First Bible Reading - Exodus 20:1-17

worship them; for I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love me and keep my commandments.

"You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name.

"Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your manservant or maidservant, nor your animals, nor the alien within your gates. For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy.

"Honour your father and your mother, so that you may live long in the land the LORD your God is giving you.

"You shall not murder. "You shall not commit adultery. "You shall not steal.

"You shall not give false testimony against your neighbour.

"You shall not covet your neighbour's house. You shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour." (This is the word of the Lord—**Thanks be to God**)

Second Bible Reading - 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written: "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate."

Where is the wise man? Where is the scholar? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe. Jews demand miraculous signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than man's wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Gospel Reading - John 2:13-22

When it was almost time for the Jewish Passover, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple courts he found men selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money. So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple area, both sheep and cattle; he scattered the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. To those who sold doves he said, "Get these out of here! How dare you turn my Father's house into a market!" His disciples remembered that it is written: "Zeal for your house will consume me."

Then the Jews demanded of him, "What miraculous sign can you show us to prove your authority to do all this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and I will raise it again in three days." The Jews replied, "It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and you are going to raise it in three days?" But the temple he had spoken of was his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples recalled what he had said. Then they believed the Scripture and the words that Jesus had spoken. (This is the word of the Lord – **Thanks be to God**)

Commentary

At first sight our New Testament reading might seem to support those who were critical of the letter written by the Bishops recently about the moral basis of politics - urging a debate on broad issues about defence, poverty and justice. Critics say the bishops should focus on saving souls, not mixing religion and politics. But looking deeper, Paul saying we preach Christ crucified is not a narrow "pure " Gospel that excludes anything else.

He says it is a stumbling block to tears. They pointed to Deuteronomy 21:23. "Anyone who is hung on a tree is under God's curse", so crucifixion disproved finally that Jesus was the Son of God. Despite Isaiah 53, they had never imagined a suffering Messiah.

To the Greeks Paul says the message was foolishness: they argued that God cannot feel so to them it was incredible that someone who had loved and suffered as Jesus had done could possibly be the Son of God.

And here's the key - loving and suffering. Jesus came to show us what God is really like. We see him to be the Servant King - coming not to be served but to serve. On Palm Sunday he enacts Zechariah 9:9. "Your King comes to you meek riding on a donkey" - he was a different kind of king. On the cross he shows us that God's love has no limits. As the Communion hymn says "Here we survey that love, which spoke in every breath, which crowned each action of his life and triumphed in his death."

Yes, love motivated Jesus. He reveals that God is love - unconditional, limitless. Jesus reached out to the despised, marginalised, shamed. At the very start of his ministry he quoted Isaiah 61: "The Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release for the prisoners" and he says "today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:20).

So Jesus got involved in the stuff of life. Our Christmas tweet a couple of years ago said "God gets stuck into our lives regardless of who we are, unconditional". His life of prayer was also a living of active loving. There was no divide for Jesus between the good news of God's love and everyday life. His deeds reflected his intimate relationship with God his father. Amos, long before, had said "I despise your religious feasts... away with the noise of your songs. Let justice roll on like a river......you take bribes and deprive the poor of justice in the courts".

So it is when Jesus, in our Gospel reading, throws the moneychangers out of the temple. He is angry, not because the temple is being used as a sort of Community Centre, but because the system of temple tax had become utterly corrupt. There was extortion and almost blackmail:

glaring social injustice perpetrated in the name of pure religion. So Jesus acts. Because he loved God and people he couldn't just do nothing. He roots out corruption. And we shouldn't be surprised, for to Jesus the whole law is summed up as "Love God with all your heart and your neighbour as yourself". And this goes as far as loving our enemies - as radical as his Isaiah manifesto; reversing accepted values in a way that seeks to transform our world in a way that the Ten Commandments would, if they were truly lived! Jesus teaches us to pray "Your Kingdom come your will be done on earth as it is in heaven".

Living in Community ,as we do, we need to live_our faith if it is to make a real difference. Yes Martin Luther was right when he rediscovered the gospel fact that we are saved through grace by faith. Only faith. "Nothing in my hand, I bring" says the hymn. It is all God's gift out of love. But, equally, James is right when he says "Faith without works is dead". What good does it do merely to say "God bless you" to a hungry or homeless person? So we should thank God for Foodbanks, hostels, the Salvation Army, Street Angel - all those who show God's love to others. In a real sense they are almost enacting the parable of the sheep and the goats in Matthew 25, where people are genuinely surprised by the outcome!

"So let us learn how to serve and in our lives enthrone him, each others' needs to prefer, for it is Christ we're serving.

This is our God our Servant King, He calls us now to follow him, to bring our lives as a daily offering of worship to the Servant King" That's how Graham Kendrick puts it, food for thoughts for us all. *Richard Ledger*

The Ten Commandments with New Testament Comments

- 1. I am the Lord your God; you shall have no other Gods before me Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.
- 2. You shall not make for yourself an idol. God is spirit and his worshippers must worship in spirit and truth.
- 3. You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God. Worship God acceptably with reverence and awe.
- 4. Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. Let us not give up meeting together; for the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath.

A million sold and voted the UK's favourite Fairtrade Egg! The Real Easter Egg, the only easter egg sold with with a copy of the Easter story in each box, has sold a million since it was introduced in 2010.

Initially turned down by supermarkerts, as they were unsure that a 'faith egg' would sell, the Real Easter Egg was voted the UK's favourite Fairtrade egg in a national poll last year. How wrong they were. There is also a charitable donation for every 150g egg sold. More than £140,000 has been donated from sales. It also supports farmers and producers in the developing world by using Fairtrade chocolate. David Marshall, who heads up the Meaningful Chocolate Company, said; "The Real Easter Egg campaign aims to establish giving a Real Easter Egg as a tradition. We can be found in Tesco, Waitrose and Morrison's. However, we make very little from supermarket sales so we do rely on direct sales from churches and schools. Last year we sent more than 400,000 eggs through the post. This is a very positive example of putting our faith into practice so I hope churches will support this year's Real Easter Egg campaign by visiting www.realeasteregg.co.uk and ordering.
