Baptism of Jesus

Opening Verse of Scripture Mark 1

A voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

Collect Prayer *(Before we read we pray)*

Heavenly Father, at the Jordan you revealed Jesus as your Son: may we recognize him as our Lord and know ourselves to be your beloved children; through Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen. *Common Worship shorter form*

First Bible Reading Genesis 1:1-5

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning--the first day. (This is the Word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God**)

Second Reading - Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was at Corinth, Paul took the road through the interior and arrived at Ephesus. There he found some disciples and asked them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" They answered, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." So Paul asked, "Then what baptism did you receive?" "John's baptism," they replied. Paul said, "John's baptism was a baptism of repentance. He told the people to believe in the one coming after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul placed his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied. There were about twelve men in all. (This is the Word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - Mark 1:4-11

And so John came, baptizing in the desert region and preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. And this was his message: "After me will come one more powerful than I, the thongs of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. As Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased." (This is the Word of the Lord **All: Thanks be to God**)

Post Communion Prayer

Lord of all time and eternity, you opened the heavens and revealed yourself as Father in the baptism of Jesus your beloved Son: by the power of your spirit complete the heavenly work of our rebirth through the waters of the new creation through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Commentary

Our three readings today all show the activity of God's spirit, active and starting something near that begins a process of transformation. In Genesis 1 creation begins with order being brought out of chaos. Light replaces total darkness. In our gospel reading we see that as Jesus is baptised, God's spirit settled

on him affirming his identity and mission.

Mark writes from the standpoint that in the life of Jesus the Jewish hope had found fulfilment. He saw in the earthly life of Jesus the beginnings of God's final intervention in history, the first but decisive stage in the overthrow of the powers of evil and the establishment of God's rule. (*Nineham*). Again this is the start of something new and it began a process of transformation in the lives of people who met Jesus then and now.

The Act's reading describes how a group of people are brought into a new and closer experience of God. When they are baptised in the name of Jesus, the Holy Spirit fills them and God's love is shed abroad in their hearts and lives to change them. So, a break from the past, a new start, a process of transformation. God wants to bring order out of chaos.

Concentrating on today's Sunday theme, 'the baptism of Jesus', this is some of what Tom Wright has to say

'the whole Christian gospel could be summed up in this point, that when the living God looks at us, every baptised and believing Christian, he says to us what he said to Jesus on that day. He sees us, not as we are in ourselves, but as we are in Jesus Christ. It sometimes seems impossible, especially to people who have never had this kind of support from the earthly parents, but it's true. God looks at us and says you are my dear, dear child, I am delighted with you. Try reading that sentence slowly, with your own name at the start, and reflect quietly on God saying that to you both at your baptism and every day since.

Mark tells the story in quite a solemn language, echoing the old Testament 'this is how it happened', 'he saw the heavens open'. If we go back to the biblical roots we will realise what 'seeing heavens opened' means. It doesn't mean that Jesus saw a little door ajar miles up in the sky. Heaven in the Bible often means God's dimension behind ordinary reality. It's more as though an invisible curtain, right in front of us, was suddenly pulled back, so that instead of the trees and flowers and buildings, or in Jesus' case the river, the sandy desert and the crowds, we are standing in the presence of a different reality together.

A good deal of Christian faith is a matter of learning to live by this different reality even when we can't see it. Sometimes at decisive and climactic moments, the curtain is drawn back and we see, or hear, what's really going on. Most of the time we walk by faith, not by sight. One of the things Mark is saying to us, in the way he's written his gospel, is that when we look at the whole life of Jesus that is how we are to understand it. Look at this story, he says, look at this life, and learn to see and hear it in the heavenly vision, the heavenly voice. Learn to hear these words are addressed to yourself. Let them change you, make you somebody new, the new person God wants you to be. Discover in this story that normally hidden heavenly dimension of God's world.

Mind you, if we start the journey imagining that God is a bully, and angry threatening parent ready to yell at us, slammed the door on us, or kick us out into the street because we haven't quite made the grade, we will fail at the first whisper of temptation. But if we remember the voice that spoke those powerful words of love we will find a way through. For it was love that came down at Christmas. *Richard Ledger*

Epiphany Sermon for Living God's Love by the Bishop of St Albans 8th January 2012. Mark

1. 4-11 The following is a transcript of the Bishop of St Albans video sermon 'Living God's Love one year in, The Baptism of Christ': From the Baptism Liturgy:

We thank you, almighty God, for the gift of water to sustain, refresh and cleanse all life. Over water the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through water you led the children of Israel from slavery in Egypt to freedom in

the Promised Land. In water your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us from the death of sin to newness of life.

