth and watered the whole surface of the ground-- the LORD God formed the man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being. Now the LORD God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden; and there he put the man he had formed. And the LORD God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground--trees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food. In the middle of the garden were the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat of it you will surely die." The LORD God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him." Now the LORD God had formed out of the ground all the beasts of the field and all the birds of the air. He brought them to the man to see what he would name them; and whatever the man called each living creature, that was its name. So the man gave names to all the livestock, the birds of the air and all the beasts of the field. But for Adam no suitable helper was found. So the LORD God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep; and while he was sleeping, he took one of the man's ribs and closed up the place with flesh. Then the LORD God made a woman from the rib he had taken out of the man, and he brought her to the man. The man said, "This is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called 'woman, ' for she was taken out of man." For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and they will become one flesh. The man and his wife were both naked, and they felt no shame.

(Reader:This is the Word of the Lord- **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading –Revelation 4

After this I looked, and there before me was a door standing open in heaven. And the voice I had first heard speaking to me like a trumpet said, "Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this." At once I was in the Spirit, and there before me was a throne in heaven with someone sitting on it. And the one who sat there had the appearance of jasper and carnelian. A rainbow, resembling an emerald, encircled the throne. Surrounding the throne were twenty-four other thrones, and seated on them were twenty-four elders. They were dressed in white and had

crowns of gold on their heads. From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings and peals of thunder. Before the throne, seven lamps were blazing. These are the seven spirits of God. Also before the throne there was what looked like a sea of glass, clear as crystal. In the centre, around the throne, were four living creatures, and they were covered with eyes, in front and in back. The first living creature was like a lion, the second was like an ox, the third had a face like a man, the fourth was like a flying eagle. Each of the four living creatures had six wings and was covered with eyes all around, even under his wings. Day and night they never stop saying: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty, who was, and is, and is to come." Whenever the living creatures give glory, honour and thanks to him who sits on the throne and who lives for ever and ever, the twenty-four elders fall down before him who sits on the throne, and worship him who lives for ever and ever. They lay their crowns before the throne and say: "You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being."

(Reader: This is the Word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Luke 8:22-25

One day Jesus said to his disciples, "Let's go over to the other side of the lake." So they got into a boat and set out. As they sailed, he fell asleep. A squall came down on the lake, so that the boat was being swamped, and they were in great danger. The disciples went and woke him, saying, "Master, Master, we're going to drown!" He got up and rebuked the wind and the raging waters; the storm subsided, and all was calm. "Where is your faith?" he asked his disciples. In fear and amazement they asked one another, "Who is this? He commands even the winds and the water, and they obey him."

Commentary

The commentary and meditation are taken from 'Unexpected Journeys' by Eddie Askew. They are based on the account of Jesus calming the storm in Mark 4: 35- 41 so the words are slightly different to the Luke version we read today.

'He said to his disciples,' Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?'

In the sudden calm that followed the sudden storm emotions were in chaos. I imagine them motionless, frozen in position, bewildered, looking at Jesus in wide-eyed wonder. Storms didn't end so abruptly and they certainly didn't end when were someone told them to. They were on the edge of what they knew and understood, staring into something way beyond their experience. Of course they were afraid.

Fear is a reaction that tells us to run away or struggle, or do whatever will make us safe. It isn't always rational in its response and doesn't always produce the result we'd like. From narratives in the Bible we learn that fear seems to be an immediate human response to the presence of God - or of one of his messengers. Moses "hid his face, because he was afraid to look at God." (Exodus 3:6). And when the angel appeared to Mary and later to the shepherds in Bethlehem's fields, they were all afraid.

The story of the storm on Galilee seems to imply that fear and faith are opposites which can't be yoked together. Jesus' question 'Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?' suggests that the one elbows out the other. That's fine for a sermon on Sunday morning but most people's life experience tells them that it's not as simple as that. We're human and we are afraid of many things. That's the way we're made. We often try to hide our fears, particularly in a Christian context, because we're afraid - and that's another fear -

that our lack of faith will bring disapproval of other believers. We pretend to a courage we don't possess and that arouses the guilt that leads to more fear.

Jesus can deal with it and he deals with it in love. As the writer of John's first letter tells us "perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment." (1 John 4:18). When Jesus asks his disciples in the boat about their fear it isn't a confrontation we witness.. I hear his voice, not strong and challenging as theirs had been when they woke him, but gentle and sympathetic. He'd seen their fear and responded to it. Now he helped them to understand that his presence could strengthen faith and that faith can, slowly perhaps, deal with their fear. And with the fears that many of us face daily.

"Why are you so afraid?" Jesus asked. Fear lessens as faith grows, but in an imperfect world full of imperfect people, and an imperfect church full of imperfect Christians, we stand with the disciples. I'm not sure that our love and faith can ever be strong or complete enough to drive out fear totally. In my experience faith isn't the same as certainty. Certainty doesn't need faith. I'm certain that two plus two equals four. That's a fact and I don't need faith to accept it. Faith is what I cling to when doubt and fear try to take over my life and, in a disturbing but comforting way, faith and doubt go together.