This is the year of the London Olympics. The Lee Valley in Waltham Cross is where the canoe slalom is going to take place, the only event in the Olympics in the Diocese of St Albans. As you can see this is not a sport for the faint hearted. However, the Bishop of Hertford and the Archdeacon of St Albans have been testing the course out and preparing the way for the Olympic athletes getting ready for the real thing. I am reliably informed that on present form neither is being tipped to win a medal.

Surging waters are both fascinating and at the same time terrifying. In recent years we have watched our televisions in awe and terror at the footage of tsunamis destroying miles of coastline. We have seen terrible floods in Louisiana, Australia, Pakistan and recently in Thailand causing unimaginable damage and death. Part of the reason that waters cause fear is because of their unpredictability. In Old Testament times, there was a belief that the chaos of the surging water personified the powers which were in opposition to God. The sea is depicted as the place of ultimate threat, where we find ourselves in the power of forces outside our control. It's why water is so often the stuff of our nightmares, when we dream of drowning. This is hinted at in the opening words of the bible, which are one of the set readings for today:

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth
was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep.

Later in Genesis, Chapter 1 we find God separating the waters to create dry land and in today's Psalm we have a powerful declaration that God is stronger than any surging waters:

The LORD sits enthroned over the flood; the LORD sits enthroned as king for ever.

This, then, is the background to our gospel reading about the Baptism of Christ by John the Baptist in the Jordan. I guess if we were asked what the actual event would have looked like, most of us would describe some scene similar to the famous painting by Piero della Francesca in the National Gallery. It's a picture of serenity and peace as a trickle of water is delicately poured over the head of Jesus. At the same time the dove, representing the Holy Spirit, hovers

over him. That's certainly one image of baptism. But there is another in the bible. It is of the people of God being led out of the land of Egypt through the raging waters of the Red Sea. They find themselves trapped between the rapidly approaching Egyptian army threatening them with death and the powerful currents of the Red Sea. God commands them to go through the waters of chaos. It looks daunting and they fear that they will lose control and die in the swirling waters. Yet God tells them that this is the only way into the Promised Land, the land flowing with milk and honey.

This is a much more dramatic image of baptism than Piero della Francesca's. Perhaps the nearest we get to it today is in baptism by full immersion. At the heart of baptism, is this call to place our trust in God in a radical way – trusting Him even when we are facing chaos and uncertainty. We go under the waters, as if being buried, and then we are raised to new life.

It is said that some of the early Celtic saints lived out this radical faith by setting sail in a coracle – one of the most light-weight and insecure sorts of boats. They would simply put out from the shore and allow the currents, the tides and winds to propel them to a new place. They believed that the spot where they came ashore was the place that God, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, had called them for his mission.

As we begin the second year of Living God's Love as a diocese, John reminds us that the baptism of Jesus is about being filled with the Holy Spirit: 'I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' The gift of the Holy Spirit at Jesus' baptism was to lead him into the wilderness and then into many demanding situations. Later, the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Christians in Corinth – as described in the reading set for today from the Acts of the Apostles - was to empower them and send them out in to their communities to be people of good news. The same is true for us today. God gives us the Holy Spirit in baptism and calls us to venture out into the places that feel chaotic and where we may feel insecure. Yet these are the very places where we will discover the Holy Spirit already at work. Like Jesus, it is when we are in a vulnerable place – when we feel like 'dying to self' - that we will hear afresh God's word of affirmation to us 'You are my beloved son or daughter'. The question I ask myself each day and which I want to ask you as you prayerfully prepare your Mission Action Plans, is 'Where is God calling us to venture forth in faith?' Over the past year, I've heard of many examples where this has already happening.

Last April, a group of young people from St Luke's in Watford joined a group of others from around Britain and travelled to Mexico to build a house for a local family. It was costly and risky, they had to raise money themselves for their trip and they had to work when they got there.

St Swithun's church in Sandy runs a drop in centre on Wednesdays and Saturdays to provide a meeting place for people in the local community. Hot lunches are provided and a room is set aside for mums and toddlers to meet. Like some other congregations, the people of St Francis church in Luton each year sends shoe boxes filled with items to bring humanitarian aid to communities in the Ukraine and Moldova at Christmas. St Michael's in Woburn Sands serves a community of only 3,500 people. Yet members of the congregation have been working with other Christian churches in the area to support a winter shelter for homeless people over Christmas and the New Year. This coming year provides many opportunities to venture out – among them the public celebrations of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June, and the Olympics and Para Olympics over the summer. Alongside these there are countless other opportunities to be found in each parish and chaplaincy as together we seek to live out our baptism and Live God's Love. *Bishop Alan +*

quick to answer now his call.

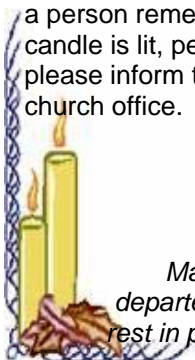
We are called to be God's prophets,