Faith isn't the conquering of all doubt and fear. It's the courage to believe in the midst of it. There are folk who never appear to doubt and who feel no need to ask difficult questions of life. In one way that may be a blessing but in another way asking questions and facing doubts can lead us into new truth - or a deeper understanding of the truth we already hold. And it's through the truth that followers of the way can find new life. Which is what Jesus was and is and offers us.

Meditation

I've been afraid, Lord, many times, you're well aware of that. Yes, I believe in you, in goodness and in love. In truth, although that's not an easy one when I have to face myself and, more, face you. In truth, I am afraid of many things. The calm and cool exterior I try so hard to show can sometimes mask a multitude of doubts. An avalanche of questions roaring down into my life which threatens to engulf and freeze my faith. Questions borne out of insecurity to which the pulpit words of preachers offer little. I'm only human. Very human, that you know.

I'm sure you don't object to questioning. My mind is your creation and I can't be blamed for using it. Yet question's aren't always answered in a way I understand. And faith, I'm sure, is not the conquering of fear and doubt but more the courage to believe within my doubt and fear. The comfort is that when I come to you for strength in fear and trembling I find your hand stretched out for mine. And in the storm-free silence I can hear your patient reassurance telling me that hand in hand with you I can survive and grow, and leave the answers for another day.

Prayers for Sunday and the Week Ahead

Worship and praise belong to you, God our maker. Where nothing was you wove the web of being and still you draw the universe to its fulfilment. Following Jesus

If Christianity (precisely because it is not a doctrine) is not reduplicated in the life of the person expounding it, then he does not expound Christianity, for Christianity is a message about living and can only be expounded by being realized in men's lives. *Soren Kierkegaard, 19th century*

Lent Book Reviews For a change, rather than reviewing books which have a day by day plan for Lent the two books below are suggestions for books that can be read during Lent and have used the Easter or Lent theme as part of their structure. If you've never tried reading a book at Lent before 'God on Mute' is an easy place to start. For a more reflective read, try 'Tokens of Trust'. If you want other suggestions just ask one of the ministers.

Tokens of Trust: Rowan Williams £9.99

Rowan Williams is not always the most accessible of authors but this slim book is more readable than many. It's based on a series of talks given in Canterbury Cathedral in the week before Easter in 2005 and focuses on various elements and statements of the Apostle's and Nicene creeds. These statements are explored not in terms of theological check lists but as durable statements that help us understand who and what we can trust in this world and how lives and the church can be utterly transformed as we truly accept and live out the great 'I believe' claims of our creedal statements. A good book to read a few pages of each day through Lent.

God on Mute: Pete Greig £7.99

Written from an evangelical perspective this very readable book, structured around the four days between Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday, deals with the topic of why God does not always seem to answer our prayers. Dealing honestly with the challenges we all face regarding seemingly unanswered prayers the author uses his own harrowing experience through the serious illness of his wife to explore what happens when we pray and why it is that sometimes God does not seem to answer our prayers as we would expect. The book also draws on the writings of others who have wrestled with the subject of God's apparent absence at times of great need and as such gives a broad perspective on the topic of prayer and our maturing dialogue with a God, who is always present but sometimes appears to be 'on mute'.

 Don't forget both books can be ordered from Amazon via the church web site. As an

alternative to reading a specific lent book why not try reading the same book of the bible each day through Lent. Some of Paul's shorter letters such as Philippians or Colossians are ideal for this, or even the letters of John which are even shorter. For the more ambitious there is always Hebrews or even Mark, the shortest gospel, or Luke the gospel of the current church year. Sam



February 2010 meeting of the Methodist Council

The first major issue tackled by Council was that of the Church’s engagement with social media such as Twitter, Facebook and blogging. The guidelines seek to encourage representatives to make creative use of new media, while at the same time they highlight the potential pitfalls of its misuse. Toby Scott, Director of Communications and Campaigns, said, “How we relate to one another and to those outside the church is central to our calling as individual Christians and as a Church. New media presents exciting opportunities for Christians, but it also challenges us to behave with integrity and respect as in all other spheres of engagement.”

The Council also discussed the nature of leadership and authority in the Church and whether the Church’s current leadership structures should be reviewed. In particular, members considered the roles of President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference. Currently, the President and Vice-President are

elected to serve for one year, with the President as a presbyter and the Vice-President as a lay person or deacon. Council members considered the possibility of a new a tripartite ‘Presidium’, consisting of a presbyteral President and two co-Presidents - one lay person and one deacon.

The Revd Ken Howcroft, Assistant Secretary of the Methodist Council, said; “Clear and effective structures of leadership are essential for any organisation, and for the Church it is especially important that our leadership reflects our Methodist identity and our Christian commitment.’

Other topics discussed at the Council included urban mission, a future strategy for world church relationships, the Church’s position on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and changes to the Methodist Ministers Pension Scheme.
